Inside--Hicksville School Budget

Library Budget Vote Wed. April 16

On Wednesday, April 16th the Hicksville Public Library budget for 1986-87 will be submitted to the community. The proposed budget of \$1,210,251.16 is an increase of \$99,715.72 over the current operating budget. The new tax rate is estimated at \$.95. The current tax rate is \$.90. Library service will cost each homeowner from \$.80 to \$1.10 a week, depending on the assessed valuation of your home.

By now, all residents should have received a copy of the budget in the mail. There are no unusually large increases in any category, excluding building maintenance. A series of disasters to the building complex during the past six months have led to the replacement, or pending replacement, of a new furnace, roof and air conditioner at a cost estimated at more than \$150,000.00; or more than 10% of the library's total

budget. The book budget should provide for the needs of one of Nassau County's quality libraries, at a modest increase of 8%. The staff salaries show a small increase, reflecting a 5% general salary increase for 1986-87.

The Board of Trustees spent long hours fashioning a budget that should enable the community to enjoy quality service at a reasonable cost. Use of the library increased in all categories in

1985. Book circulation has up, reference questions kept our information department very busy, and our audio visual department enjoyed tremendous use, mostly due to or audio and video cassette service. Take some time to read the budget, and cast your vote on April 16th. Attention should be paid to this modest, but vital, community service.

The budget vote will be held at the library which has facilities for the handicapped.

BOND RESOLUTION DATED MARCH 25, 1986. A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF AN ADDITIONAL \$380,000 SERIAL BONDS AND \$20,000 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY A PART OF THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW PAVILION FOR TOBAY BEACH.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:
Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, is the construction of a new pavilion for Tobay Beach, including original furnishings,

equipment, machinery and apparatus and the grading and improvement of the site thereof.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is \$1,400,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of the \$950,000 serial bonds of said Town heretofore authorized to be issued by Resolution No. 753A-1980, dated August 12, 1980.

b) By the issuance of the \$50,000 capital notes of said Town heretofore authorized to be issued by Resolution No. 753A-1980, dated August 12, 1980.

c) By the issuance of an additional \$380,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

d) By the issuance of an additional \$20,000 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law, which together with the capital notes referred to in paragraph b) of this Section, shall constitute the down payment required pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 1(f) of paragraph a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year

sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, capital notes and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money; or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Massapequa Post, Bethpage Tribune, Plainview Herald and Locust Valley Leader, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law. (P-33-4-11-86)

At The Town Board Meeting

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regularly scheduled Town Board meeting on April 8, at Town Hall East, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay. The following issues were addressed:

• Decision was reserved on the petition of Grumman Data Systems Corp. and Industrial & Research Associates Company, for a special use permit to maintain a technical school within Crossways Industrial Park, Woodbury. There was no opposition to this request. Judy Jacobs of the South Woodbury Taxpayers Association spoke favorably of Grumman.

• Decision was reserved on the petition of Marion P. Lynch and Mobil Oil Corp. for a change of zone from Bus. F to Bus. G and for a special use permit to utilize the premises at Jericho Tpke. and South Oyster Bay Rd., Syosset for a public garage and gasoline filling station. The petitioner would like to change the location of the pumps presently at the station to face Jericho Tpke. instead of South Oyster Bay Rd. He would also like to place two canopies over the pump islands. There was no opposition to this request.

• Decision was reserved on the petition of Precision Mason Contracting Corp. & Phoenix Heritage, Inc. for a special use permit to maintain and operate a Maaco Auto Body Painting business at W. John St. and Kuhl Ave., Hicksville. Three residents of Kuhl Ave. spoke in opposition to this request. The residents stated that there is already an over-abundance of industrial type use in the area.

Special Budget Issue

Dear Hicksville Residents:

The task of preparing the budget for the 1986-87 school year was a particularly difficult one this year. As always, the Board of Education and the Finance Committee reviewed each expenditure carefully to be sure that the budget was fiscally sound while also enough to provide for the level of educational programs that the community wants and expects from its schools. During this review process, we found dramatic increases in the cost of transportation and liability and health insurance. These substantial increases in areas beyond our control frustrated the efforts of the Board to minimize an increase in the tax rate, yet the budget presented here represents an increase of only 3.8% over last year's total. The budget of \$41,023,697 will require an estimated tax rate of \$25.48, a difference of \$2.04 compared to 1985-86.

The budget presented here for your information is aimed at maintaining an educational program which meets state mandates and Regents Action Plan requirements as well as goals set by the Board as part of a long-range plan. We present these figures for your study prior to the annual budget hearing scheduled for 8:15 pm on Tuesday, April 22, in the cafeteria of the high school. At that time, the public will have a last chance to be heard before the budget is presented to the voters on May 7. We hope you will attend and take part in this important process on behalf of the children of Hicksville.

Calculating your Tax

This is the cost to Hicksville residents after applied surplus funds, state aid, and revenue from such local sources as interest, tuition, and income from health services has been deducted. Transportation of children to public, private, and parochial schools outside of the district is provided up to the New York State mandate of 15 miles. Transportation of handicapped students is mandated by state law up to 50 miles.

Code 7000-8000: Community Services

The district takes an annual census to keep Pupil Personnel Services up to date and to help ascertain the extent of available state and federal aid for students based on district population and attendance. This budget code provides for the maintenance of district mailing lists, registration of Kindergarten children, student records, and operation of attendance records. Also included are salaries for the Youth Program and contractual services from the Gregory Museum. Clerical staff and expenses for materials and supplies are also covered by this code.

Code 9000: Undistributed Expenses

This category includes employee benefit expenditures, transfer funds, and debt service. Employee benefits are mandated and regulated by negotiated contracts. Capital fund projects are funded in the transfer fund codes. Debt service expenditures are also mandated and represent the costs incurred to retire scheduled long-term debt payments. They also include the costs of short-term borrowing to meet cash flow requirements.

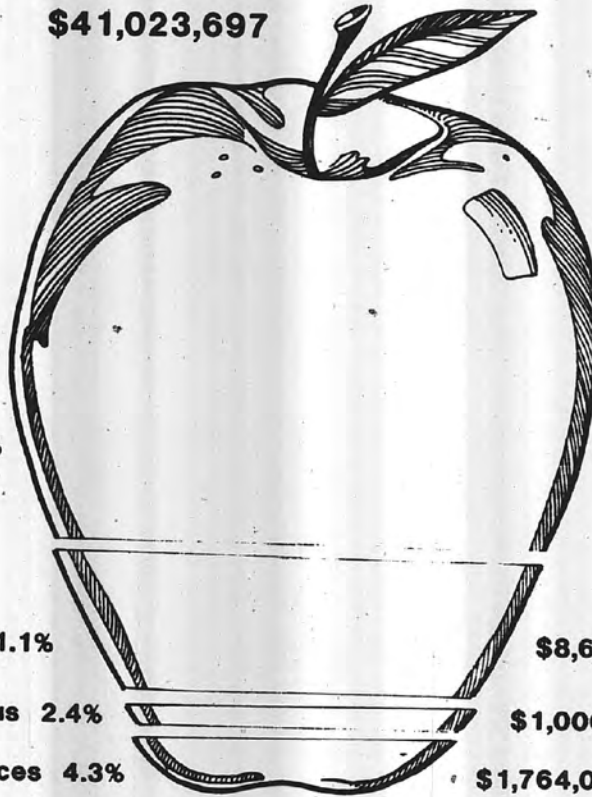

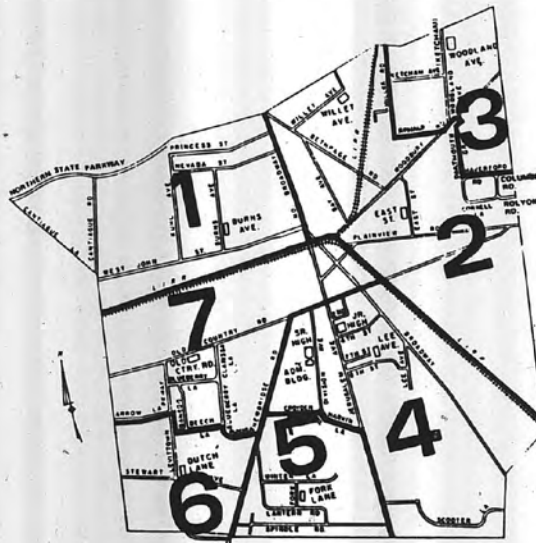
