## School Board Sets July 8 Reorganization Session

After reviewing correspondence received by the Board, President William P. Bennett announced that he had attended the BOCES graduation, and he described the event as "meaningful and special." He noted that many Hicksville youngsters received awards and recognition for their accomplishments in their programs of study and that the district is proud of their achievement. Mr. Wolfson reported that he had attended the BOCES cultural arts program graduation as well as the graduation of the BOCES school for physically handicapped students, telling the Board and the audience about the unusual and inspiring proceedings.

The highlight of the preliminary section of the Board meeting was the recognition of the service to the community rendered by Larry Wolfson and Arlene Rudin during their years on the Board of Education. In presenting plaques commemorating their service, Mr. Bennett offered the thanks and appreciation of the community, and he gave each a few minutes to address the audience and reflect upon the past few years.

### July 8 Reorganization Meeting

Leading the action section was a resolution setting the date for the annual reorganization meeting of the Board. After some discussion, the Board voted to hold a special meeting on June 30 to finish business begun by the present Board members, and they set July 8 as the date for the reorganization session.

### On Other Matters

Textbooks for grades 10 and 11 English were approved by the Board. The books covered standard, basic, and Regents level courses and were evaluated and recommended by Director of Instruction Robert Durso, Principal Richard Hogan, English chair Susan Wolf, and teacher Dorothy Sabatini, Robert Zaleski, Lawrence LaMarca, Gerald Shanley, Ruth Fein, Patricia Richards, Edwin Caner, Elizabeth Daley, and Frank Bohl. The ten texts will be put into use in the coming school year.

On the fiscal side, the Board accepted transfer, warrant, and cash flow reports as well as the income eligibility guidelines agreement made between the district and the Board School Food Management of the New York State Education Department. This agreement sets the income guidelines to be used in determining eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk.

In further actions, the Board approved the renewal of the Teacher Registry contract for the coming year for services provided in securing substitutes to cover teacher absences, and bids were awarded for school district publications and for roofing. The Board also approved and accepted recommendations from the Committee on the Handicapped generated at the meetings of May 21, May 28, June 3 and June 11.

Following the schedule of personnel items, the Superintendent recommended the granting of tenure to Dutch Lane Principal Nancy DeSorbe, music teacher Hilary Sperber, and special education teachers Annarita DeLucia and Fred Gullo.

The first topic of the Superintendent's report was a review of the goals set by the Board at the beginning of the year. Two of these had been one-year goals—the dissemination of information on an all day kindergarten and the documentation of the computer skills program K-12. Both of these goals have been met. The other five are five-year goals:

1. Improve student performance in mathematics.
2. Improve student performance in language arts.
3. Improve guidance services in the secondary schools.
4. Develop a district-wide program to track student mastery of basic skills.
5. Develop a plan for the improvement of the secondary program.

Dr. Fenton outlined the progress made in each of these areas to date and explained that a great number of objectives have already been satisfied in working toward completing the work set by the Board in establishing these goals.

The second part of her report addressed the recommendations of the Secondary Study Committee, formed as part of activities included in goal 5 above and briefly noted in the Curriculum Committee report at the beginning of the Board meeting.

Dr. Fenton explained that the committee, composed of 27 parents, teachers, administrators, and community representatives, made two recommendations: the high school should become a four-year school, and the junior high should become a two-year middle school. These recommendations will now be reviewed by the Superintendent and the administrative staff before being forwarded to the Board for study and acceptance. Among the issues to be faced by the Board are long-term building use, financial considerations, staffing needs, and possible renovations to buildings. After a recommendation is made to the Board, the community will have to be made aware of the educational impact of having a four-year high school and a two-year middle school. The report prepared by consultants on the topic of incorporated a plan supporting the concept of a four-year high school, and the work of the Secondary Study Committee, an outgrowth of this report, is a response to the need to make more effective use of district facilities. The Superintendent also noted that any change in this direction will take many months of study and work to put recommendations into effect and that the community and staff will be kept informed as the process continues.

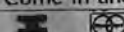
