## Create-A-Van Requests Special Use Permit

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Angelo A. Delligatti announced that the Town Board has scheduled a May 20th public hearing on a request for a special use permit in Hicksville.

Delligatti said, "The applicants, Create-A-Van, as lessee and Michael P. La Torre, as owner, are requesting a special use permit for the sale and leasing of vans,

the daily rental of vans and the uplifting of luxury vans."

The property is located at 894 South Broadway in Hicksville.

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, May 20, beginning at 10 AM in the Town Hall East hearing room on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay.

## Hicksville School Budget Vote And Election

On May 7th the residents of Hicksville will be voting for the School Budget, two School Board Candidates and a Proposition to change the current transportation mileage.

The Budget for the 1986-87 school year is in the amount of \$40,967,697. The estimated tax rate will be \$25.43, an increase of \$1.99 over last years figure which

was \$23.44 per \$100 assessed valuation. \$56,000 was cut from the original proposed budget at the April 23 School Board Meeting. These cuts were made when \$3,000 was deleted from the Board of Education Code; a \$13,000 reduction from the oil and gas budget was made and a \$40,000 cut was made from the general maintenance budget.

The voters will also be voting for two School Board Candidates. Mrs. Carole Wolf and Mr. Daniel Arcan will be running unopposed for the two seats being vacated by Mr. Lawrence Wolfson and Mrs. Arlene Rudin.

On this years ballot, there will be a proposition to extend the current transportation limits to students in

K-6 in excess of one half mile and the students 7-12 in excess of one mile effective in the 1986-87 school year at an additional cost not to exceed \$350,000.

The voting will take place from 10 AM to 10 PM at Burns Ave., East St., Woodland Ave., Lee Ave., Fork Lane, Dutch Lane and Old Country Road Schools.

Nassau Police Commissioner Samuel J. Rozzi honored 20 civilians, who aided police in making arrests or assisted other people in danger, in ceremonies on April 23, in Police Headquarters.

Commissioner's Civilian Awards went to people who "willingly placed themselves in jeopardy" to help others or assist in the arrests of criminal suspects, according to Rozzi.

and their fellow man. Their bravery, alertness and willingness "to get involved" is a tribute to them and their families."

Among the award winners were:

ANTHONY VALLE of Hicksville, who was working in a supermarket on December 20, 1985, when he saw a man with a shotgun holding the manager and two other employees at bay. Valle ran to the electric switchbox and turned off power to the automatic doors of the store. He then waited outside the office for the holdup man to leave, and when he did, tackled him. The suspect tried to point the shotgun at Valle, who ripped it from his grasp. As the suspect tried to flee, other employees subdued him and held him for police.

This annual event was a culmination of recommendations by police officials throughout Nassau, concerning civilian actions of merit.

"Those we honor on this occasion have performed community service of the highest value," Rozzi said. "They have shown a selfless devotion to the community

# Commercial Mortgages to Continue Strong Says Beacon Sr. Vice Pres. Charles Stiene

A strong commercial mortgage market fueled by the recent and ongoing downward trend in interest rates and Long Island's robust local economy are cited as primary reasons for the volume of commercial mortgage being processed at Beacon Federal Savings Bank and other local financial institutions, said Charles Stiene, senior vice president and mortgage office of the \$433 million asset Beacon Federal Savings Bank (Baldwin).

A veteran banker who is well-known in local real estate circles, Mr. Stiene has been in charge of Beacon's commercial mortgage department since he joined the bank a year ago in May 1985. He previously served

in various lending officer capacities with Fidelity Federal Savings, Suburbia Federal Savings, Nassau Trust and Long Island Savings Bank where he started his banking career in 1947.

Mr. Stiene noted that commercial building construction and mortgage lending activity are showing signs of concentration this year in the western and central Suffolk areas surrounding Veterans Highway, Motor Parkway in Hauppauge and Islip Airport.

Also, one-to-four family residential lending in the previously depressed South Shore region in and around Mastic is showing a dramatic turnaround. "In the mid-1970s, everything was dead out there," commented

Mr. Stiene regarding Mastic, adding that "available and affordable land and a ready labor pool have contributed to Mastic's re-emergence into the residential real estate mainstream."

According to Mr. Stiene, Beacon is lending for new

construction, permanent financing, and refinancing of commercial properties including shopping centers, industrial buildings, office buildings and apartment houses. However, the bulk of Beacon's current commercial lending is in permanent financing, he said.

In projecting commercial mortgage activity through the remainder of 1986 and into early 1987, Mr. Stiene sees no let-up in the current accelerated pace mainly due to Long Island's strong economy, lower per square foot leasing costs for tenants, and the continued movement of service-oriented companies and other commercial entities further out on the island from the Greater New York area.

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Mrs. Noeth,

Re: Giese Park Property

I wish to thank Mr. Charles Cunningham for his letter which was published by your newspaper on April 25th regarding the Giese Park property. I feel that he provided an accurate account of the meeting that was headed by myself on April 13th at the park site, in addition to reflecting the essence of the meeting which was to approach any development in this area in a democratic manner with monitoring by the residents.

Although Mr. Cunningham and I differ in our views regarding any devel-

# Termination Of Federal Revenue Sharing Creates Local Problems

As September 30th draws closer — the date marking the termination of the federal general revenue sharing program — I have, once again, written to our elected officials in Washington to encourage and support their efforts to retain this vital program.

If the program is to be saved, a strong grassroots effort has to be made by the local governments most directly affected by its prospective loss. Without this allocation of funds jurisdictions will be faced with a dismal choice. Municipalities will either be forced to raise property taxes—one

Senator's estimate is a 30% increase — in order to continue the present level of services or reduce the activities that they perform to benefit the public.

To determine how villages within the boundaries of the Town make use of federal revenue sharing funds I recently distributed a questionnaire to the village Mayors. The results were computed and passed along to our elected federal officials to insure that they know, first-hand, how local municipalities would be affected.

Our sixteen villages use

revenue sharing funds to minimize property taxation while providing such vital services as fire and police protection, programs for the elderly, road maintenance and sanitation collection. On a yearly basis they receive anywhere from \$1,736 to \$105,000 in funds which accounts for between .003% and 3% of their total budgets.

At the Town level, also, revenue sharing is included in the yearly budget to prevent property tax increases. This past year we were allocated \$1.6 million, but that has already been reduced in

1986 by a 25% cutback.

Nationwide 39,000 jurisdictions share in the current \$4.6 billion revenue sharing appropriation. Small municipalities, with limited sources of income, those with populations of under 10,000 comprise 85% of the program's recipients.

I have every confidence that our federally elected officials will continue their strong lobbying efforts to maintain the revenue sharing program, and I will continue to keep you informed as to their progress.

We simply cannot afford to lose this allocation.

# County Refinancing Plan Could Save \$5 Million

Spurred on by rapidly declining interest rates, Nassau County has decided to refinance approximately \$67.5 million in long term debt in the form of serial bonds issued between 1982 and 1984. The total cost savings to the County, over the life of the program, has been projected at over \$5 million.

According to Nassau County Board of Supervisors vice-chairman Thomas Gulotta, Chairman of the Board's Committee on Finance, the idea behind the refinancing plan is a simple one: "As many individuals and families are finding it prudent today to refinance existing debts—be it mortgages, personal loans, or credit card balances—taken out at the considerably higher interest rate of the late 70's and early 80's, so too is it in the best interest of

the County to refinance much of its long term debt at the appreciably lower interest rates available in today's bond market."

Specifically, under the terms of a bond ordinance to be considered by the Board of Supervisors at its May 5th meeting, the County is ready to redeem the unpaid principal of its Series O General Improvement Bonds, and its Series T and V Combined Sewer District Bonds. Presently, the outstanding principals on these bonds are \$22,925 million, \$23,580 million, and \$21,730 million respectively. Maturity dates on the existing bonds extend from the year 2010 to 2014. Gulotta noted that in order to undertake the refunding plan, the County will avail itself of the call options of each bond, which enable the

bond issuer to pay off the outstanding debt of a bond, plus a premium, at a date in advance of the bond's normal maturity date. The bonds being refinanced by the County became callable beginning in 1993 and running through 1995.

Interest rates on the existing Series O, T, and V Bonds range from a high of 10.875% to a low of 9.5%. According to projections of a refunding plan prepared by Chemical Bank of New York, who will act as underwriters for the sale of the refunding bonds, the newly issued bonds should bear interest rates ranging from 4.6% to 7.1%.

Gulotta noted that the newly developed refinancing plan is particularly beneficial to the County due to the fact that despite a 28 year life for the newly issued refund-

ing bonds, the County will realize a savings of nearly \$4.5 million, out of \$5 million total, within the first two years of the program.

"The benefits to Nassau County residents and taxpayers of this refinancing plan are clear," Supervisor Gulotta noted. "By taking advantage of the considerable decline in interest rates in this manner, the county's yearly appropriation for debt service—those funds used to pay off the principal and interest of outstanding debts—will be substantially diminished; leaving more of the County's limited resources for the stabilization of property taxes and the improvement of the quality of life in Nassau County."

"I fully support the proposed refinancing plan," Gulotta concluded.

# Giese Park Update

On Wednesday, April 16th, the signed petitions from the rally at Giese Park on April 13 were submitted to Supervisor Joseph Colby and the Town Board by Thomas McGovern. The petition requested alternate park plans to those proposed by the town and presented by Councilman Thomas Clark. A cover letter was submitted with the petition expressing the concern of the residents and asking to be more directly informed of any plans for this area.

In response to this action, Mr. McGovern received a letter from Deputy Supervisor James Bell acknowledging the receipt of the petition and noting the residents' views concerning Giese Park. Also, Mr. Bell stated that arrangements were being made for a meeting with Mr. McGovern and

Town representatives to see what compromises could be reached. Mr. McGovern has since received an invitation for him and members of his committee to attend said meeting which is to be held on May 6th. Also scheduled to attend are Councilman Clark and representatives from the Parks Department and the Hicksville American Soccer Club. Results will be announced in this newspaper at a later date.

There have been some strong urgings by local residents surrounding Giese Park to pursue the formation of a Civic Association. To this end, Mr. McGovern has contacted local civic associations and has spoken to an attorney. He has learned that there was a local civic action in 1971 that fought for the Giese Park property to remain off the tax rolls as opposed to the area being sold to a private developer. # Activities To Alert Public Of Pending Crisis

Long Island's sole source of drinking water, the underground aquifers, is threatened increasingly by pollution and overuse. The recent contamination of the well water at Rocky Point is only one example. In the past few years, 54 public wells in Nassau and Suffolk have been closed due to hazardous levels of nitrates, pesticides, household or industrial wastes. The wells of Long Beach and other South Shore communities now have to be drilled to depths of 2000 feet to avoid the increasing salt water intrusion along the edges of the aquifers. Long Island has a population of 3 million people, each using an average of 125 gallons of water daily. The total drain in Nassau now exceeds the rate of natural refill. Major sources of loss are the sewage systems that flow to the sea instead of recycling the water. It takes hundreds of years for rain water to percolate down through our porous soil. Our few remaining woodland tracts, invaluable as aquifer recharge areas, are undergoing rapid development. The problem is not a new one: before 1850, Brooklyn and Queens also drew from the Long Island aquifers beneath them. Now that water is contaminated with salt intrusion and pollutants, and those boroughs rely on drought-stricken upstate reservoirs. The rest of Long Island, relying for now on a more stable source, does not have such an option.

Governor Cuomo and the New York State Legislature have designated that the week of May 4 through 10, Water Week, be used to intensify public awareness of this pending crisis. A variety of government and environmental groups are providing activities, information and forums. The Coalition for the Protection of Long Island's Groundwater (482-7722) has sent information to public officials and individual water districts on the Island. The State Department of Conservation (751-7900) has mailed educational materials to Fifth Grade teachers across the state.

The Museum of Long Island Natural Science (246-8666) is sponsoring a canoe trip on the Peconic River on May 10. Also on May 10 there is a day-long conference at SUNY Stony Brook (924-0092) concerning the Pine Barrens (\$8 per person, advanced registration). The Pine Barrens, 100,000 undeveloped acres in eastern Suffolk, is a vital recharge area for all of the Island's drinking water. The NY State Legislative Commission on Water Resource Needs of LI (482-7722) is holding a public forum on water management with county officials on May 15 at 10AM in the Nassau Board of Super-

visors Hearing Room, 1 West St., Mineola. Nassau County proposes to tap deeper water from a well in the Jericho area and distribute it south. This action is opposed by Suffolk because it would draw water westward from beneath Suffolk.

Informative slide presentations about our potable water are given by Anita Quinn of the League of Women Voters (627-1942), by Sarah Meyland of the NYS Legislative Water Commission (482-7722), by Sophie Morris of the DEC (751-7900) and by David Newton is presenting the show, Let's Keep Our Groundwater Pure, at SUNY Stony Brook (246-8666) on May 6, at 7:30 (\$2 per person). A 22-minute film by Steve Englbreight called Our Fragile Wilderness: The Pine Barrens is available from public libraries and from BOCES.

The NYS Senate Commission on Water Resources (Mary Ellen McNicholas, 360-6206 has two slide shows that will be loaned. One, produced by the National Wildlife Federation, is aimed at children in grades 3-8. The other is based on a governmental study of water issues on Long Island. The Commission will provide speakers for civic, environmental and school groups. There is an exhibit about these issues in the lobby of the State Office Building, Veterans Highway, Hauppauge.

More information about our water is available from: the LI Sierra Club (922-4857); Nassau Co. Dept. of Health (535-3693); the American Water Association (234-24830). Also check with local water districts and schools for events and information.

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM TOWN OF OYSTER BAY 1986 - 87 PROGRAM YEAR

**General**  
The Town of Oyster Bay as a member of the Nassau County Community Development Consortium has been allocated \$1,018,333 for its 1986-87 Community Development Year. The Town anticipates submitting its recommended Community Development Program to Nassau County on May 16, 1986. Two public hearings will be held to provide for public input and review.

**Hearing Dates**  
The first public hearing will be held on May 8, 1986 at 8:00 p.m. in the Town Hall Hearing Room at Town Hall, Oyster Bay, New York. The hearing will be to explain program guidelines, review past activities and offer an opportunity for proposals from the public.  
A second hearing is to be held in June at 1 West Street, Mineola, New York. This hearing will permit the public to comment on the Town's statement of proposed activities. The specific time and date of this hearing will be advertised by Nassau County at a future date.

The Town of Oyster Bay's Community Development Office will be available to provide assistance and answer questions from May 9, 1986 through May 13, 1986.

**Utilization of Community Development Funds**  
Community Development funds must primarily benefit low and moderate income persons in the town or provide for the removal of blight. To accomplish this, a wide range of eligible activities is established by the Federal Government including: Acquisition of Real Property; Disposition of Property; Provision and improvement of Public Facilities; Residential and Commercial Rehabilitation; Removal of Architectural Barriers to the Handicapped; Historic Preservation; Economic Development Activities; Provision of Services by private non-profit organizations; Planning and Administration.  
Specific ineligible activities include: General improvement of government buildings, schools, stadiums, cultural and art centers; purchase of equipment or furnishings; operating and maintenance expenses; general government expenses; income payments and industrial park development.

**Ongoing Activities**  
Prior year Community Development Activities are comprised of two basic components: 1) Residential Rehabilitation and Removal of Architectural Barriers to the handicapped; both on a Townwide basis, and 2) Activities programmed within areas preapproved by the Federal Government. Virtually all "soft-ware" activities other than those listed in (1) above, are only eligible within these areas. These activities have included: roof repair and drainage projects; parking lot improvement; street lighting; provision of public services and historic preservation; commercial rehabilitation.
