The regular business meeting of the Board convened after the reception and Mr. Bennett complimented the attendees and participants in the VFW Coloring Book Contest award ceremony, the inductions for the National Honor Society and the Foreign Language Honor Society, and the Memorial Day ceremony and parade which concluded at the site of the war memorials on the Junior High grounds. Committee reports were presented and correspondence was reviewed following the adoption of minutes, and the Board proceeded to the action section.

The first action item on the agenda was the approval of revised budget figures in preparation for the second vote by the public scheduled for June 25. Mr. Nagle presented a number of proposals for reductions and called for a hearing to be set so that the community could have

some input into the budget revision. Recommendations for additional reductions in the amount of \$12,900 were approved which brought the budget total to \$40,638,229, down from the original figure of \$41,023,697. A hearing date was set for June 18, the same date as registration, when further recommendations will be considered.

In further actions, the Board

- adopted policies on smoking at Board meetings and on school premises and accepted administrative regulations on long-term substitutes.

- accepted warrant, transfer, and cash flow reports as well as the third quarter financial report for the 1985-86 school year.

- approved a contract renewal with Wright Risk Management for the administration of long-term disability and self-insured Workers' Compensation programs through June 30, 1987.

- authorized the encumbrance of \$61,000 for 1986-87 bids already processed during the current year.

- approved a resolution authorizing the sale of \$9,500,000 in tax anticipation notes for the 1986-87 school year.

Town Amends Waste Ordinance

The Oyster Bay Town Board has approved amending the Garbage, Litter and Waste Ordinance following a public hearing held on June 3.

The changes in the ordinance define the incorporated and unincorporated areas of the Town from which solid waste will be accepted

at the Town's disposal facility.

Type III waste disposal permit holders, those non-taxpaying entities such as municipal agencies, will now be required to pay the prevailing per ton cost for shipping garbage out-of-state, in addition to the current tip fee.

"You won't lose touch or lose time when you move if you take advantage of the new Change of Address Kit provided free by the Postal Service," says Roger Nienaber, General Manager/Postmaster Hicksville Division.

The filing of a Change of Address at your local post office will generate the mailing of a Change of Address Kit to your new home. This is a new program instituted to provide better service to our customers who move.

The Postal Service will forward your First-Class Mail for 18 months and second class, such as magazines and newsletters, for 60 days.

We provide address correction information only for those mailers who request this service.

It is up to our postal cus-

tomers to notify all their correspondents and publishers of their new address. Inside the cover of every magazine you'll find instructions for filing an address correction.

Inside the Change of Address Kit you will find nine Change of Address cards (Form 3576) for customers to directly notify their correspondents of their new address.

To insure accurate forwarding of your mail, give all information requested including apartment numbers and correct zip code.

Take a few minutes to read the brochure contained in the kit which explains to customers the importance of notifying all correspondents of their change of address. The brochure also explains what happens to mail that is forwarded and what classes

of mail require additional postage for forwarding.

Customers can verify the new address label on the kit and notify their former post office if the new address is inaccurate.

"The Postal Service wants to make sure your mail moves with you. The time spent following these instructions will help us give you the postal service you deserve," Nienaber says.

Town Board Schedules Hearing On Waste Ordinance

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a June 17th public hearing to mend the fees section of the Garbage, Litter and Waste Ordinance.

The proposed change in the ordinance would increase the cost for the disposal of garbage and rubbish to \$2.30 per

100 pounds or \$46 per ton and the rate for bulky items would increase to \$3.25 per 100 pounds or \$65 per ton.

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 17 at 10 AM in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

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Increase In Financial Aid To The Hicksville School District

State Senator Michael J. Tully, Jr. (R-Roslyn Heights) and Assemblyman Daniel Friss (R-Westbury) have announced that school districts in the Seventh Senatorial District will receive more than a \$4.25 million increase in state aid under provisions contained in the state's 1986-87 newly adopted budget.

"As a result of tough negotiations, Legislators representing suburban areas were successful in gaining a larger share of state school aid than was proposed by Governor Cuomo," Senator Tully stated. "We were also able to preserve the traditional 'Save Harmless' provision whereby special consideration is given to suburban school districts with high taxes and declining enrollments."

Senator Tully and Assemblyman Friss said that locally, the Hicksville School District will receive a total bottom line increase in state aid in the amount of \$17,744. This figure represents a \$595,763 increase over Governor Cuomo's proposal.

"I want to reiterate that I am in no way satisfied with the inequities that still exist in the disbursement of state aid to suburban school districts," Senator Tully added. "I will continue to do all in my power in the New York State Senate to enhance the quality of education for all of our excellent suburban schools."
