The N79 Bus Stop off Old Country Road and So. Oyster Bay Road in Hicksville has been moved from the side where the diner is across So. Oyster Bay Road going east to the middle of the block it has caused quite an inconvenience to several blind people with their guide dogs and some senior citizens. Many of these people have a long walk home because of lack of transportation and this move is an added inconvenience.

The reason for the move the MTA has stated was for safety sake. The lane going east on Old Country Road and So. Oyster Bay Road has been turned into a right turn lane. We have been told that it is hazardous for the bus to pull out of the middle lane to discharge passengers into the right turning lane. The next nearest bus stop for the people in this area is on the corner of New South Road and Plainview Road. We have made appeals to the county executive, town supervisor and the disabled in office in Mineola.

We don't know where to go from here. Most of us are taking cabs to get to the main transit drag and it is running into an expensive proposition.

Some Towns and in the near future most Towns in Nassau and Suffolk will ship their garbage to other areas.

The Town of Oyster Bay is now shipping to an area outside of Scranton, Pennsylvania. Even if you did not read a recent article in Newsday about the people who live near this area, you can imagine the result. People are killing rats coming from the area and have abnoxious aromas filling their air.

Recently my local councilman reported that there are already many protests, in this area, against the shipment of our garbage. The councilman further stated we have a year's contract. If it is not renewed we will have to ship the garbage to BUFFALO! This will cost 40 million dollars -- an increase of 20 million over this year's costs.

WHEREAS, there exists documentation of widespread use of alcohol and drugs in the secondary schools of New York State; and

WHEREAS, illegal use by students during school-related activities can be detrimental to the academic development of these students and others; and

WHEREAS, New York State is obligated to enforce the right of "the people" (students) to be protected from "unreasonable searches and seizures" without "probable cause" in accordance with Amendment IV of the Constitution of the United States of America;

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, that the school districts of the State of New York shall take action to improve the learning environment in their schools; and be it further

RESOLVED, that school districts should consider, within appropriate guidelines, the use of locker searches with the student present, and upon parental notification when conditions indicate actions are necessary to maintain a safe learning environment; and be it further

RESOLVED, that student searches and drug testing be avoided unless the student voluntarily agrees.

Tonight, Fridays June 13th we will be having our monthly meeting at the VFW hall, 350 S. Broadway, Hicksville. Our guest speakers will be Assemblyman Fred Parola, Dan Frisa and Mr. John Galasso.

Mr. Daniel Frisa is one of the youngest members of the New York State legislature. Mr. Frisa, his wife, Jane and their daughter, Danielle, reside in Westbury.

Dan Frisa was educated in the East Meadow Public Schools and earned his degree in marketing from St. John's University. He started his business career as a marketing associate with Johnson & Johnson before becoming a senior executive with Fortunoff, the retail company for whom he had worked as a part-time stock boy while in high school.

One of the youngest Eagle Scouts in Nassau County history, Mr. Frisa was elected to the Nassau County Republican Committee in 1973, the youngest member of that organization. He is the first member of his family to become involved in public life.

Prior to winning election to the Assembly by defeating a five-term incumbent, Mr. Frisa served as the Executive Director of the Nassau County Local Development Corporation, whose prime function is to finance business expansion through the New York Job Development Authority (JDA).

Under Mr. Frisa's direc-

tion, the Corporation was able to arrange for joint funding of the same project by both the JDA and the federal Small Business Administration's "503 Program" This was the first time in New York State that funds from both agencies were permitted to be used on the same projects.

As executive director of the Local Development Corporation, Mr. Frisa sat as an officer of the Long Island Development Corporation. During his tenure, the LIDC was the most active development company in the United States, providing the concept of "branch banking" for the JDA, thus setting a precedent for the rest of the state.

In addition to the Salisbury Republican Club, of which he is a past president, Mr. Frisa is a member of numerous charitable and civic organizations. Among these are the Kiwanis International, the New York State Economic Development Council, the Galileo Lodge of the Order of the Sons of Italy and the Committee for Jobs and Energy Independence (JEI). Mr. Frisa is also a life member of the Association for the Help of Retarded Children (AHRIC).

Mr. John Galasso will be running against Mr. Lewis Yevoli in the 13th Assembly District. Mr. Galasso is 41 years old and has been an attorney since 1969. He attended St. Dominic Elementary and High School

graduating in 1962. From there he attended C.W. Post where he received his BA degree in history and political science. He then went to St. John's Law School where he received his Jurisdoctorate Degree.

In 1966 Mr. Galasso was requested by the then Governor Nelson Rockefeller to be the Chairman of the Young New Yorkers for Rockefeller in the 2nd and 3rd districts which include all of Nassau and Suffolk Counties. He is a former assistant District Attorney. Mr. Galasso is active in the Nassau Bar Association and participates as Assigned Counselor Defender Plan for major offenses.

Mr. Galasso is a member of the American Bar Association, The New York Bar Association, The National District Attorney's Association, Catholic Lawyers Guild, American Committee on Italian Migration, St. Dominic Usher's Society, Nassau County Police Holy Name Society, and the Italian American Citizens Club. He currently has his own law firm at 106 3rd Street, Mineola. Mr. Galasso acts in the capacity of Environmental Hearing Officer for the Town of Oyster Bay.
