## **Parola: Southern State and** Wantagh Parkways Hazardous

Saying that unjustified delays in repairs to local state parkways could result in tragedy. Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wan-tagh) again criticized the state Department of Trans-portation (DOT) for inac-tion on the thoroughfares. "In my recent letters to Michael Cuddy, DOT Region 10 Director, I noted the unsafe conditions that the unsafe conditions that now exist on portions of the Southern State and Wansouthern State and Wan-tagh State parkways," said Parola, a member of the Assembly Local Govern-ments Committee. "Since these are state-

owned and operated road-ways, our local towns have no say in when conditions will improve," added Parola. "The need for resurfacing

of the Southern State Park-way between Wantagh Avenue and Route 107 has existed for several years, with road conditions marred by many sections now worn away. This is an obvious hazard, and one which Nassau County residents should not have to be subjected to." said Parola.

The assemblyman pointed out that the original project dates back four years, but

bids have slightly surpassed guideline requirements, and the resurfacing has been placed on hold.

Placed on hold. "Another major problem exists on the Wantagh State Parkway, where highway lighting has been absent since 1979," said Parola, "and current plans will keep the much-travelled avenue dark until 1900." dark until 1990."

Parola noted that he has been writing in vain to DOT since the initial shut-off of the lighting and has been hearing a number of differ-ent excuses for the project delays.

"The parkway is certainly more hazardous without proper lighting, which cer-tainly increases the chances of additional accidents," said the lawmaker. "Nassau County readents pay among the highest property taxes in the state and deserve better treatment than this.

"Reconsideration of the Wantagh State Parkway project timetable and immediate resurfacing of the Southern State Parkway are in order for the safety of all who travel these state owned roadways," said Assemblyman Parola. said



## LILCO "Brown Outs" Predicted

Long Island residents could face power outages this summer, according to officials of the State Public Service Commission. In the annual PSC report evaluating statewide summer electricity needs, the Commission said LILCO's power reserves are stretched to maximum capacity and, in unusually hot weather, power could be interrupted in some areas.

However, barring the event that two or more power plants would be out of service at the same time, the report said LILCO would have adequate power reserves to meet peak demand because of purchase requirements made earlier this year with Con Edison, the New York Power Authority, and the Long Island municipals.

According to PSC projections, Long Island's peak demand should be 3,372 megawatts (MW), under normal summer weather conditions. However, LILCO officials say demand could rise to 3,430 MW should last summer's peak weather conditions, i.e., extended high temperatures and humidity, be repeated this year.

If LILCO were not able to meet its operating reserve margin because of an unexpected loss of generating capacity, the utility might have to resort to voltage reduction (brownouts) or even load-shedding (selected blackouts) to meet demand, the renort said

the report said. The PSC report concurs with an April 16 announcement made by LILCO in which the utility said it anticipated an electric generation deficiency of more than 200 megawatts (MW) this summer. To meet the increased summer demand and its New York Power Pool reserve requirements, LILCO said it purchased additional capacity from several sources. With those purchase agree ments, LILCO will receive: ° 150 MW from Con

Nuclear Power Plant LILCQ also is actively promoting conservation to help relieve the summer energy crunch. The utility expects to save at least 10 MW by offering rate incentives to its large industrial customers to cut back on their electric use during peak periods. In addition, LILCO recently opened a consumer conservation outlet in the Massapequa Mall and set up a toll-free hotline for information on home energy saving measures.

"Our plans are based on the belief that Long Islanders will continue to conserve energy despite falling oil prices." said William Muscler, LILCO Vice President of Electric Operations. "Without their help, Long Island's summer energy crunch could be tighter than we projected."

While LILCO's power purchases and conservation measures should allow it to meet consumer demand for the summer of 1986, there remains serious concern about the utility's ability to

meet future growing démand without the Shoreham Nuclear Power Station. Another report, "Assessment of Future Reliability of Electric Supply on Long Island," recently issued by the New York Power Pool, states "the reliability of the LILCO system without Shoreham is presently marginal and will deteriorate."

Said Power Pool Executive Director William Balety "This deficiency is caused by LILCO's inability to operate Shoreham...once Shoreham is operating, it would appear that LILCO will have adeuate generating capability for a number of years in the future."

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

Three bills sponsored by Senator Ralph H. Marino (R. Oyster Bay) to expand and more clearly define the legal rights of victims of crime in New York State, were passed by the State Senate this month and sent

to the State Assembly. Senator Marino, author of the 1984 Crime Victims Fair Treatment Standards Law, said that the first of his bills extends provisions of that law to the state's Unified Court System which includes most state and local courts.

'The Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) has now implemented the has now implemented the original Fair Treatment Law by issuing regulatory guidelines to criminal justice agencies throughout the state," Marino said. Intended to insure standardized, prompt and considcrate treatment of crime victims, these guidelines emphasize the right of victims to know, at each stage

of a criminal proceeding. what is happening and what role they are to play in the process. They further insure that victims are made aware of all their rights and options, from the arrest of an accused to the final determination in a criminal proceeding.

"The one missing piece in the law was that it did not include the court system. The bill now approved by the Senate rectifies that omission and completes the intent of the law by recuir-

intent of the law by requiring the preparation of spe-cific crime victim fair treatment standards similar to those already adopted by the federal court system."

Under the Marino bill, the Chief Administrative Judge of the Unified Court System is directed to establish crime victim fair treatment standards which must include procedures to insure prompt notification of such key trial developments as the time of the initial appearance of any accused before a judicial officer, the release of an accused for any reason, the entry of a plea, the time of a trial or sentencing, and any reversal or modification of a sentence by an appellate court.

The new standards would further specify procedures to insure a judge's consideration of the views of victims of violent felony crimes and for improving protection

against intimidation of victims and witnesses including, where possible, provision of separate defense and prosecution witness waiting areas, and procedures for assuring prompt return of property not essential as evidence in a court proceeding. The second Marino bill

requires the Parole Board to state its reasons, in writing and in detail, for the granting of parole to a state inmate and establishes the right of earlier or later victims of that inmate to obtain that statement. Recent appellate court decisions appellate court decisions have also upheld the right of victims to such information here a parolee has committed a crime against them while on parole. The Marino bill compliments and is consistent with those court decisions.

The final bill extends the right to apply for a state rehabilitative occupational training award to members of a crime victim's family where necessary as the direct result of a crime. Presently, such occupational training awards are limited to the crime victim only.

The three Marino crime victim bills are sponsored in the Assembly by Assemblyman Richard Gottfried of Manhattan, chairman of the Assembly Crime Victims Task Force,

On behalf of the residents of the Town of Oyster Bay I have written to LILCO Chairman. William Catacosinos, to request that the credit available through public power be applied as soon as possible to every rate payer's bill at a rate commensurate with the hydro-power consumed.

A Credit From Lilco

It is my understanding that by the end of March, LILCO had already accrued. a savings of \$3.8 million through the implementation of the public power pro-gram. To Oyster Bay resi-dents that is a Town-wide savings of more than \$500,000--again, this figure reflects only the savings to

the end of March since more recent figures are not yet available.

Individual LILCO bills should reflect the savings based on kilowatt usage. A home which uses 600 kilo-watts per month should be entitled to a lump sum credit of approximately \$5.00.

One of the legal measures required to permit L1LCO to issue this credit approval by the Public Service Com-mission. LILCO has filed a mission. LIECO has filed a petition with the PSC and, only with its approval, which is expected in June, can a monthly credit be app-lied to our bill. To that end 1 have written to the PSC urg-ing prompt action on this request.






