The Hicksville Board of Education held a public budget hearing on Wednesday, June 18 at the High School Cafe. At this hearing, which was lightly attended, the Board approved a revised budget to be voted on June 25th.

The revised budget is in the amount of \$40,638,229. This shows a reduction of \$329,468 from the original budget of \$40,967,697, which was defeated by a very small number of votes. The new proposed budget generates a tax rate increase of \$1.66. This is 33¢ less than the original budget which

generated a tax rate increase of \$1.99.

Under the title of General Support, \$12,000 was cut representing one clerical position and travel expenses for the Superintendent. Under the title Transportation, \$9,000 was taken out due to declining enrollment of BOCES students who will no longer need transportation. The title Instruction was cut by \$233,968 due to various retirements and personnel cuts made because of declining enrollment. The title Community Services was cut by \$1,000 for youth activities (materials and supplies not needed for these

activities). Other cuts were made under the titles Fringe, Debt Services and Transfers.

Before the proposed budget was voted on by the Board, Mr. Tom Nagle proposed a further \$30,000 cut in computer programs, \$50,000 in personnel and \$14,000 from the teachers aide budget. All of these proposed cuts were defeated. The new proposed budget was voted in unanimously.

At the General Public Session parents expressed their concern for the quality of education their children are receiving. Two taxpayers asked the Board ques-

tions relating to declining enrollment and the need for reorganization of the school district, in order to make a positive, substantial step in relieving the tax burden of retired citizens.

Mrs. Rudin expressed the need for the district to increase transportation.

Mr. Wolfson stated that there is a need for true long range planning especially in the area of budget preparation.

Mr. Nagle expressed the need for everyone to get out and vote on the budget in order to avoid austerity.

care dies, leaves, your care, or changes address; you become entitled to a pension or annuity based on employment after 1956 not covered by Social Security or if such annuity stops; you

receive workman's compensation (for disability beneficiaries) your medical condition improves (for disability beneficiaries) you go to work (for disability beneficiaries as well as others).

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## Kennedy HS Senior Wins \$22,000 Grumman Scholarship

Melissa Lin-Mei Chow of Plainview, a senior at John F. Kennedy High School, has won a Grumman Science and Engineering Scholarship worth \$22,000. The award includes \$5,500 a year for four years at any accredited engineering college of her choice.

Grumman has awarded 12 such scholarships this year to Long Island high school seniors. Some 250 students competed for the awards.

Chow plans to study applied mathematics at SUNY Binghamton. The challenge of mathematics captivates her. "I've always had a keen interest in math," she says, "and have always done well in it. I believe applied mathematics occupies a critical role in the theoretical aspects of science. I plan to devote my life to science in this way and hope my contribution will help make the world a better place to live in for all."

A high honor student with a well-rounded scholastic career, Chow finished number one in her class of 237 students.

She is a member of the National Honor Society, and won awards at Kennedy in math, biology, and Spanish. She belonged to the Mathletes, competed in math Olympiads, did public relations work in student government, worked on the school newspaper and was layout editor of the yearbook. The foreign language and chess clubs also claimed her talents.

An accomplished violinist, Chow played with the school orchestra and was a finalist in a statewide

concertmistress-soloist competition. In the community, Chow was in Project Outreach and volunteered in most community events - Discovery Day, Celebration Day, etc.

Since Grumman started the scholarship program in 1944, over \$3-million has been awarded to more than 475 students.

## New College Dept. Establishes Industry Ties

Reflecting the tremendous growth of the hotel and restaurant industry on Long Island, the Nassau Community College program in food service and hotel/motel technology has become a separate academic department, checking out of the Marketing/Retailing Department where it has been for the past 10 years. The new department's first chairman, Prof. Frederick H. Terry, has moved quickly to establish special ties with the Long Island Restaurant & Caterers Chapter of the New York State Restaurant Association.

With the cooperation of the College Office of Community Services, Prof. Terry and his teaching staff are developing a new certificate program for restaurant employees and others who hope to open their own food service facilities.

The program, which will provide instruction for budding restaurant entrepreneurs, is expected to be

launched in 1987. It will include sessions on Design and Construction of Facilities, Exterior and Interior Planning, Business and Financial Planning, Business Concept, Evaluating the Market (including site location, traffic patterns, demographics), Legal and Insurance Management, Food Service (including acquisition and sale), Pricing Strategies, Merchandising (including menu design and promotional planning), Employee Development & Training, and a Behind the Scenes On-Site Workshop.

Except for the on-site workshop, all sessions will be conducted in the College's Service laboratory by the same instructors who teach in the College's burgeoning and restaurant technology program.

"We had 21 students when we started," said Prof. Terry. "Today we serve more than 500 each semester and are second only to the Culinary Institute of America
