Hicksville's New Air Stripping Plant

The Board of Commissioners of the Hicksville Water District chose to make an official presentation of the facts and figures surrounding our new Air Stripping Plant located on Bethpage Road at our Plant One site. The Commiss-ioners Gilbert E. Cusick, Nicholas J. Brigandi, and Richard A. Humann, feeling that we are approaching a time when the plant tests and ultimate acceptance will enable them to throw open the doors by spring to the general public, and espe-cially the Hicksville residents, took the opportunity to make a presentation of the story to the New York State American Water Works Association in a Technical Session at Toronoto, Canada, on Sep-

A member of the Board of Governors of the American Water Works Association indicated that they did in fact believe the presentation as one of the finest if not best of its type. Considerable recognition was gained for the Hicksville Water District for its efforts Water District for its efforts on behalf of producing pure and potable water for our community and for opening new ways to go about the procedures. The State of New York, Department of Health, Office of Public health, in a letter dated Sep-tember 12, 1985, did thank the Board for its presenta-tion and stated "Your paper entitled "Air Stripping for Organic Removal" was both enlightening and well presented." Appreciation was expressed for the time and effort involved in the neces-sary preparation.

At the Annual Legislative Dinner at the Crest Hollow Country, Club in Jericho which was attended by more than twenty-five (25) Legislators or Aides, and approximately two hundred and fifty (250) water works pro-fessionals, the Hicksville Commissioners did call upon those present to sup-port or sponsor a broaden-ing of the gasoline spill legis-lation to include more hazardous materials dumped by gasoline powered vehicles. The Board has expressed its con-tinued concern because of the fact that four (4) years

ago - a truck caused a MEK (Methol Ethyl Ketone) spill in Hicksville-MEK is a pet-roleum derivative. The length of time of response by the Federal and State agen-cies to our request for clean-up did enable the MEK to spread underground. Des-pite the fact that more than a million dolairs was spent for removal, the Board feels that the MEK may still be there because recovery was minimal. If MEK had been gasoline-it would have been speedily cleaned up by the Department of Transportation. A minor change in the definition of petroleum derivatives will encompass many hazardous materials that are being spilled into our environment in and around New York State.

New Hearing Date Set on Permit For Van/Auto Refurbishing Business

The Oyster Hay Town Board has scheduled a new public hearing date of Tuesday, December 17, to consider a request for a special use permit to operate a van and auto refurbish-ing business in Hicksville, according to Town Councilman omas L. Clark.

"The Town Board had originally scheduled a hearing for Tuesday, October 8, on an application from Dawn Industries, Inc. and Frank J. Antun Properties. Inc., for a special permit to operate a business that will include the refurbishing of vans and motor vehicles, installation of sun roofs,

4-wheel conversions, and retail sale of automotive accessories in a 'G' general business district in Hicksville," Clark stated. "At the request of the applicant's attorney, the October 8th hearing was postponed. The Board has set a new hearing date of December 17, at 10 AM in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay."

Clark noted that the subject property is located on the north side of Old Country Road approximately 690 feet west of Newbridge Road in Hicksville.

Nature Walk in Muttontown

The mystery of self perpe-tuation in the plant world will be explained when naturalists at the Muttontown preserve Nature Center take visitors on a two hour nature walk, Saturday, November 16, from 10 A.M. to noon.

According to Nassau Recreation and Parks Commissioner Abram C. Williams, the faded blooms of summer leave behind a legacy of information illus-trating the process of species survival.

How plants travel from one location to another, why seeds always seem to return in a specific place and the special mechanisms availa-ble to flowers, shrubs and trees for scattering their seeds, will be discussed.

Seed dispersal insures the survival of the plant species from year to year. Visitors will learn that seeds travel by parachute, by catapult and by hitchhiking. During this exploration, participants may also enjoy the last vestiges of flowering beauty. This program is free, but

pre-registration is required. In case of heavy rain, an indoor slide show will substitute for the walk.

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These Five Proposals Will **Appear On Your Ballot**

Five amendments to the N.Y. State Constitution will appear on your ballot

on election day, as follows:
• Proposal No. 1. i passed, will increase the State Job Development Authority power, from \$300 million to \$600 million. It will also raise the limit of the JDA's legal participation in approved capital projects from 40% to 60%. The JDA sells these tax-exempt bonds to finance low interest business loans which encourages businesses to stay in our State and at the same time increases employment throughout the state. We plan to vote "Yes" on this Proposal.

 Proposal No. 2 would permit the N.Y. State Legislature to pass tax laws based on the IRS Code without quoting the relevant federal laws in their entirety, in the legislation. This should simplify the State tax law. We are in favor of this.

• Proposal No. 3 affects

the jurisdiction of the Court of Appeals. If passed this

Court could interpret N.Y. State law, for either the Fed-eral Courts or Courts of other States. We feel it is wiser to do this than to have no set standards covering such cases. We plan a "Yes" vote here.

 Proposal No. 4 would cover the issuance of Sinking Fund Bonds by Municipalities or School Districts. At present, except for iso-lated incidents, only serial bonds may be issued. The acceptance of this proposal would permit more flexibil-ity in these types of needed financing and would still be safe and attractive to most investors. We recommend a 'Yes" vote.

 Proposal No. 5 would repeal the ceiling of monies to be raised by school dis-tricts in cities of under 125,000 population. In order to keep efficient educational programs in exist-ence, this present ceiling has had to be circumvented in many areas. We favor a "Yes" vote here.

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regular Town Board Meeting on Oct. 29 at Town Hall East, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay. The following matters were addressed:

At a hearing for the Kelly At a nearing for the Kelly Organization, Inc. and John Merenda, for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O residence-office district at Clarissa Dr. and Old Country Rd., Hicksville, the peti-tioners were asking to rezone in order to convert a house into office space. The site plan which was submitted was questioned since it showed a two story structure with a dormer extending over the roof line. There was also opposition expressed from residents in the area. They felt that once the zone change was made, the rest of homes in the area could also be sold for commercial use They were also concerned with the fact that Mr. Kelly owns property adjacent to the house in question and may wish to expand. Decision was reserved on the

Decision was reserved on the petition of Edith M.
Wolloch, D/B/A Syosset
Eastern Clinical Laboratory & Leon Wolloch for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O district to maintain and use a profession office for a clinical laboratory or in the alternative for modification of restrictive covenants placed on the premises by Town Board Resolution dated 2 19 59 and 6 28 66 at the intersection of Lucille Dr. and Jackson Ave., Syosset Under the restrictive covenants set previously on the property. Mrs. Wolloch cannot lease the property or sell the established business. She is asking the Town Board to modify the restrictions so that the prop-erty can be used as a lab without the said restrictions.





The Oyster Bay Town Board has adopted a budget for 1986 which, for the fourth year in a row, holds the General Town Tax rate for homeowners at 87 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, according to Supervi-sor Joseph Colby. Colby said that, "the members of the Town Board

and I are extremely pleased with the efforts made by Department Heads and other Town officials to provide optimum services while keeping costs to a minimum. This has greatly assisted us in our efforts to maintain our low tax rate.

The General Town Budget - that budget which covers the entire Town --totals \$38,343,712. The 1985

The 1986 budget totally

eliminates the \$2.15 tax rate for the Sanitation Transfer

and Transport Expense.
The rates for the 1986 General Town Budget have been set as follows: Class 1 properties, 87 cents; Class II properties, 96 and 7/10ths cents; Class III properties, 95 and 2/5ths cents; Class IV properties, 95 and 3/5ths

Under the State law allowing Nassau County to establish four categories of property assessment, each with its own tax rate, allowable adjustments have been made to benefit homeowners. The slight increase/decrease in the different assessment classes is a reflection of the adjustment favoring homeowners and the amount of new construction

among the four categories.
Colby noted that the PartTown Budget (Planning,
Buildling, and Zoning),
which is not paid by property owners in villages, was
reduced by forreduced by 6 cents for homeowners. This reduc-tion offsets a 6-cent increase in the Highway tax, which is also not paid by property owners in villages.

The 1986 Part-Town Budget (Planning, Building and Zoning) totals \$2,868,956. The rates have been set as follows: Class I. 15 and 3/10ths cents; Class II. 15 and 9/10ths cents; Class III. 17 cents; Class IV. 17 cents. Property owners who live in villages do not pay this tax.

The 1986 Highway

Budget totals \$13,345,613. The 1985 total was \$12,644,964. This tax is not part of a homeowner's bill if part of a homeowner's bill if the property is in a village. The 1986 Highway rates have been adopted as fol-lows: Class 1, \$1.42 and 1/2 cent; Class 11, \$1.59 and 9/10ths cents; Class 11, \$1.57 and 1/2 cent; Class IV, Colby said that "for homeowners, the decrease in the Part-Town rate totally

the Part-Town rate totally offsets the slight increase in the Highway rate, so that residents who pay the Gen-eral Town, Part- Town and

Highway tax will pay the same total for those three taxes that they paid in pre-

vious years.

Colby added that the Town Budget document can only reflect information concerning a maximum of 14% of the average homeowner's total property tax bill. "The Town Budget book reflects the 9.27% of the tax bill that goes to local special districts and the 4.6% special districts and the 4,0% that goes to the General Fund. Part- Town and Highway Budgets." Colby explained. "If a resident's property is in a village, he or

she will pay only the General Fund portion of the Town's 4.6%, which is 1.63% of their total tax bill."

School districts, which made up 58% of the average mage up 36% of the average tax bill, prepare and adopt their own separate budgets. The County of Nassau, including its General Fund, Police District, Community College and Sewer Disricts. represents approximately 28% of the homeowner's tax bill. These figures appear in the budget prepared and adopted by the County.
