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"Work requirement is on-going in Nassau County for eligible public assistance recipients," announced Nassau County Department of Social Services Commis-sioner Joseph A. D'Elia in describing the Employment Services implemented by his Department to help employable public welfare recipients attain independ-ence and self-sufficiency.

encouragement provided to the County's TOPS (Training Opportunities for the Private Sector) project, initiated last year with New York State funding. A review of 350 TOPS participants who were

employed after 90 days, D'Elia said, dispelling the myth that welfare recipients do not want to work. Sixty-eight percent (213) cases were completely closed to public financial assistance when a recent review was conducted of TOPS referrals.

The financial savings are significant as a result of these employment opportunities, according to Commissioner D'Elia. Prior to job placement, 350 TOPS recipients were receiving a total of \$143,569 monthly in public assistance grants. Ninety days after Job placement, 193 of them had zero dollar grants, and the partial assistance provided to the other 157 amounted

stamp allotments for the same recipients dropped from \$25,193 monthly to \$11,201, a savings of another \$14,000, bringing the total monthly dollar savings for these \$50 individuals for the \$50 individual als to over \$100,000, D'Elia

Commissioner D'Elia described the pre-employ-ment training which is an important aspect of the employment services pro-vided by the Department of Social Services to employable recipients. In a two-week classroom course, clients are introduced to subjects related to the world of work receiving instructions in

Nassau's Employment services, averaging over 100 people monthly who are referred to "work oil" their public assistance grants for a limited period.



Appendicitis is a Most Elusive Disease To Diagnose

We usually think of appendicitis as a disease of children. In fact it can occur in any age group from zens. The appendix itself is a ves-Ieifrey Sherwood.

endix is quite large and functions as part of the bbit's digestive process. In man the appendix looks like em and is usaless.

Appendicitis is an inflammation of the appendix. Making a diagnosis of appendicitix can be very tricky. Every medical textbook gives a specific set of symptoms and laboratory tests associated with appendicitis. These se-called textbook cases occur in only about 30% of actual cases. In the rest of the cases only some of the usual signs and symptoms will be present and the laboratory tests can vary. It is very important to realize that in the major-ity of cases there is no laboratory test or clinical sign to make a definite diagnesis. The diagnosis is basically a dinical diagnosis. This means that the physician evaluates the patient's signs and symptoms in association with the laboratory tests and gives his clinical judgment on ther the patient has appendicitis or not

Untreated, an inflammed appendix can rupture. Usually the danger of rupture comes after 24 hours of symptoms. So the physician now besides making a clinical diagnosis must do so within 24 hours. In difficult cases, it is usually safer to err in the direction of removing a normal appendix than to allow an appendix to rupture. Any good surgeon will remove 10-15% normal appendices.

As parents and as patients ourselves, it is worthwhile to know the signs and symptoms of appendicitis. Hopefully this will get us to a physician earlier and cut down e number of appendices that rupture.

The pain usually starts in the mid-portion of the abdoen as an ache; amost like any stomach ache might begin. Then within a few hours the pain shifts down to the lower right portion of the abdomen. The pain tends to be less when lying still and more when moving about. Pain is probably the most consistent symptom. It may be clated with nausea and vomiting. The bowel movements may be normal, soft, or loose, or the patient can be constipated. There is usually loss of appetite as the symp-toms progress. The temperature is usually between 99.5

There are many other symptoms that can be seen in appendicitis, but the ones mentioned are the major ones. Many diseases can simulate appendicitis in the early stage. It is the function of your physician to make this differentiation. So in closing, if you have any suspicion that you might have appendicitis or you have any abdominal pain which is persistent, see your physician promptly.

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
