I am writing on behalf of the Long Island Rail Road Commuter's Council (LIRRCC) to express our frustration with recent slowdowns on the Long Island Rail Road. The Council members, and thousands of other commuters, were angered at having time stolen from their work

day and families. The commuters have no say in the outcome of contract negotiations and resent being used as pawns in the labor negotiation process.

The council members do not intend to be caught again in a squeeze between labor and management and will, if necessary, organize a class action lawsuit to prevent this from happening. Commuters are only interested in receiving decent service. If this service is intentionally and illegally disrupted, the Council will move to protect the commuters' interests.

## From the Beginning...

The birth of the Vernon C. Wagner Funeral Home really began back in the coal mining region of Pennsylvania. Mr. Wagner had a teenage classmate who was killed in a motorcycle accident and the poor job of restoration on his friend put a challenge within to do a better job in the business of care-giving himself. After serving the U.S. Navy during World War II, Mr. Wagner went to the McAllister Institute and after learning all that was required, was licensed as a New York funeral director. In 1954 he and his wife Alice, purchased the big old white house on the corner of Old Country Road and Jerusalem Avenue in Hicksville. It was part of the estate

It was enlarged again in 1963, and once again in 1985. This was always due to the increasing number of funerals handled. In 1982, Mr. Wagner's son, William C. Wagner left teaching to take over the responsibility of running this ever-increasing business.

## Community Involvements

Coming into the Hicksville area in 1954 was a challenge, which Mr. Wagner has always accepted including becoming active in the community, and its many activities. Kiwanis seemed to be the start. He has been a member through the years, in this active organization, serving as its president in 1970. Mr. Wagner has always supported youth organizations such as Little League, as well as different mens and women's bowling

teams at various times.

He has served in various capacities of leadership. As president of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, striving for the restoration of the west side of Broadway, despite all the setbacks. He is pleased to note that some action has finally come to fruition by tolerance and the perseverance by committees and community groups of which he was, and is an integral part.

In his chosen field Mr. Wagner served as President of the Metropolitan Funeral Directors Association and then as vice-president of the N.Y. State Funeral Directors Association.

He is a Life Member of the William M. Gouse Post 3211 Veterans of Foreign Wars and supportive of their many community endeavors.

He is an active member of Trinity Lutheran Church and School, having served on the School Board as well as being an ardent supporter of Lutheran High in Brookville.

Our Hicksville Community Council also holds a warm spot in Mr. Wagner's heart especially for its encouraging local residents' input for a Better Community.

Mr. Wagner through the years, was known for never declining speaking engagements and conferences if at all feasible especially with Youth and Community groups as well as at the Hicksville High School. His presence was always an active addition to all causes in which he participated.

"He is an inspiring example to all who have known him through the years," said a Chamber spokesperson. "For he has served his God, his family, his profession and his community with equal dedication and devotion. We are proud to present him with this well-deserved honor."

• Decision was reserved on the petition of C&B Realty Co., #3 for a special use permit to construct and maintain a restaurant with a seating capacity of over 75 persons in a Bus. F district at Plainview, within the Woodbury Plaza Shopping Center at Woodbury Rd. and South Oyster Bay Rd.

Over 100 people attended the evening hearing in opposition to this petition for a Bennigan's Restaurant. Residents of the area opposed the petition on the grounds that there would be more traffic generated in an already saturated area. There were also complaints of noise, and smells. Since the original proposal included a disco, many of the residents were concerned about alcoholic beverages being served and the late hours a disco requires. The revised proposal eliminated the disco, but the residents are still opposed to the petition.

• The attorney for the petition of Jaclyn and Jonathan Operations & L.S. Robbins Lane Corp. filed for another adjournment. This is the third time an adjournment was requested on this petition for a special use permit to operate a restaurant/pub in and Ind. H district and for modification of restrictive covenants placed on the premises on Oct. 26, 1970. The property is located at Robbins Lane, south of Jericho Tpke., and north of LIE and Aerial Way. The hearing was rescheduled for June 17. A night hearing is planned. If at the time of the June 17 hearing another adjournment is requested, the petition will no longer be considered by the Town.

The House Superfund conferees overwhelmingly approved a new proposal introduced by Reps. Norman F. Lent (R-NY) and Dennis Eckart (D-OH) to strengthen the current Superfund program and end the stalemate between House and Senate conferees on this controversial issue.

The Eckart-Lent proposal will now be presented to the Senate conferees for approval.

Superfund is the federal program to cleanup abandoned toxic waste sites. Emergency funding for the program expires on May 31, 1986.

At the meeting, Rep. Lent said: "We have only three weeks left before funding for this essential program expires and the cleanup efforts grind to a halt. The Eckart-Lent proposal closely follows the will of the House of Representatives as expressed in the passage of HR 2817 and it will strengthen the program in many important respects."

"It is clearly superior to the pending Senate proposal on such important issues as cleanup standards, cleanup schedules, LUST (leaking underground storage tanks), and public health authorities. It also contains a strong Community Right-to-Know provision. Time is running out on Superfund. We must give the Environmental Pro-

tection Agency (EPA) a five-year program so they can get on with the job of cleaning up these toxic waste sites," Lent concluded.

The following is a list of provisions included in the Eckart-Lent proposal to strengthen the Superfund program:

**FUNDING** - Establishes a \$9 billion fund over five years. Sets aside \$500,000,000 for the cleanup of leaking underground storage tanks (LUST).

**CLEANUP STANDARDS** - Includes cleanup standards to protect human health and the environment. Creates a presumption that all federal and state laws and water quality criteria apply to cleanups.

**CLEANUP SCHEDULES** - Requires the commencement of 675 RIFs (preliminary studies) and 375 cleanups over a five year period with enforceable yearly requirements.

**LUST** - Protects the pub-

lic and the environment from leaking underground gasoline tanks by giving the Administrator the money and authority to cleanup releases of petroleum.

**PUBLIC HEALTH AUTHORITIES** - Expands public health authorities by requiring the Agency for Toxic Substance and Disease Registry to evaluate health risks at each site, establish a disease registry, conduct toxicological profiles, and institute health surveillance programs where necessary.

**CITIZENS RIGHT-TO-KNOW** - Guarantees all citizens information about the hazards associated with chemicals produced, used or stored in their communities. Requires local governments to develop emergency response programs to insure community protection from accidental, catastrophic releases of hazardous substances.
