

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

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

struggled over an important decision? We considered the variety of alternatives: often we discussed the decision with our family and friends Sometimes we prayed over it and sought God's direction "What would God want me to do?" we asked ourselves. Unfortunately, there is much confusion about the

subject of the will of God. The words, "It is the will of God," are used too freely. A catastrophe happens and people say glibly, "It's his will." We sometimes do inappropriate things and pass them off saying God willed that we did it. Many talk about searching for the will of God as if it were omehow lost and needed to be found.
