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## A Letter From Our Fire Dept. Chief

To the Editor

As Chief of the Hicksville Fire Department I am concerned about the article of April 4, 1986 on the front page of the MID ISLAND HERALD, titled "Members of the Hicksville Fire Department Go On Record". I want to express my concern, because the members of Co. #6 and other members took it upon themselves to represent the whole Department in their article in the HERALD. This issue which came out in the paper never came to the Department for a vote. What was said in the article did not represent the entire Department, but a Company and some other individuals within the Department but not the Department as a whole. These individuals are concerned about a problem with the purchasing of a new ladder truck. The fact that they used the Department's name, officers and

## Citizens Rally At Giese Park

On Sunday, April 13th at 11:00 AM a rally of concerned citizens was held at Giese Park to discuss alternatives to the park construction plans of the Town of Oyster Bay. The major purpose of the rally was to organize these residents and to inform them that there are other viable alternatives for this property.

There was overwhelming agreement to create a park, but strong opposition to the Town's proposal, which included 2 soccer fields and bathroom facilities. The residents voiced strong disapproval to this kind of park located in the middle of their neighborhood. Of utmost concern was the problem of loitering and vandalism because of the proposed bathroom facility. They objected to the noise and traffic congestion such a park would create.

An alternative design for a park in this location was

presented by an impromptu Committee led by Thomas McGovern, a resident in the park area. These plans include 1 soccer field, a leisure area, and did not include bathroom facilities.

There were a great deal of constructive and creative suggestions from the people. One of the key suggestions was to move the Police Transfer Station 2 blocks, from Broadway and Farm Lane to a newly-proposed park entrance.

Petitions were signed by over 70% of the 80 people in attendance, opposing the Town's plan, and supporting the new proposal. Due to the strong show of support by the community, Mr. McGovern and the committee plan to organize and pursue this issue.

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# Parola, Merino & Levy Secure Funding For Viet Vets Center

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh), Sen. Ralph Marino (R-Oyster Bay) and Sen. Norman Levy (R-C, Merrick) announced that they have secured record state funding for the Vietnam Veterans Resource Center in Hicksville.

"This \$105,000 appropriation is vital to the needs of hundreds of area veterans throughout Nassau County who use the Center's services," said Parola. "Since

opening in April 1985, the Center has provided group and individual counseling to Vietnam-era veterans and their families."

The legislators noted that the funding this year will go towards the hiring of two full-time social workers and two part time employees to meet the increased demand for the Center's services. The hope is also that satellite offices can be established in other communities to make

services more convenient to Vietnam veterans and their families throughout Nassau County.

"The Center's trained staff now counsels an average of 100 veterans and their families each week on matters ranging from post-combat trauma and substance abuse to employment and veteran's program referrals," said Sen. Marino. "Over the past year," said

Sen. Levy, "the Center has shown its priceless value to veterans who have given so much to the protection of our country. Continued funding for the Vietnam Veterans Resource Center in Hicksville is a show of this state's appreciation for their brave efforts."

The lawmakers pledged to continue to search for new funds to aid in further expansion of the Center.

## Town Board Approves Special Use Permit In Hicksville Imposes Sixteen Restrictive Covenants

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan announced that the Town Board has granted a special use permit to operate a van and auto refurbishing business in Hicksville.

Hogan said, "At a public hearing held by the Town Board on December 17, 1985 the applicants, Dawn Industries, Inc. and Frank J. Antun Properties, Inc.,

requested a special use permit to operate a business that will include the refurbishing of vans and motor vehicles, installation of sun roofs, 4-wheel conversions, and the retail sale of automotive accessories in a 'G' general business district. The premises is located on the North side of Old Country Road approximately 690 feet west of Newbridge

Road in Hicksville.

"In approving the special use permit the Town Board imposed sixteen restrictive covenants," Hogan said, "specifying that all operations will be conducted inside the building so as to eliminate noise emanating from metal cutting, pneumatic-type drills and tire changes. The hours of operation will be

limited to 9 AM to 6 PM (Monday through Saturday) and 9 AM to 8 PM on Friday evenings. No Sunday hours will be permitted."

A certificate of occupancy will not be issued to the owner until a site plan has been submitted and approved by the Town Board.

## Arbor Day

Thanks to the combined efforts of the Long Island Nurserymen's Association and the country agents at Cooperative Extension, schools, libraries and organizations throughout Nassau County will have flowering Linden trees to plant in observance of Arbor Day, April 25.

The Lindens, which are excellent shade trees ideally suited for this area, were supplied by the L.I. Nur-

seriesmen's Assoc. at cost and were offered for sale at a nominal charge. The Cooperative Extension gardening experts provided the know-how for the planting and care of the trees which can grow to a height of 60 feet at maturity.

Arbor Day has been celebrated in America since 1872 when it was founded by J. Sterling Morton, a former United States Secretary of Agriculture, who wanted to

establish an organized planting method of tree planting throughout his adopted state of Nebraska, Nebraska, at that time, was practically treeless over most of its area.

Morton loved trees for their beauty and for their contribution to an enjoyable environment. He planted the grounds of his home, "Arbor Lodge", with rare and exotic trees from all

over the world. "Arbor Lodge" is now a Nebraska State Park where the trees Morton planted more than a century ago are still vivid and enjoyed.

 b) By the expenditure of \$1,483,600 current funds of said Town, of which \$491,600 current funds shall be allocated to the class of objects or purposes specified in subdivision a of Section 2 hereof, of which \$235,000 current funds shall be allocated to the class of objects or purposes specified in subdivision b of Section 2 hereof, of which \$200,000 current funds shall be allocated to the class of objects or purposes specified in subdivision c of Section 2 hereof, of which \$370,500 current funds shall be allocated to the class of objects or purposes specified in subdivision d of Section 2 hereof, and of which \$186,500 current funds shall be allocated to the class of objects or purposes specified in subdivision f of Section 2 hereof.

# LI Studies Institute Opens At Hofstra U.

The Long Island Studies Institute, the largest repository anywhere of data pertaining to Long Island history, will officially open on Monday, April 21, through the joint efforts of Nassau County and Hofstra University.

County Executive Francis T. Purcell and Hofstra President James Shuart, announced that the facility, which is located on the 9th floor of the Hofstra library in Hempstead, will serve both students, historians and the general public.

"These combined efforts enable us to provide one of the finest historical reference facilities anywhere on the local level," said Nassau County Executive Purcell.

According to President Shuart, "The Institute will be a valuable resource for

scholars and an important repository for archives dealing with Long Island history. Above all, we hope to serve the Long Island community by increasing the awareness of Long Island's unique past and present."

The Long Island History Collection of the Nassau County Museum Research Library was formerly located at Eisenhower Park in East Meadow. Combining the two collections allows the institutions to develop a strong program of educational services to record, interpret and stimulate research in Long Island Studies, according to Recreation and Parks Commissioner Abram C. Williams.

The Hofstra collection includes the James N.

MacLean Nassau County American Legion Memorial Library of New York State History. Also included are a sizeable collection of Long Island and New York materials, including the standard histories, published town records, old maps, the New York State Census (1855-75), a Walt Whitman collection, and microfilm archives of Newsday, The New York Times, The Long Island Star and the Queens County Centennial.

The Nassau County Museum Collection contains printed sets of Town records, the Nassau County Board of Supervisors proceedings, and all of the rare early 19th Century histories of Long Island. The collection's holdings also include 20,000 photographs by

important 19th Century photographers like Henry O. Corten, George Brainard and Rachel Hicks. The combined map collections will provide an unrivaled series of cartographic views of Long Island from the *Belgica et Anglia Nova* map of 1665 to present day atlases.

The archival collection, which were founded in the 1950's by the Nassau County Historical Society, contain many original colonial land patents and deeds, including Indian grants from the 1660's and '70's. There are extensive 17th- and 18th-Century records of individuals and families and documentary archives of local organizations such as the Merrick and Jamaica Road Company and Queens County Agricultural Society.

members to represent their whole group was an error on their part.

I want to reassure the Hicksville Community that the fire service and the functioning of my Department has not changed as a result of this conflict. We continue to function as a unit at fire and rescue calls.

It is important for the Community to know that the Hicksville Fire Department is made up of eight companies which is run by the Officers and the Chiefs. As Chiefs and Officers we do not have the power to purchase apparatus, equipment or items which we need for the fire service. We can only suggest what we would like to have and the Board of Fire Commissioners of the Hicksville Fire District have the power to purchase these items.

It is my hope that a vehicle can be purchased to replace the 24-year-old vehicle with a new vehicle which can meet the needs of the Department. I hope that this can be resolved quickly between the Board and the concerned members. The Chiefs of this Department do feel that a different piece of apparatus (ladder truck) would better meet the needs of this Department from our point of view.

I hope that this letter clears up some of the confusion about this problem.
