The new officers took office on December 9th after being sworn in by Chairman Michael Krummenacker of the Board of Fire Commissioners. The swear-in was held a month early as the outgoing chief of department Owen W. Magee was appointed to the full position as Fire District Supervisor replacing ex-Capt. George Frey who is retiring. Chief Magee, a member of Engine Co. 7 for 28 years, including asst. chief 6 years and chief of department 2 years was presented his ex-chiefs badge by Board Vice Chairman Clifford Davis.

Chief William Schuckmann, Hicksville Water District Foreman and a member of the Department and Floodlight Heavy Rescue Co. 8 for 14 years served as Lieut. and Captain of Co. #8, Assistant Chief for the past 6 years, he will head a very busy Fire Department using 20 pieces of apparatus, 225 members responding to almost 1400 fire & rescue alarms per year plus hazardous material incidents in the heavily populated 7 sq. mile fire district. He will be assisted by 1st Asst. Chief Gerard O'Brien of Ladder Co. #1, 2nd Asst. Chief Terrance Farrell of Chemical Co. #3 who defeated ex-Capt. John Luft, Eng. Co. #7 in the election and 3rd Asst. Chief Pat Scanlon of Ladder Co. 6 who defeated ex-Capt. Robert Hammond of Ladder Co. #1 also running for the 3rd asst. slot.

Fire Unit In Accident Responding To False Alarm

Newly elected Hicksville Chief William Schuckmann responding to what later turned out to be a malicious false alarm at Kingston & Newbridge Rd. suffered minor injuries when his vehicle was in collision with a U.S. postal truck at Newbridge Rd. and West John St. on Dec. 11 at 5:35 PM. There were no other injuries.

Once again, the dangers of false alarms is apparent. Heavy traffic is an arch enemy of emergency response vehicles. It is imperative that the right of way (by law) be given immediately to emergency vehicles by moving to the right to allow safe passage. It is also important not to seal yourself in your vehicle to the point where you can't hear approaching sirens.

At the Town Board Meeting

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regularly scheduled Town Board Meeting on Dec. 17 at Town Hall East, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay. The following matters were addressed.

• The hearing for the application of Tilles Investment Co. for a change of zone to build 218 Townhouses and 124 single family homes on the north side of Jericho Tpke. west of Cedar Swamp Rd. in Jericho, was adjourned and rescheduled for Jan. 7, at 8 PM.

• Decision was reserved on the petition of Dawn Industries and Frank J. Antun Properties, Inc. at Old Country Rd., Hicksville, for a special use permit for an existing business to refurbish vans and install four wheel drive conversions. The business has been operating for 12 years but the owner was unaware of the need for a special use permit.

Three residents appeared in opposition to the petition. They are residents of the not very immediate area. They expressed complaints concerning the Honda motorcycle dealership in the same shopping complex. Their largest complaint was in reference to the noise generated by the dealership.

• Decision was reserved on the petition of Texaco for a special use permit for a change of zone from F business to G business and a special use permit to operate a service station on the north east corner of Jericho Tpke. and Woodbury Rd., Woodbury. There was no opposition to the application.

• Resolution # 1079 - Approved the site plan for Green Hill Holding Corp. and Melvin Decker doing business as House Beautiful in Woodbury.

• Resolution # 1080 - Approved the site plan submitted by Delco Development Corp. for a change of zone and special use permit in Hicksville.

• Resolution # 1081 - Approved a site plan submitted by Jesco of Hicksville south east of W. John St. and Burns Ave. to renovate and modify an existing gas station.

• Resolution # 1089 - Accepted the environmental quality review commissions findings on a petition of Isaac Taita and Mobil Oil Corp. for a change of zone and special use permit in Plainview on South Service Rd. adjacent to the Pickwick Motel and Galaxy Caterers.

• Resolution # 1093 - Awarded the contract and directed the consultant to proceed with the construction of storm drains and highway improvements in the Briarwood Lane area of Old Bethpage to Guy Pratt Inc. of Holtsville for the sum of \$1,578,171.

• Resolution # 1096 - Approved an increase in engineering fees for incidental repairs which were connected to the rehabilitation of the Plainview-Old Bethpage Pool Complex. The repairs were done after the season when the complex was closed. The cost was \$8,315.

• Resolution # 1100 - Approved the reappointment of Richard Evers of Hicksville and Jack R. Sumroy of Syosset to the Town of Oyster Bay Bi-Centennial Historical Commission. Their three year terms to expire Oct. 31, 1988.

• Resolution # 1102 - Authorized the Town Clerk to advertise a rehearing date of Jan. 28 for the petition of Allen and Susan Ross for a change of zone from Res. D to RO at the East side of South Oyster Bay Rd. and Wendell and

Home Energy Assistance Program

With the onset of winter weather, Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) reminded residents that they may be eligible for funded Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) grants.

"This state-supervised, locally administered program," Parola said, "is designed to help New York residents provide themselves and their families with adequate heat during cold weather."

According to Parola, eligible Nassau County residents should apply for assistance at the Unemployment Insurance Benefit Office in Hicksville.

- a gross monthly income of \$747 for a family of one;
- a gross monthly income of \$977 for a family of two;
- a gross monthly income of \$1,207 for a family of three;
- a gross monthly income of \$1,437 for a family of four;

People who are age 60 or older may mail their applications to the Nassau County Senior Citizen Affairs, or telephone 431-8531 for information. Those who are 60 or older or disabled may be eligible for additional HEAP benefits if their fuel or energy costs amount to more than 30 percent of their annual gross income.

"With the type of service that is provided under the HEAP program, I hope that none of my constituents will be cold this winter," Assemblyman Parola said. 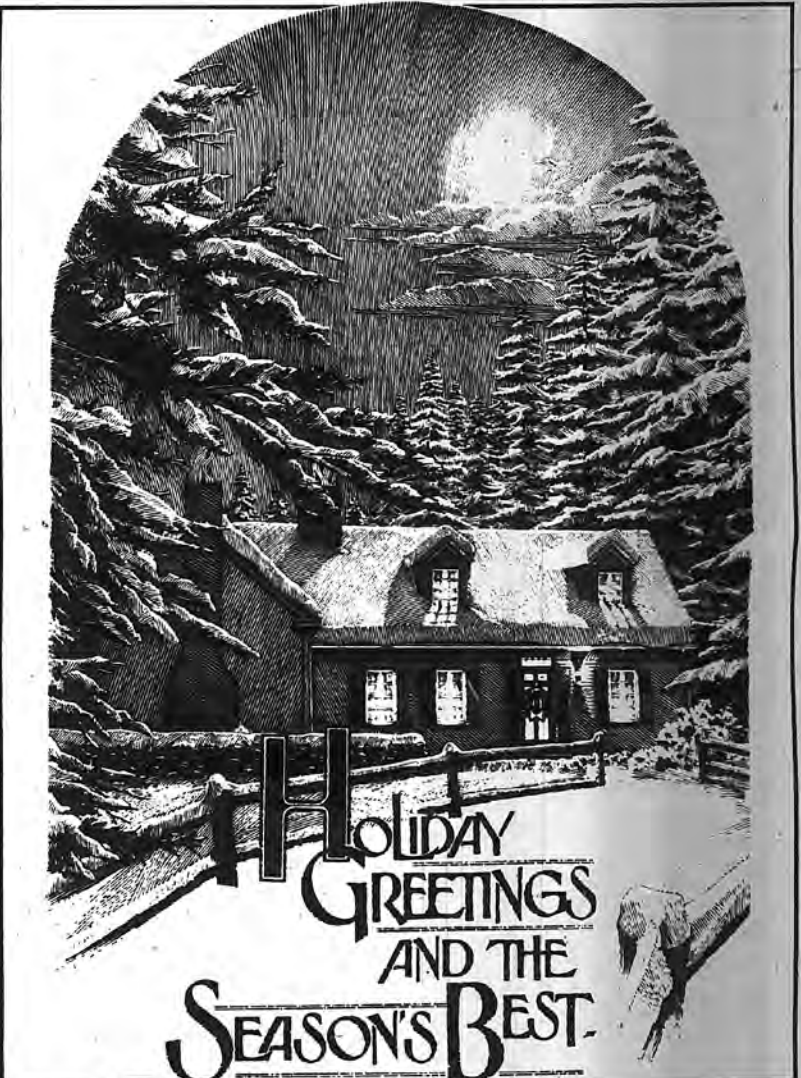

how touching it was to hear children direct their warmth and good hopes toward their fellow men and women.

Dr. Fenton also mentioned meeting with other district superintendents about the publication of the Comprehensive Assessment Report and the errors included. Ways of correcting errors with the state before the report is released to the media will be addressed. She also explained senior high class ranking procedures, noting that grades for physical education were included for in-house purposes like the Honor Roll and Principal's List but were excluded for outside purposes like college reporting or the National Honor Society, since it is the practice of colleges to exclude those grades in reviewing scores and class rank. Dr. Fenton's report concluded with a description of a career awareness program sponsored by the Boy Scouts in which speakers are provided for small groups or classes at the junior and senior high schools to discuss career opportunities. This program is offered during the evening on alternate years so that parents can also be involved in student's career planning and discussions.

Mr. Bennett addressed the Early Retirement Incentive Plan which offers three years of credit toward retirement benefits to eligible employees through a state law passed in 1984 and due to expire at the end of this year. Participation in the plan was rejected by the Board earlier, and Mr. Bennett noted opposition to the proposal by the New York State School Boards Association and the State Comptroller's Office and explained the cost impact of the program on the district. See the current issue of the Bulletin Board for more details about the Board's statement on the plan.

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Hicksville Board of Education Meeting

Hicksville students and teachers received warm words of praise and congratulations during the preliminary segment of Wednesday's Board of Education meeting. Mr. Bennett noted the success of the girls' swim team and the achievements of gymnast Tammy Marshall. (See the latest issue of the Bulletin Board for details.) He also praised the students and staff members responsible for an outstanding play, "Caught in the Villain's Web," which he described as amusing and professionally performed. The production was directed by drama teacher Judith Pasetiner with technical direction by James Quinlan. Mrs. Rudin echoed Mr. Bennett's comments on the play. Mr. Wolfson had attended "A Walk Down Memory Lane" at Burns Avenue and he praised Dr. Burke and Terry Wells for this outstanding presentation by students about their family histories. Mr. Nagle mentioned the beautiful window paintings created at the Post Office by high school art students and noted that residents and Post Office staff members enjoyed the fine work of decoration and that the students deserved more recognition for their efforts.

Mrs. Rudin mentioned her attendance at a conference on the subject of youth suicide sponsored by the Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association and proposed that information gathered at that meeting be shared with district residents through the newsletter. She also read a letter to the community apologizing for her initial support of the denial of transportation services to students declared ineligible under the new district map since she was unaware of an existing policy designating the official map to be used for measurement purposes which predated the new map. This policy was addressed later in the meeting and action will be taken at a subsequent meeting.

The adoption of policies led the action section of the meeting after a lengthy discussion on the titles and coding. A number of the policies dealt with student transportation and others addressed student rights and responsibilities and

removal, suspension, and expulsion. A regulation on the notification of a superintendent's suspension hearing was also adopted.

The Board approved curriculum projects completed during the summer on the elementary and junior high levels. These included the interdisciplinary units "Animals" (grade 4), "Immigration" (grade 5), and "Cities" (grade 6) and elementary gifted and talented units titled "It's the Law" and "That's Entertainment." The junior high level gifted and talented units include "Images," "Competition," "Forms," and "Time."

Other actions taken by the Board were the approval of the Town of Oyster Bay Recreation Grant application to continue the Hicksville Youth Activities Program, the designation of the Nassau County Police Department as the agency charged with performing fingerprinting and criminal record checks for bus drivers and bus aides, and approval of recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped generated at the meetings of November 20, November 26, and December 4. Personnel items and fiscal matters completed the action section.

Bids were awarded for playground equipment (\$10,537.50), custodial supplies (\$7,743.67), electrical supplies (\$5,733.76), physical education equipment (\$11,479.90), and athletic supplies for spring sports (\$14,883.85) for a total award of \$50,378.68. Transfer, warrant, and cash flow reports were also accepted.

During her report, the Superintendent told the Board about letters written by Dutch Lane second graders recording their wishes for the holidays. The letters were sent by school psychologist Dave Ferrin to a radio talk show, and a tape of the broadcast was played. The announcers read letters in which youngsters hoped for good health and happiness for others, peace and freedom, and food for the world's hungry. Dr. Fenton, and the talk show announcers, noted

Parola Announces Arson Prevention Grant
