The first topic of the Superintendent's report was a review of the goals set by the Board at the beginning of the year. Two of these had been one-year goals--the dissemination of information on an all day kindergarten and the documentation of the computer skills program K-12. Both of these goals have been met. The other five are five-year goals:

Improve student performance in mathematics.
Improve student performance in language arts.
Improve guidance services in the secondary schools.

Develope a district-wide program to track student mas-ter of basic skills.

5. Develop a plan for the improvement of the secondary program

Dr. Fenton outlined the progress made in each of these areas to date and explained that a great number of objectives have already been satified in working toward completing the work set by the Board in establishing these goals.

The second part of her report addressed the recommenda-tions of the Secondary Study Committee, formed as part of activities included in goal 5 above and briefly noted in the Curriculum Committee report at the beginning of the Board meeting.

Dr. Fenton explained that the committee, composed of 27 parents, teachers, administrators, and community represen-tatives, made two recommendations: the high school should tatives, made two recommendations: the high school should become a four-year shook, and the junior high should become a two-year middle school. These recommendations will now be reviewed by the Superintendent and the admi-nistrative staff before being forwarded to the Board for study and acceptance. Among the issues to be faced by the Board are long-term building use, financial considerations, staffing needs, and possible renovations to buildings. After a recommendation is made to the Board to building scheme. stalling needs, and possible renovations to buildings. After a recommendation is made to the Board, the community will have to be made aware of tghe educational impact of having a four-year high school and a two-year middle school. The report prepared by consultants on the topic of incorporated a aplan supporting the concept of a four-year high school, and the work of the Secondary Study Committee, an out growth of this report; is a response to the need to make more effective use of district facilities. The Superintendent also noted that any change in this direction will take more. orded that any change in this direction will take many months of study and work to put recommendations into effect and that the community and staff will be kept informed as the process continues,




