October Is Marathon Month

Most of us will never have the opportunity to play baseball in the same game as Dwight Gooden or Don Mattingly, or to play tennis with John McEnroe or Chris Evert Lloyd, or basketball with Patrick Ewing. But every October, anyone with the fortitude and determination to train for a 26.2 mile road race can compete in the New York City Marathon along with world champions like Carlos Lopes, Alberto Salazar, Grete Waitz and Joan Benoit.

The New York City Marathon is the most exciting mass participation sporting event in the world. On Sunday morning, October 27, 19,000 runners will line up at Staten Island's Verrazano Bridge Toll plaza for the start of an exhilarating run through New York City's five boroughs.

Many Long Islanders have been training for the Marathon for months, and their reward will be the incomparable sense of elation they feel when they cross the Central Park finish line in front of thousands of cheering spectators.
