Oyster Bay Town Board Authorizes Resource Recovery R.F.P.

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced on July 8, that the Town Board had passed a resolution authorizing the issuance of Requests for Proposals (R.F.P.) from vendors interested in building a resource recovery facility for the Town.

Colby said, "we are interested in a resource recovery system that can readily dispose of solid waste in an environmentally sound manner. It will be incumbent upon the vendor to demonstrate a substantial recycling program as part of the proposal."

The Town previously requested R.F.P.s and as a result began discussions with Blount, Inc. of Montgomery, Alabama for the construction of a mass burn facility capable of producing saleable electricity.

Colby noted that in December, 1983 TOBIDA, the Town's Industrial Development Agency, signed a Memo-

randum of Understanding with Blount which would have led to finalizing a construction contract. The memorandum with Blount could not be fulfilled when the State failed to pass legislation for Oyster Bay that had been routinely passed for other Long Island towns.

"Blount was with us every step of the way," said Colby, "it was a disappointment that the final contract could not be signed. They are highly regarded and I hope they will bid on our new package."

Included in the requirements for the new R.F.P. is a financing plan which does not require any action by the State, thereby avoiding any further delays in meeting the goal of building a waste-to-energy plant.

Documents specifying the Town's requirements in the R.F.P. will be available at the Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Hearing Date Set On Hicksville R-O Zone Request

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Douglas J. Hynes announced that the Town Board has scheduled an August 5th public hearing on a request for a change of zone in Hicksville.

Hynes said, "the applicant, Joseph Adragna, is requesting a change of zone from 'D' residence district to 'R-O' resident-office district, for a law office."

The property is located at the east side of Newbridge Road south of the intersection formed by Newbridge Road and Bernadette Court, also known as 321 Newbrid-

ge Road, Hicksville. The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, August 5, beginning at 10 AM at the Town Hall East hearing room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Hicksville Veterans Monument Fund Progress Report

Mr. Conrad Steers, Chairman of the Hicksville Veterans Monument Fund thanked all who have made donations to this newly-formed fund.

Dear Sir:
Every Memorial Day, following the parade through our Town, a short ceremony commemorating those soldiers from Hicksville who had given their lives was held at the Junior High School.

Wreaths were laid at the monuments to the great wars, taps were sounded and volleys shot.

As a student, I remember asking why there were no markers for those soldiers who had died in the lesser-known or less popular wars in Korea and Vietnam.

Thank you for beginning the effort to bring the list up to date, and remembering those who served as those before them had. Sincerely, Henry J. Dircks.

Spiegel Associates To Sponsor L.I. Ocean-To-Sound Relay

Roughly half of all students receive some form of federal financial aid when they go to college. This

statement under-scores our government's long-standing commitment to ensuring that no student need be denied a college education for lack of funds.

Last month, by an overwhelming vote of 93-1, the Senate acted to continue that tradition by approving a five-year reauthorization of the Higher Education Act. This program, which provides federal education and loan and grant assistance, is scheduled to expire October 1, 1986. This Senate action is an important step toward helping deserving Long Island students realize their dream of a college education.

The Senate bill, S. 1965, authorizes \$6.5 million for a wide range of student and direct aid programs for FY 1987. Of that amount, approximately \$3.4 billion is set aside for direct grant aid and guaranteed student

loans (GSLs). The largest programs are Pell Grants for the poor and low-interest GSLs, which help low- and middle-income students pay their college bills.

In earlier action last December, the House passed by a vote of 350-67 similar legislation, HR 3700, which Congressman Norman Lent supported. As you may know, the Balanced Budget and Deficit Reduction Act of 1985 requires Congress to achieve mandatory savings in all areas of government, including education. Mr. Lent was, therefore, pleased that both HR 3700 and S. 1965 successfully achieve necessary savings while protecting educational assistance funds for truly needy students.

Both bills increase financial aid to low-income students available through the Pell Grant Program, and

At The Town Board Meeting

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regularly scheduled Town Board Meeting on Tuesday, July 8, at Town Hall East, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay. The following matters were addressed at this meeting:

*Decision was reserved on the hearing to consider the map showing property to be acquired at Old Bethpage, to be used as the site of the new CVM garage at OBSWDC and/or any other public uses that become necessary. The owner of the property asked that the property not be condemned since the cement factory presently on the property cannot be relocated.

*The hearing on the petition of McDonald's Corp. & Paumanok Development Corp. for a special use permit to erect a restaurant with a drive-thru window in an Ind. H district at Broadway

south of Louis and First St., Hicksville, was adjourned at the request of the applicant. The applicant wishes to make adjustments to the site plan. The hearing was rescheduled for Aug. 26.

*Resolution #664 - Accepted the Town Environmental Quality Review Commission findings on the petition of Paul B. Kerantgas, George & Isabel Dargard for a change of zone at 61 Woodbury Rd., Hicksville, for the purpose of establishing an accounting business.

Postmaster Asks Owners To Restrain Pets and Protect Carriers

With the arrival of warmer weather, Hicksville General Manager/Postmaster Roger Nienaber has asked dog owners to help protect letter carriers, utility workers and other citizens from the danger of dog bites.

The Postmaster said that, nationally, more than 5,000 letter carriers were bitten by dogs last year.

"In recent years, the public has responded to our plea to keep their pets restrained, and we have seen a decline in bites nationally," Nienaber said. "Nevertheless, much is still to be done to eliminate the hazard to our employees

and other citizens who might be bitten."

Nienaber said that all dogs are territorial by nature, and even the most gentle pet will bite if it feels its domain is threatened by the presence of a carrier or other person. "With a little care, a pet owner can not only protect our carriers, but his or her pet and pocketbook, too," he said.

Postmaster Nienaber stressed that the Postal Service protects its carriers from dog bite hazards. Among remedies in situations when a pet owner fails to restrain a dog is interrup-

tion of home delivery to the residence or, in some cases, to entire neighborhoods. The Postal Service will also seek to recover worker's compensation damages and provides counseling to carriers who have been bitten and who wish to seek legal action against the dog owners.

Nienaber said these policies underscore the Postal Service's commitment to protect its employees, and added that pet owners can easily meet their responsibilities to control their pets. "We suggest that pets be

kept away from the mailboxes and areas the letter carrier uses for access to the property," he said. "If the pet cannot be kept behind a secure fence, the owner should restrain it with a secure leash or tether or at least keep the pet inside during the usual hours carriers are making their rounds."

Nienaber added, "We try to do our part by stressing awareness of dog bite danger to our carriers, but we rely heavily on the support and cooperation of the community to help us end these painful and costly injuries."

Dips In Discipleship

Contrary to what some of you may be thinking, this meditation, "Dips In Discipleship," is not a pejorative way of speaking about certain disciples of Christ. Had that been my intent, I would not have used an outdated term like "dip." We are not talking about dumb people who are out of touch with reality. Rather, I am referring to those times in our lives

as Christian disciples when we enter into the valleys of depression. The times when things get so bad that even God seems to have deserted us. We probably all have been through some of these times in our Christian lives. Perhaps some of us have dipped into the valley of depression recently and are still there. There are even

times when it seems that the harder we try to do the will of the Lord the more life gangs up on us and brings disappointment our way. As a result, we sometimes dip into pits of spiritual depression.

Now listen carefully, God deserts no one. God isn't a problem provider. There is evil in the world that causes

dips in discipleship, but there is no evil in God.

Remember the children's prayer, "God is great. God is good, and we thank him for our food?" That prayer is true. God is great and God is good—there is no evil in God. God is not the author of the dips. Crying out to God, "Why are you doing this to my life?" is dumping your garbage at the wrong doorstep. Rather, curse the Devil, the devisor of dips. Evil causes mental, physical and spiritual sickness. When we become a disciple of Christ, we can almost guarantee that old evil foe is not going to sit on his thumbs but will put a few dips in the way of our lives.

Although God does not lead us into valleys of despair, he is even present in those valleys. As the psalmist says, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I shall fear no evil, for Thou art with me." Even if we abandon God; he does not abandon us. As C.S. Lewis wrote, "The gates of hell only can be locked from the inside." God is always as close to us as a whispered prayer.

When he told the parable of the prodigal son, Jesus left no doubt that it is the Father's desire to forgive us and re-enter into a loving relationship even after we have had a dip in discipleship. When all of our best efforts have failed and we realize that we can't go it alone, through prayer we can invite the Holy Spirit to conquer the evil within us and to reinstate us as a member in good standing of God's family.

When you are engaged in a particular life crisis, remember the story of

renew three "campus-based" financial aid programs administered by college officials: The Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants, College Work-Study and National Direct Student Loans.

There were also several programs included in both bills which Mr. Lent feels would help strengthen our obligation to provide quality education for future generations. One provision would authorize funding to financially struggling colleges to improve their management and academic quality.

A second provision pro-

vides for a wide range of new and revised programs to train and recruit school teachers.

A House-Senate conference committee must now agree upon a compromise between the two versions, and Congress must give the bill its final approval before it can be signed into law. Mr. Lent is optimistic that the strong bipartisan support demonstrated in Congress for these measures will ensure prompt reauthorization of the Higher Education Act, and you can be sure he will be working to achieve that goal.
