## Town Planning Advisory Board To Consider New Office Buildings, Oct. 24

The Town of Oyster Bay Planning Advisory Board has scheduled a public hearing for Thursday, October 24, to consider site plans for two office buildings and a condominium development, according to Town Councilman Douglas J. Hynes.

The two office building site plans to be considered are 'G-1' Central Business District proposals for Hicksville," said Hynes. "One plan, Gillison Office Center, is for the construction of a five story building at the southwest corner of West John Street and Wyckoff Street. The Hicksville Plaza Atrium, a four story office building at the northwest corner of Duffy

Avenue and Nelson Avenue, is the second proposal. The third site plan to be reviewed is for "the Hunt Club," a condominium project proposed by Bancal Associates, for the construction of 93 units to be located on the north side of the North Service Road of the Long Island Expressway in Jericho.

Hynes noted that the condominium proposal had been previously approved by the Oyster Bay town Board, subject to site plan approval.

The meeting is scheduled for October 24 at 8:00 PM in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

### Oct. 29 Hearing Set On Hicksville-Zone Change Request

A public hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, October 29, by the Oyster Bay Town Board on a request for a change of zone in Hicksville, according to Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

"The applicants, The Kelly Organization, Inc. and John Merenda, are seeking a change of zone from Residence 'D' to 'R-O' (Residence-Office

District) for general office use," Clark said. The building is located on the south side of Old Country Road, just east of the intersection formed by Old Country Road and Clarissa Drive in Hicksville.

The hearing is scheduled for 10 AM on Tuesday, October 29, 1985 in the Town Hall East hearing room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

### Mail Overseas Holiday Packages Soon

For those with relatives in the armed services stationed overseas, or who wish to mail holiday greetings and packages to others living in foreign countries, now is the time to be making your holiday mailings, according to Hicksville MSC Manager/Postmaster Roger Nienaber.

Parcels sent to military personnel in Australia, the Far East and Southeast Asia have to be mailed by October 18 if shipped by surface mail, the least expensive form of shipment.

November is the month when most parcels shipped via Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL) should be sent. PAL packages are airlifted domestically to a gateway facility, then airlifted on a space available basis from the gateway to the APO (Army or Air Force Post Office).

Packages up to 30 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth may be sent by PAL. Mailers pay the regular Parcel Post rate to the U.S. exit port or from the port of entry plus a fee for air service. The air service fee is 30 cents for parcels weighing two pounds or less, 60 cents for two to three pounds, 90 cents for three to four pounds, and \$1.20 for four to 30 pounds.

November mailers can also ship military parcels by Space Available Mail (SAM). Items shipped by SAM are transported by surface means in the contiguous 48 states and flown on a space available basis from the U.S. to the overseas destination or from the overseas destination to the U.S. Packages up to 15 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth may be sent by SAM for regular Parcel Post rates to the U.S. exit port or from the U.S. Port of entry.

When mailed from a military post office outside the 48 contiguous states, the weight of any piece cannot be more than 70 pounds and the size cannot exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined.

Here are three calendars of suggested mailing dates to assure parcels and greetings will arrive on time. More information on international mailings is available from postmasters or post office window clerks.

## Something To Think About

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### PERSONAL EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY

The expression of sympathy is a highly individual matter. If the family of the deceased feels very strongly about a special charity, they may wish to have their departed member honored by the growth of that charity from donations made in the person's name. At the same time, if certain individuals wish to express sympathy but feel uncomfortable supporting a particular charity - whatever the reason - their wishes should be respected, too.

One alternative is the PERSONAL EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY. This might take the form of a sincere letter to the family or the performance of some direct service to the family or the community in honor of the deceased. This requires a giving

of self rather than money and is a truly meaningful form of sympathy. One might wish to plant a tree on school or hospital grounds (with permission of course), pay monthly calls on a friend of the deceased confined to a nursing home, or some other service in honor of the deceased.

# 1986 Budget Holds Tax Rate- Day/Night Hearings Set For October 22

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced that the 1986 Preliminary Budget will hold the General Town Tax rate at 87 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation for the fourth consecutive year.

The Town Board set a day and night public hearing on the Preliminary Budget for Tuesday, October 22, 1985. The hearing is scheduled for 10 AM and 8 PM in the Town Hall East hearing room in Oyster Bay.

Supervisor Colby commented that "although costs continue to increase, department heads and other Town officials have made a conscientious effort to develop better, cost effective methods of providing needed services more efficiently. This has greatly assisted us in again maintaining our low tax rate."

The Preliminary Part-Town (Planning, Building and Zoning) Budget, which is not paid by property owners in villages, was reduced for homeowners by 6 cents. That reduction offsets a 6-cent increase in the Highway tax, which also is not paid by property owners in villages.

In addition, the 1986 Preliminary budget totally eliminates the \$2.15 tax rate for Sanitation Transfer and Transport Expenses.

The proposed General Town Budget—that budget covering the entire Town—totals \$38,343,712. The 1985 total was \$36,097,926.

Under the State law allowing Nassau County to establish four categories of property assessment, each with its own tax rate, allowable adjustments have been made to benefit homeowners. The rates for the proposed 1986 General Town Budget would be set as follows (1985 rates are in brackets): Class I properties (one, two and three family homes) 87 cents ('85 rate: 87 cents); Class II properties (apartments) 96 and 7/10ths cents ('85 rate:

94 and 4/5ths cents); Class III properties (utilities) 95 and 2/5ths cents ('85 rate: 95 and 1/10th cent); Class IV properties (all others) 95 and 3/5ths cents ('85 rate: 95 and 1/2 cent).

The slight increase/decrease in the different assessment categories is a reflection of the adjustment favoring homeowners and the amount of new construction among the four classes.

The Preliminary Budget for Part Town (Planning, Building and Zoning) totals \$2,868,956. The 1985 total was \$2,787,584. Under this proposed budget, which does not affect property in villages, the rates would be as follows: Class I, 15 and 3/10ths cents ('85 rate: 21 and 3/10ths cents); Class II, 15 and 9/10ths cents ('85 rate: 23 and 2/5ths cents); Class III, 17 cents ('85 rate: 23 and 1/2 cent); Class IV, 17 cents ('85 rate: 23 and 3/5ths cents).

The 1986 Preliminary Budget for Highway totals \$13,345,613. The 1985 total was \$12,644,964. This tax is not part of a homeowner's bill if the property is in a village. Under this proposed budget the rates would be set as follows: Class I, \$1.42 and 1/2 cent ('85 rate: \$1.36 and 1/2 cent); Class II, \$1.59 and 9/10ths cents (\$1.49 and 3/5ths cents) Class III, \$1.57 and 1/2 cent (\$1.50 and 2/5ths cents); Class IV, \$1.57 and 9/10ths cents (\$1.51 and 1/10th cent).

Colby said that for homeowners, "the decrease in the Part-Town rate totally offsets the slight increase in the Highway rate."

Colby noted that the \$2.15 tax rate for Sanitation Transfer and Transport Expenses was totally eliminated in 1986 as a result of the Town's success in blocking, for almost a year, State efforts to force Oyster Bay to ship its residents' refuse to out-of-state landfills. "By using every legal means

available we were able to save the tax dollars that the State has been trying to force us to spend since last October," Colby said.

In the Preliminary Budget document, copies of which are currently being printed for distribution in the Town Clerk's annexes and to public libraries throughout the Town prior to the October 22nd hearing, the revenue and all locations for all special districts in the town are also included.

There are more than 50 special districts that supply such services as fire protection, water supply, refuse collection, community park facilities, etc. throughout the Town. Many of these districts are administered by locally elected Boards of Commissioners who prepare their own budgets which, by State law, must be reflected in the Town's Preliminary Budget document. As proposed, some of the special district taxes will increase, some will decrease and others will remain the same.

Residents who want to review the proposed budgets and tax rates for the special districts which supply services to them should bring a copy of their computerized Town tax bill with them so that they will be able to pick

out the various special districts that serve them.

Colby pointed out that the Preliminary Budget book can only reflect information concerning a maximum of 14% of the average homeowner's total property bill. "The Preliminary Budget reflects the 9.27% of the tax bill that goes for local special districts and the 4.6% that goes to the Town General Fund, Part-Town and Highway budgets," Colby explained. "If a resident's property is in a village, he or she will pay only the General Fund portion of the Town's 4.6%, which is 1.63% of their total tax bill."

School districts, which make up 58% of the average tax bill, prepare and adopt their own separate budgets. The County of Nassau, including its General Fund, Police District and Community College and Sewer Districts, represents approximately 28% of the homeowners' tax bill. These figures appear in the budget prepared and adopted by the County.

Supervisor Colby added that comments from residents, either written or oral, on proposed uses of monies allocated to the Town under the General Revenue Sharing program may also be made at the Budget Hearing.

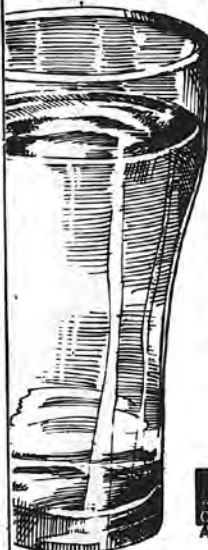

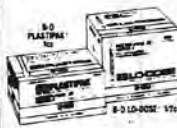

## LASER SURGERY

The technology of Star Wars is now starting to have practical applications in medicine and surgery. One of the newest areas is the use of the laser in surgery. Gynecologists, neurosurgeons, otolaryngologists, ophthalmologists and general surgeons are beginning to find that in certain areas of their specialties the use of the laser is superior to conventional surgical techniques.

As a general surgeon, I was very interested to find out how the laser could improve my surgical results. I took several courses in laser surgery to find out what the experts in the field were thinking and what they were doing. Both of these courses, one at New York University School of Medicine and the other at Temple University Medical School in Philadelphia, were excellent. They both had laboratory sessions where you had "hands on" experience using the laser.

According to these experts, the use of the laser markedly cuts down on the amount of bleeding during surgery. It also lessens the tissue reaction so that there is less swelling and pain after surgery. The laser also sterilizes as it cuts so it is very useful in infected areas and should lessen the possibility of wound infections. In cancer surgery it has the theoretical benefit of sealing all of the small blood vessels and lymphatic vessels so that the possibility of spreading cancer cells during an operation is lessened.

The laser is very beneficial in surgery involving the skin, especially areas of infected skin. This includes pilonidal cysts, decubital ulcers (these are pressure sores that can develop in elderly patients) and cutaneous lesions like skin tags, warts, etc. The laser is also extremely useful in treating condylomata, which is a viral infection that causes painful raised lesion around the anal opening and around the genital organs. Lasers are also used in operations where there is usually a considerable amount of bleeding. This includes mastectomies and surgical procedures where the patient's blood will not clot normally (e.g. hemophilia).

Lasers are still quite new and experimental. New applications will be forthcoming as the technology further improves. In the hospitals where I operate, the only ones where lasers are available are at North Shore University Hospital and Central General Hospital. Again, the use of these lasers are still very restricted because of the experimental nature and newness of the procedures.

Only time will tell whether the use of the laser will truly be superior to conventional types of surgery. Even though some of the experts are very positive in their thinking, it is really too early to give a definitive result. In the procedures that I have done using the laser, I have been very pleased with the results as have the patients. But, again, even my number of cases is too few to be significant. Hopefully in the next year or so I'll be able to write a follow-up column giving more of my experiences and those of other surgeons with the use of the laser.
