School Budget Defeated!

Hicksville voters defeated the proposed school budget as well as the transportation referendum in Wednesday's voting. The budget lost by 39 votes and there was a 67 vote margin on the transportation issue. Both candidates, running unopposed, were elected. Here is a breakdown of the election tally:

Other business conducted at the meeting included the acceptance of a scholarship gift from the Henry G. and Florence E. Eisenmann Foundation, Inc. in the amount of \$25,000 to be used for the continuance of awards to Hicksville students and the approval of an agreement with the American Red Cross to provide emergency use of school buildings to shelter victims in the event of disaster.

Six staff positions were abolished due to declining enrollment and one position of teacher of English as a second language was created.

Board President William Bennett asked those assembled to remember Mrs. Ann Virginia Merrill in their prayers. Mrs. Merrill taught seventh grade at the Junior High School for 30 years before she retired. She passed away on April 1 at the age of 87.

Applications Available For July 4 Long Island Women's Championship Run

Applications are now available for the third annual "Thank You Paine Webber" Long Island Summer 5 Kilometer Women's Championship Run, to be held on the roads of the Nassau County suburban communities of Jericho and Brookville on the morning of Independence Day, July 4, 1986.

The Run, which will be open to women of all ages and abilities, will be conducted by the Plainview-Old Bethpage Road Runners Club with the technical assistance of Finish Line Promotions of Port Washington. The start and finish will be at Jericho High School, and the starting gun will go off promptly at 9:30 AM.

"The first and second annual Women's Runs held were even bigger and better than we could possibly have hoped for," observed Plainview-Old Bethpage RRC Vice President Julie Shapiro, who will serve as Director of the Run again this year. "It's obvious that there is a real demand for a major women's road race here on Long Island. We expect to stage another first class race this year, a race that will attract both top-flight women racers and -- more to the point -- the average back-of-the-pack

recreational runner. It should be good fun for every woman who competes, and a real boost for women's running and fitness on Long Island!"

The 1985 edition of the Women's Championship Run was won by 1988 Olympic hopeful Michelle Bush with a time of 16:12, the fastest 5 Kilometers ever run by a woman on Long Island. The field of 391 finishers made it the largest women's race ever held on Long Island as fourteen women crossed the finish line in less than 18 minutes, and the top 25 finishers all broke 19 minutes.

The Jericho-Brookville course provides a dramatic combination of rolling countryside and level straightaways through some of the most pleasant and scenic roads on Long Island. The course is TAC certified and the race is TAC sanctioned, so that personal results may be used as qualifying times for TAC events throughout the country. Time splits are given at every mile mark, and there are three water stations spread throughout the course.

Substantial cash prizes will be awarded to the top five finishers once again this year, including a \$1000 first prize, plus a \$500 bonus if a new course record is set.

HOW TO KNOW THE WILL OF GOD

How often has each of us struggled over an important decision? We considered the variety of alternatives; often we discussed the decision with our family and friends. Sometimes we prayed over it and sought God's direction. "What would God want me to do?" we asked ourselves.

Unfortunately, there is much confusion about the subject of the will of God. The words, "It is the will of God," are used too freely. A catastrophe happens and people say glibly, "It's his will." We sometimes do inappropriate things and pass them off saying God willed that we did it. Many talk about searching for the will of God as if it were somehow lost and needed to be found.

First and foremost in God's will is that all people be saved. The Bible tells us that God wills all people to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth. Throughout Scripture we find God desiring that everyone have the joy of Jesus as their Lord and Savior. To not have Jesus is to be firmly in sin's control; to have faith in the Son of God is to

be alive to our full creative potential as he controls our lives. Through a cross and a vacant grave our salvation has been secured. Jesus, unlike any of the gods in other religions, is a personal God, and those who know him personally will be well on their way to know the Father's will. To have said, "I believe in Jesus Christ as my Savior" is to have taken the first step.

Our second step in knowing the will of God is to be Spirit-filled. In Ephesians 5:17 we read, "Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is." To not be willing to understand the will of the Lord is to be foolish. Now what is the will? We continue to read in verse 18, "And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit." Now most of us are at least qualified to discuss what it's like to be filled with wine or some other spirited liquid. To be drunk is to be controlled by the agent within. We act differently when we have that spirit within us. Likewise to be filled with the Holy Spirit is to be controlled by an agent within. We have no more control over ourselves than we

would have if we were drunk with alcohol. To be filled in the Spirit is to be dominated and controlled by the Spirit.

The third and final step in discovering the will of God for our lives you're really going to like; you'll eat it up. It is to do whatever you want to do. That's right. Do what you want when you have a decision to make. In the Book of Psalms we read, "Delight in the Lord, and He'll give you the desire of your heart." Notice that it says the desire of our hearts is given to us by God when we delight in him: God puts the desire in our hearts so that what we want is really what God wants. His will becomes our will, and conversely, our will is his will. The third step is possible when we have taken the first step of believing and the second of being filled by the Holy Spirit. Having taken the first two steps and having become well-versed in Scripture, we follow our desires (really God's) and live according to his will. We set out in life without fear, and as we make our way, he provides us with the necessary corrections along the course.

Tonight, Friday, May 9th, we will have our monthly meeting at the VFW Hall, 350 South Broadway, Hicksville. Senator Ralph J. Marino will be our guest speaker.

Senator Marino was elected to the New York State Senate in 1968, taking office in 1969. He rose from local office having served as an elected member and Majority Leader of the Oyster Bay Town Board.

In 1969-70, he served as chairman of the Senate Committee on Villages; in 1971-72 as Chairman of the Committee on Towns and Counties, and continues to serve as a legislative liaison between state and local governments.

His pursuit of reforms to halt real estate swindles plaguing homeowners won him the chairmanship of a specially created Temporary State Commission on Tax Liens and Mortgage Frauds in 1972.

From 1973 through 1982, Marino served as Chairman of two key Senate committees, the Committee on

Crime and Correction and the Select Committee on Crime. Over the years, he became a leading spokesman on penal matters. During his tenure, he sponsored the greatest body of laws furthering correctional reform in the history of the state. He also spearheaded reforms in laws dealing with illicit drugs, violent juveniles, illegal toxic waste operations, child pornography and crime victims, including sponsorship of the comprehensive Crime Victims Fair Treatment Standards Act of 1984.

Marino translated a commitment to honesty in government into the state's historic Freedom of Information Law, adopted in 1974. He achieved total "sunshine in government" with passage of the Open Meeting Law in 1976.

In 1985, Marino was named Chairman of the Senate Committee on Banks, a committee on which he has served as a member since 1971, and Chairman of the Senate Majority Program Commit-

tee, a new post within the Senate with responsibility for formulating policies and legislative programs and priorities for the Senate Majority.

Born in Rochester, New York on January 2, 1928, Marino attended Syracuse University (Class of '51) and Fordham Law School (Class of '54) following service in the U.S. Army. He is a partner in the law firm of Marino, Bernstein and LaMarca at 120 South Street, Oyster Bay. He has served as the Town of Oyster Bay Republican Committee Chairman and First Vice Chairman of the Nassau County Republican Committee. He is past President of the Italian-American Legislators Club, Inc. and past Task Force member of the National Conference of State Legislatures.

Over the years, Marino was awarded the Association of Emotionally Disturbed Children's Special Humanitarian Award; New York State Kiwanis Key Club Service Award; and the American Heart Association's Distinguished Leadership Award. He won

recognition from New York State Common Cause and Nassau County Press Association for his open government policies. In the field of criminal justice, he has been accorded the Nassau County Probation Officers Award; the New York State Parole Officers Legislator of the Year Award; Nassau County Municipal Police Chiefs Association Legislator of the Year Award; the Distinguished Service Award, Department of Criminal Justice of C.W. Post College; the American Academy for Professional Law Enforcement Annual Award; the U.S. Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association Award; and the New York State Bar Association award for outstanding work in criminal legislation.

Senator Marino's committee assignments include: Banks (Chairman); Crime and Correction; Codes; Elections; Judiciary; and Finance.

Senator Marino is married to the former Ethel Bernstein of Oyster Bay. They have three children, Judith, James and Robert.
