

Home Energy Assistance Program

With the onset of winter weather, Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) reminded reisdents that they may be eligible for funded Home Energy Assistance Program (UEAN) (HEAP) grants.

"This state-supervised, locally, administered program," Parola said. "is designed to help New York residents provide themselves and their families with adequate heat during cold

weather.

According to Parola, eligible Nassau County residents should apply for assistance at the Unemployment Insurance Benefit Office in Hicksville.

"Our firelighters are the best prepared in the world, and it is only through cau-tions training that they may retain these high standards," Parola said.


