THE DIVINE CALL

"And the Lord came and stood forth, calling as at other times, 'Samuel!' And Samuel said, 'Speak for thy servant hears." (I Sam. 3:10)

Our sermon title is, "The Divine Call," Most often we hear this expression used in connection with the calling of a pastor or a teacher. Thi is the specific, narrow use of the term. The Old Testa-ment textabove inone sense speaks of God's call to Samuel. This was surely a divine call. He called him to proclaim his message to Eli. He continued to call Samuel into ministry throughout his entire life.

Another divine call from a broader perspective can be seen in the Gospel lesson:

"Then Peter spoke up. 'Lord,' he said, 'if it is really you, order me to come out on the water to you." 'Come!.' answered Jesus." (Matt. 14:28-29a)

This divine call was really a test of faith or a call to greater faith. But Peter let lear enter his heart and he began to sink. Jesus reached out and grabbed him and said, "How little faith you have! Why did you doubt?

Sometimes we look smugly down our noses at Peter's faltering faith. I wonder if any of us would even have ever left the boat?

Another of God's divine calls is to our parents to bring us to Baptism and worship. God has called us all to be priests. My priesthood or ministry as a pastor is different from yours in that I have a special respon-sibility for the public proc-lamation of the Word and the proper administration of Sacraments. But God has called us all on to His ministerial team, I am

the equipper, the coach, the trainer, a playing coach

in actuality, but we are all participants.

Too often Christians try to sneak off the playing field remove themselves to the sidelines and relegate their active role to that of church commentator, critic, or spectator. We have enough critics and spectators...we can never have enough players.

We all, individually, have a call to active ministry...to run some plays, score some points, to be a part of God's team, his plan for victory devil. The call is divine...for it is from God. We either stay in the boat or we venture forth in faith.

Collectively, as a congregation in the universal church of Jesus Christ . we have a call to provide for the proclamation of the Word of God and the administra-

tion of the Sacraments. We are called to reach out to the lost through evangelism.

We are called to provide and encourage Christian education for the young and

all ages. We are called to look after the elderly, to help the oppressed, to feed the poor, to clothe the naked, to seek justice where there is

injustice.

We are called to enjoy Christian fellowship and to encourage and support one another in the faith.

Our specific directions for the present and future come as we immerse ourselves in the Word of God and prayer. For through these two activities God's Spirit provides the specific gui-dance needed for the future.

The divine call continues to come to those who listen for it. It may not be as dra-matic as it was for Samuel or for Peter, but it is no less there for a faithful commun ity. "Speak to us, Lord, and give us the faith and courage to follow your commands."
