**New School Budget Reduced** By \$329,468 By Geraldine Geannikis

The Hicksville Board of Education held a public budget hearing on Wednes-day, June 18 at the High School Cafe. At this hear-ing, which was lightly attended, the Board

The revised budget is in the amount of \$40,638,229. This shows a reduction of \$329,468 from the original budget of \$40,967,697, which was defeated by a very small number of votes. The new proposed budget generates a tax rate increase of the original budget which

approved a revised budget to be voted on June 25th.

Under the title of General Support, \$12,000 was cut representing one clerical position and travel expenses for the Superintendent. Under the title Transporta-tion, \$9,000 was taken out due to declining enrollment of BOCES students who will no longer need transporta-tion. The title Instruction was cut by \$233,968 due to various retirements and personnel cuts made because of declining enrollment. The title Community Services was cut by \$1,000 for youth activities (materials and supplies not needed for these\*

generated a tax rate increase of \$1.99. activities). Other cuts were made under the titles Fringe.

Before the proposed budget was voted on by the Board, Mr. Tom Nagle proposed a further \$30,000 cut posed a furner 350,000 in computer programs, \$50,000 in personnel and \$14,000 from the teachers aide budget. All of these proposed cut's were defeated. The new proposed budget was voted in unanimously.

tions relating to declining enrollment and the need for reorganization of the school district, in order to make a positive, substantial step in relieving the tax burden of

Mrs. Rudin expressed the need for the district to increase transportation.

Mr. Wolfson stated that there is a need for true long range planning especially in the area of budget preparation

Mr. Nagle expressed the need for everyone to get out and vote on the budget in order to avoid austerity.

Except for the on-site workshop, all sessions will be conducted in the College's Service laboratory by the same instructors who teach in the College's bur-geoning and restaurant

technology program.
