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Work Means Hope

"Work requirement is ongoing in Nassau County for eligible public assistance recipients," announced Nassau County Department of Social Services Commissioner Joseph A. D'Elia in describing the Employment Services implemented by his Department to help employable public welfare recipients attain independence and self-sufficiency.

D'Elia expressed appreciation to private industry in Nassau County for the enthusiastic support and encouragement provided to the County's TOPS (Training Opportunities for the Private Sector) project, initiated last year with New York State funding.

A review of 350 TOPS participants who were referred to jobs revealed

78% (275) remained employed after 90 days, D'Elia said, dispelling the myth that welfare recipients do not want to work. Sixty-eight percent (213) cases were completely closed to public financial assistance when a recent review was conducted of TOPS referrals.

The financial savings are significant as a result of these employment opportunities, according to Commissioner D'Elia. Prior to job placement, 350 TOPS recipients were receiving a total of \$143,569 monthly in public assistance grants. Ninety days after Job placement, 193 of them had zero dollar grants, and the partial assistance provided to the other 157 amounted

to \$46,050 for a monthly savings of \$97,519.

In addition, monthly food stamp allotments for the same recipients dropped from \$25,193 monthly to \$11,201, a savings of another \$14,000, bringing the total monthly dollar savings for these 350 individuals to over \$100,000, D'Elia said.

Equally important to the financial savings realized through the TOPS program, according to the Commissioner, is the "people enrichment." Welfare recipients become participating, self-supporting citizens, he said, with increased self-dignity and self-worth. "It is heartening to know people who were discouraged and depressed can re-enter the

mainstream, with new enthusiasm and spirit. Having a steady job can be a lifeline toward independence and fulfillment."

D'Elia lauded the Nassau County private employers who have supported the TOPS program, which he described as a true partnership between government and the private sector. Tax incentives are available to employers who offer jobs to public assistance recipients, helping to make the cooperative effort profitable for the businesses involved.

Commissioner D'Elia described the pre-employment training which is an important aspect of the employment services provided by the Department of Social Services to employa-

ble recipients. In a two-week classroom course, clients are introduced to subjects related to the world of work receiving instructions in completing applications and resumes, organizing a job search, and recognizing personal barriers and limitations. Special emphasis is placed on encouraging clients to become self-supporting, he said. Clients who successfully complete the training "graduate" to TOPS placement opportunities.

"Work experience" programs are another part of Nassau's Employment services, averaging over 100 people monthly who are referred to "work off" their public assistance grants for a limited period.

In reviewing employment statistics, D'Elia said, it is important to keep in mind that the percentage of welfare recipients who are coded "employable" is low. The majority of the Aid to Dependent Caseload is comprised of children under 16, and parent-caretakers of children under six years of age. In Nassau County for example, over 80% of the ADC caseload is in those two categories. Another 3% of the ADC caseload is already employed or in training full time, and therefore, does not require job referral. The total number of "employable" welfare recipients, which was over 1500 when TOPS began, has declined to less than 1100 today, a 30% decrease.

Beetles, Bugs, N' Butterflies At Gregory Museum

Insect life may be slowing down for the coming Long Island winter, but they're very much alive at the Hicksville Gregory Museum. At the second of the Museum's Fall Childrens' Nature Workshops, 9 to 12 year olds will discover just what keeps insects surviving and flourishing.

The 3:30 afternoon program on Nov. 15th, will help boys and girls understand how beetles, bugs and butterflies practice amazing camouflage and metamorphic feats in order to maintain themselves in man's and

nature's environment. There will be an opportunity to use microscopes and to make insect models, as well as to learn why these beneficial and harmful creatures are important in our environment.

The Childrens' Craft Workshop is open to all communities' youngsters and will take place in the Gregory Museum, a National Historic Courthouse-Jail, at Heitz Place, Hicksville. There is a registration fee. Children may be registered by telephoning 822-7505.



Fire Dept. Notice To All Residents And Business Establishments In The Hicksville Fire District

It was recently reported to the Fire Department here in Hicksville that a telephone solicitor insinuated to a local Home Owner that if they didn't give to the Fire Dept. (\$25.00 or more) it would affect their fire protection. This statement is an outright lie, high pressure sales tactic. The Hicksville and all other Fire Departments in most of the country respond to calls for assistance for rescue/fire situations in their assigned districts, regardless of place and residence if the person is in need of help. No records are kept, beyond the current fund drive year, if people who contribute or those that choose not to.

The Hicksville F.D. during its fund drive has a mailing list, a reminder second. Then what is unaccounted for is done by a uniformed member in person with a photo ID card. No tele-

phone contact is made unless requested.

Please take notice that the organization involved goes by several different names. The L.I. Vol. Fire Dept. Association, the Vol. Fire Dept. Assoc., General Productions Marketing Inc. all based on Long Island.

The solicitor goes on to say the money you pay can be used for an ad in a journal if you are in business. However, the journal is not widely distributed and is of no value to your business. The money donated in no way helps the local firefighters. It usually goes to an organization. The Hicksville F.D. makes its own donations to the organizations it belongs to and does not encourage or request residents to do so in their name.

Funds donated to the Department are used to run the 8 companies, Rescue

Squad and Haz. Mat team. Department operations which require us to re-donate the money donated to us. In short, the money that comes in goes back out to the community in the form of purchases or donations. The funds are used to make up the difference in loss of pay due to injuries, court appearances not covered by the state insurance.

Appendicitis is a Most Elusive Disease To Diagnose

We usually think of appendicitis as a disease of children. In fact it can occur in any age group from newborns to our most senior citizens. The appendix itself is a vestigial organ. This means that as we go up the evolutionary scale the appendix lost whatever function it had. In rabbits the appendix is quite large and functions as part of the rabbit's digestive process. In man the appendix looks like a skinny worm and is useless.

Appendicitis is an inflammation of the appendix. Making a diagnosis of appendicitis can be very tricky. Every medical textbook gives a specific set of symptoms and laboratory tests associated with appendicitis. These so-called textbook cases occur in only about 30% of actual cases. In the rest of the cases only some of the usual signs and symptoms will be present and the laboratory tests can vary. It is very important to realize that in the majority of cases there is no laboratory test or clinical sign to make a definite diagnosis. The diagnosis is basically a clinical diagnosis. This means that the physician evaluates the patient's signs and symptoms in association with the laboratory tests and gives his clinical judgment on whether the patient has appendicitis or not.

Untreated, an inflamed appendix can rupture. Usually the danger of rupture comes after 24 hours of symptoms. So the physician now besides making a clinical diagnosis must do so within 24 hours. In difficult cases, it is usually safer to err in the direction of removing a normal appendix than to allow an appendix to rupture. Any good surgeon will remove 10-15% normal appendices.

As parents and as patients ourselves, it is worthwhile to know the signs and symptoms of appendicitis. Hopefully this will get us to a physician earlier and cut down on the number of appendices that rupture.

The pain usually starts in the mid-portion of the abdomen as an ache; almost like any stomach aches might begin. Then within a few hours the pain shifts down to the lower right portion of the abdomen. The pain tends to be less when lying still and more when moving about. Pain is probably the most consistent symptom. It may be associated with nausea and vomiting. The bowel movements may be normal, soft, or loose, or the patient can be constipated. There is usually loss of appetite as the symptoms progress. The temperature is usually between 99.5 and 101.

There are many other symptoms that can be seen in appendicitis, but the ones mentioned are the major ones. Many diseases can simulate appendicitis in the early stage. It is the function of your physician to make this differentiation. So in closing, if you have any suspicion that you might have appendicitis or you have any abdominal pain which is persistent, see your physician promptly.

afforded veterans of other wars.

During the past year, veterans of Vietnam and the Korean War became eligible for property tax exemptions. Each municipality had the option of deciding whether they would offer the new "alternative exemption" - Oyster Bay immediately elected to do so. The new law made 20,000 more veterans eligible for exemptions because of wartime service. The option provides exemptions for service during a period of war, service in a combat area and a disability exemption for service-connected injuries.

The Town of Oyster Bay has also made a special effort, in other areas, to aid veterans of all wars. The Office of the New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs, located in Town Hall South, 977 Hicksville Road, Massapequa, has a wealth of information about programs for recently discharged vets, disabled veterans and the families of veterans.

Articles are sent to local newspapers for publication on a regular basis so that veterans can keep abreast of changes which may affect them, their families or eventual survivors. During the past year we have written about pension changes, filing discharge papers, insurance policies and tax benefits.
