# Library Budget Vote Wed. April 16

On Wednesday, April 16th the Hicksville Public Library budget for 1986-87 will be submitted to the community. The proposed budget of \$1,210,251.16 is an increase of \$99,715.72 over the current operating budget. The new tax rate is estimated at \$.95. The cur-rent tax rate is \$.90. Library service will cost each homeowner from \$.80 to \$1.10 a week, depending on the assessed valuation of

By now, all residents should have received a copy of the budget in the mail. There are no unusually large increases in any category, excluding building mainte-nance. A series of disasters to the building complex during the past six months have led to the replacement, or pending replacement of a new furnace, roof and air conditioner at a cost esti-mated at more than \$150,000.00, or more than 10% of the library's total

budget. The book budget should provide for the needs of one of Nassau County's quality libraries, at a modest increase of 8%. The staff salaries show a small increase, reflecting a 5% general salary increase for 1986-87.

The Board of Trustees spent long hours fashioning a budget that should enable the community to enjoy quality service at a reason-able cost. Use of the library increased in all categories in

1985. Book circulation was up, reference questions kept our information department very busy, and our audio very busy, and our audio visual department, enjoyed tremendous use, mostly due to or audio and video cassette service. 

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

## Special Budget Issue

Dear Hicksville Residents:

The task of preparing the budget for the 1986-87 school year was a particularly difficult one this year. As always, the Board of Education and the Finance Committee reviewed each expenditure carefully to be sure that the budget was fiscally sound while also enough to provide for the level of educational programs that the community wants and expects from its schools. During this review process, we found dramatic increases in the cost of transportation and liability and health insurance. These substantial increases in areas beyond our control frustrated the efforts of the Board to minimize an increase in the tax rate, yet the budget presented here represents an increase of only 3.8% over last year's total. The budget of \$41,023,697 will require an estimated tax rate of \$25.48, a difference of \$2.04 compared to 1985-86.

The budget presented here for your information is aimed at maintaining an educational program which meets state mandates and Regents Action Plan requirements as well as goals set by the Board as part of a long-range plan. We present these figures for your study prior to the annual budget hearing scheduled for 8:15 pm on Tuesday, April 22, in the cafeteria of the high school. At that time, the public will have a last chance to be heard before the budget is presented to the voters on May 7. We hope you will attend and take part in this important process on behalf of the children of Hicksville.

### Calculating your Tax

In order to support the proposed 1986-87 school budget, the district must raise revenues through the property tax levy in the amount of \$29,617,597. This is the cost to Hicksville residents after applied surplus funds, state aid, and revenue from such local sources as interest, tuition, and income from health services has been deducted. This represents an estimated tax of \$25.48 per \$100 assessed valuation, or an increase of \$2.04 over last year's tax rate. Support Services These codes include the costs of attendance, guidance, and health services for regular schools as well as psychological services. District-wide attendance services for regular schools as well as psychological services. District-wide attendance services are included here. Guidance expenses cover salaries of department chairs, guidance counselors, and clerical assistance. Health services salaries include those of school physicians, school nurse-teachers, and clerical staff. Psychological services are provided to public and non-public school children to evaluate and identify children with learning problems or handicapping conditions, or to provide assistance to public requiring help in adjusting to school. Psychologists' and secretaries' salaries are budgeted here, along with the salary for one social worker. 

Co-curricular and Interscholastic Activities Activities covered in this section include plays, bands, orchestras, choruses, yearbooks, school newspapers, and the like, Also covered are ex-penses for activity sponsors, field trips, and supplies. Interscholastic expenses include coaches' salaries, athlatic equipment purchases and repairs, official fees, rental of training equipment, and costs for maintaining inter- and intrascholastic athlatic teams.



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
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
