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A highlight of the New York Section AWWA, Spring meeting (April 15-18, 1986), held at the Albany Hilton Hotel, Albany, New York, was the presentation of a service to Water Industry Award to the Hicksville Water District.

The award was made to Gilbert E. Cusick, Chairman of the Hicksville Water District, representing the Members of the Board, Nicholas J. Brigandi and Richard A. Humann. Mr. Cusick, then followed the presentation with a most impressive talk acknowledging the efforts of all who had served and continue to do so in order to bring quality water to the citizens of Hicksville. His comments were received with generous applause from the Water Works people assembled.

Mr. Cusick is pictured above (on the right) showing the award to Mr. August A. Guerrero, Chairman of the New York Section Board of Governors and to Louis G. Dettloff, Administrative Assistant to the Hicksville Board of Commissioners. The award was given for fifty (50) years of support to the American Water Works Association.

Hicksville Board of Education Meeting

Hicksville Board President William Bennett began Wednesday evening's meeting with words of commendation for the staff members and students involved in the induction ceremonies for the National Junior Honor Society which he attended at the Junior High School. He spoke of the new inductees as the "leaders of tomorrow" and noted that they started early in showing individual initiative and other qualities which led to their selection, and he extended his praise to students at the Senior High School who have also been elected to the National Honor Society. Mr. Bennett thanked staff members Louise Higgins and Marie Marshall for their participation in organizing a very dignified and beautiful ceremony.

Mr. Bennett also asked those assembled to remember Board Trustee Jay Schwartz and Woodland Avenue teacher Elaine Kabakoff in their prayers, extending condolences to both on the loss of their fathers.

The Annual Budget Hearing was the first item in the action section, and the Board's review led to recommendations totaling \$56,000 from the general support codes. Noting that "the buck stops here," Mrs. Rudin moved that \$3,000 be removed from the Board of Education code, and Mr. Bennett recommended reductions of \$13,000 for oil and gas and \$40,000 from general maintenance reflecting unfilled positions. In reviewing the budget process, Mr. Bennett discussed the dramatic increases in transportation, liability insurance, and health insurance which had an impact on the budget. These costs are beyond the control of the district, and they hampered efforts to minimize increases from last year's budget.

After the reductions were adopted, the Board approved the following budget which will appear on the ballot on May 7:

Based on this figure, the estimated tax rate will be \$25.43 and the increase over last year's rate is \$1.99.

Following the budget adoption, the Board proceeded to other items in the action segment of the meeting, approving a curriculum project on British literature for the Senior High, a resolution to set the level of liability insurance limits, and the extension of a transportation contract. Warrant, transfer, and cash flow reports were also approved. Bids were awarded for districtwide furniture, art supplies, general classroom and office supplies in the amount of \$123,030.53.

In further actions, the Board approved the school calendar for the 1986-87 school year. School will open for students on September 3, and June 19 will be the last day of school. The complete school calendar will be issued in August.

A resolution was adopted by the Board to authorize the Superintendent to retain the services of experts in identifying those responsible for anonymous letters received by the

Board and Dr. Fenton.

The Board also established school hours for all elementary schools and for students in grades 1 through 6 beginning in September. All schools will begin at 9:00 am and end at 3:30 pm. Morning Kindergarten classes will run from 9:00 to 11:45 am and afternoon classes will begin at 12:45 pm and end at 3:30 pm.

Recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped generated at the meetings of March 12 and 26 were approved, and a regulation for measuring distance for the purpose of student transportation was adopted.

The information section began with the Superintendent's Report. Dr. Fenton explained that the annual twenty-fifth anniversary celebration for staff members will take place at 8:00 pm on May 28 before the monthly Board meeting. At that time, awards of achievement to staff members and plaques commemorating our retirees will also be presented.

The Superintendent also gave an update on plans for the Hicksville Spring Festival to be held from June 2 through June 5. In addition to exhibits and activities in the elementary buildings, series of districtwide activities have been planned. Musical performances will be held on the lawn of the Junior High School during lunch hour and in the evening featuring both student and community performing groups. In addition, small groups from all levels will perform at the Milleridge Inn. An art exhibit at the Junior High will include student work as well as work submitted by community residents. An opening reception will be held on June 2. From the world of music and drama, students will perform excerpts from the productions staged this year, completing a full schedule of exciting events to showcase the talent and achievement of the students and community of Hicksville.

The Superintendent's Report concluded with a review by Dr. Couillard of the course tally sheets at the Junior and Senior High Schools which show enrollment figures for courses offered. This document will assist the district in staffing for the coming year.

The meeting ended with the presentation of a regulation regarding long-term substitutes for information and a policy on smoking at Board meetings and on school premises for hearing. The policies on smoking will come before the Board for adoption at the May 28 meeting.

Congratulations to Michael Dunn, newly appointed Assistant Principal at Lee Avenue School. Mr. Dunn, a magna cum laude graduate of Queens College, comes to Hicksville from the Wantagh schools, where he developed K-6 science curriculum materials and was involved in intramural coaching in addition to his fourth grade teaching duties. He has also written a social studies book for fourth graders.

The annual Budget Vote and Election will be held on May 7, and the next regular meeting of the Board is scheduled for May 18 at 8:15 pm.

Professional Assoc. Meets At Hicksville I.N.N.

On April 16, a meeting of the Lutheran Professional & Business Association was held at the Hicksville I.N.N. Over a year ago this organization, led and directed by the Rev. Theodore S. Grant of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Hicksville, was instrumental in establishing the branch of the Interfaith Nutrition Network, known as Hicksville I.N.N., now referred to as the local "soup kitchen." Each day a substantial lunch is served to the homeless and hungry people who come. The Professional Association visited the Soup Kitchen and "bought" their lunches, as an opportunity to see first hand the project they had investigated. At this meeting, those present voted to make a sizable donation to the continuance of this good work.

The Soup Kitchen is open daily at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church at 130 Jerusalem Ave., Hicksville. A Board of Directors has now been established to handle the administration of this project, to raise funds and to solicit donations of food, sundries and personal time.

It is a grateful endeavor - even an hour or two that anyone can spare is very much appreciated and gives the donor that indescribably "good feeling," that comes from giving some part of yourself to someone less fortunate. No one is too big or too small to be needed and play an important part in this project. One of our most constant workers is a prominent Hicksville attorney who gives one lunch hour a week to work in the kitchen. He rolls up his shirt sleeves, ties on an apron

over his proper three piece suit and washes pots and soup!

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Parola Calls For Public Referendum On Public Takeover Of LILCO

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) said that legislation now in both houses of the state Legislature would, if enacted, allow a public takeover of the Long Island Lighting Co. (LILCO) and formation of a Long Island Public Power Authority — all without a single vote from you!!!

Such a delicate issue with long-range effects must be decided by Nassau County residents, who have long suffered through skyrocketing utility costs. It should not be used as a political tool by state legislators, many of whom have no concept of what conditions are like on Long Island," said Parola. "Before any such legislation for public power is considered for Long Island, we should await reports by two commissions that are now

preparing recommendations on "LILCO. One of the commissions was convened by the governor at a cost of \$500,000; the other was authorized by Nassau County Executive Francis Purcell. Certainly, any action must await the reports from these expert groups," added the assemblyman.

According to Parola, creation of a public power authority also must satisfy the following conditions:

1. The key standard to be applied to determine if public power is to be implemented is whether a takeover is the best solution available to reduce rates and to rescue Long Islanders from excessive power costs that have become prohibitive.

2. Any public power

authority must not be a "bail-out" of Suffolk County and its governments and school districts, which will seek tax credits for revenues lost as a result of public power replacing LILCO's taxable real property.

3. A reduction in rates due to public power must not be attained as a trade-off for Long Island's fair share of reallocated hydropower, which is crucial to truly realizing meaningful reductions of rates in the future. In fact, Long Island's efforts for a greater share of water power must be intensified.

4. LILCO and its management must be held accountable for their imprudence in building Shoreham, which has already been assessed at about \$1.4 billion by the

state Public Service Commission (PSC) of the plant's total cost of \$4.5 billion.

"There has been much talk that the legislation now in the state Legislature for consideration will save Long Island ratepayers \$700 million annually. While this MAY be so, it is ludicrous to even consider such a measure while we await the

commission reports." "After results on the feasibility of public power are outlined in these reports, we will have a better understanding of what is actually being discussed. Long Islanders should then decide by referendum, following a full airing of the issue, whether or not public power should replace LILCO," concluded Assemblyman Parola.

displays will give better, more useful, information to flight crews.

"Grumman has helped make Long Island a recognized leader in the field of aerospace technology, and we congratulate them on this award," Lent and D'Amato said.

Many single parents, young adults living on limited incomes, as well as families in financial difficulty can testify to the fact that they were able to get help, and consequently their lives enriched, by the work done at the ECC. Due to staff flexibility, both day and evening hours are available, a factor which is particularly helpful to those on rotating shifts.

Since individuals seek help at mental health agencies for intimate and personal problems and family difficulties, which are rarely shared with others, the valuable role that psychotherapy services can play may easily pass unnoticed in the community. Yet all such agencies see a need for publicity regarding the value of such programs, to make others aware that help is available and that they are not alone.

The Most Wonderful Gift

One of the things that most young children fear are monsters. Unlike the imagined monsters of children, the early church had a real monster of its own. It was a most deadly enemy that roamed about. The monster was the notion that Christ alone was not adequate for a person's salvation. And this monster gave birth to another monster, the monster of uncertainty over our own salvation. Both monsters were real—both were the devil. Unfortunately, both monsters are still very much with us today. To solve the salvation puzzle we must kill the monster of uncertainty that suggests we trust in something other than Christ alone for our salvation.

A few years ago, as part of my Doctor in Ministry pro-

gram, I surveyed a large sample of our congregation. I was amazed to discover that so many were puzzled over the crucial question of their eternal life. Only half of you reading this feel certain that if you die tonight that you will be with God in heaven when Christ returns, and base certainty on faith in Jesus Christ alone. The devil that roamed freely in the early church is still with us.

Brothers and sisters, our salvation is unreasonable, and this is what causes much of our puzzlement. We have been trained from childhood on up that we must work out our own problems and map out our own destiny. To think that God's salvation is a pure gift, won for us by God's actions and affected without any help or aid from us, militates against our. "Pull yourself up by your

own bootstraps" philosophy. Secondly, it smacks us where we hurt the most, right in our pride. Adults are hesitant about accepting gifts which they know they have not earned or merited. We do not want to feel obligated to anyone. It is not an easy matter for us to come before Almighty God when he wants to give us the most wonderful gift of eternal life. It takes a humble person to make such a confession from his heart and to stand totally dependent on God.

Thirdly, for most of us, everything that we have has a price tag upon it. Then we are confronted with the strange news of a gospel which declares that God's salvation is a free gift. Our experience with every other valuable gift causes us to stop and think, "Is that reasonable?" There must be a hidden cost, a string at-

ached, we must have to do something. How does God really give us something so wonderful for nothing?

In the survey of our congregation I mentioned earlier, we also asked our people, "If you were to die tonight and stood before God and He were to ask you, 'Why should I let you into my heaven?' what would you answer him?" Take a second, think about it. Let me share with your some answers we received: "I don't know." "I've lived a Christian life, loving and caring for my fellow man." "I am a good person and love to help others." "I've tried my best to do what you have expected of me." What is the common element in all these answers—it is "I"—it is what I have done.

The Bible says, "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and this is not your own doing, it is a gift of God, not because of works, lest any man should boast." Heaven is a most wonderful gift, it is not something earned or deserved, it is only received by faith.

Celebrated Anniversary

The Ecumenical Consultation Center, a non-profit counseling center, located at 30 Grand Avenue, Hicksville, recently celebrated the 13th anniversary of the reception of its charter from the state of New York.

Founded in 1973, under the auspices of the Ecumenical Council, comprised of the religious community in Plainview, Hicksville and Bethpage, the center was created to fill an existing need in the area. A study had previously been done in 1972, which revealed that gap existed in mental health services. Local clinics were available to serve those families whose income met their particular guidelines and private therapists were in the area to help those able to provide higher fees. However, many families in the middle income range then faced a dearth of services.

The ECC was formed to provide high quality professional care to meet the needs of those individuals.

Once the need for such a facility was established, a search was instituted to find appropriate headquarters for such a center. This proved difficult due to the high rentals required for offices in most existing buildings. However, at that time St. Stephen's Lutheran Church owned a house on Grand Avenue, which in the past had served as church offices, but was then vacant. The congregation generously offered this house to the ECC rent free, and it has served as its location ever since. This extension of the St. Stephen's ministry perhaps passes unnoticed in our community even today.

Then an appeal was made to local churches. Volunteers from the congregations immediately offered to paint and help furnish the center. Rugs, chairs, desks and other items were donated by local citizens. Indeed it was only through the initial support of the people of this area that the concept of the ECC was brought to reality.

Over the years, the Ecumenical Consultation Center has continued to play an everwidening, active and unique role in the social service network of our communities. From an original staff of 4, under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Roland J. Perez, then Pastor of St. Stephen's and Rev. Dr. Theodore S. Grant, Pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church, and a trained social worker and Adjunct Profes-

sor at Yeshiva University, the agency has now increased to a staff of 14 licensed/certified professionals. This staff provides a wide range of services such as individual and family counseling, premarital and marital therapy, help with parent-child problems and school difficulties.

The uniqueness of the ECC is made possible by the flexibility and creativity that its status as a private non-profit agency allows. Cognizant that a sense of urgency and often desperation is very real to the individual or family in difficulty, the services at the ECC are designed to offer immediate help. In order to permit maximum flexibility and responsiveness to need, the board of the ECC, at the time of its inception, made a decision not to receive government funding.

The ECC has over the years held meetings with clergy, health professionals, school psychologists and other school personnel to ascertain the services needed. It is significant to note that ECC was a pioneer in developing bereavement programs, in its work with parents of leukemia victims. In addition, several years ago, the agency instituted a workshop for clergy of Nassau and Suffolk counties designed to address the plight of the depressed and suicidal adolescent. ECC recognized that clergy were often the first professionals contacted when parents were worried about a depressed teenager. Dr. Herbert J. Levowitz, of SUNY, Stony Brook Medical School and Long Island Jewish Hospital, as keynote speaker for the conference, provided clergy with the knowledge and skill to enable them to provide help and direction to such distressed families.

The ongoing groups for "Caregivers of Aging Parents" and mothers of nursery school children, as well as the clergy and family consultation services are only a few of the ways the ECC endeavors constantly to add new programs to meet changing needs. As school districts made us aware of their search for psychotherapists with a fluency in Spanish, a new bilingual service was added to ECC.

Due to the graciousness of St. Stephen's Church, and consequently the low over-

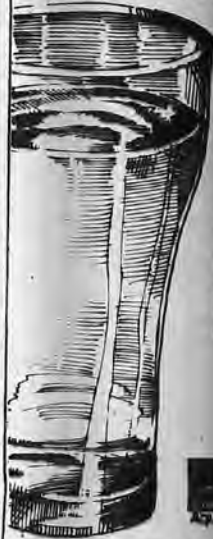
