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

The House Superfund approved a new proposal introduced by Reps. Nor-man F. Lent (R-NY) and Dennis Eckart (D-OH) to strengthen the current Superfund program and end he stalemate between House and Senate conferees on this controversial issue. The Eckart-Lent proposal will now be presented to the Senate conferees for approval.

Superfund is the federal program to cleanup aban-doned toxic waste sites.

Emergency funding for the program expires on May 31, 1986.

At the meeting, Rep. Lent id: "We have only three weeks left before funding for this essential program expires and the cleanup efforts grind to a halt. The Echart-Lent proposal closely follows the will of the House of Representatives as expressed in the passage of HR 2817 and it will strengthen the program in many

important respects."
"It is clearly superior to the pending Senate proposal on such important issues a cleanup standards, cleanups schedules, LUST (leaking underground storage tanks), and public health authorities. It also contains a strong Community Right-to-Know provision. Time is running out on Superfund. We must give the Environmental Pro-

tection Agency (EPA) a fiveyear program so they can get on with the job of cleaning up these toxic waste sites," Lent concluded.

The following is a list of provisions included in the Eckart-Lent proposal to strengthen the Superfund UNDING - Establishes

a \$9 billion fund over five years. Sets aside \$500,-000,000 for the cleanup of leaking underground stor-age tanks (LUST). CLEANUP STAND-ARDS Includes cleanup

standards to protect human health and the environment. Creates a presumption that all federal and state laws and water quality criteria apply to cleanups. CLEAN-UP SCHEDULES-

Requires the commence-ment of 675 RIFs (prelimi-nary studies) and 375 cleanups over a five year period with enforceable yearly requirements. LUST - Protects the pub-

lic and the environment from leaking underground gasolinetanks by giving the Administrator the money and authority to cleanup

releases of petroleum.
PUBLIC HEALTH
AUTHORITIES - Expands public health authorities by requiring the Agency for Toxic Substance and Disease Registry to evaluate health risks at each site, establish a disease registry. conduct toxicological pro-files, and institute health surveillance programs where necessary.

CITIZENS RIGHT-TO-KNOW - Guarantees all citizens information about the hazards associated with chemicals produced, used or stored in their communities. Requires local governments to develop emergency response programs to insure community protection from accidental, catastrophic releases of hazardous
