Hicksville Soup Kitchen Receives Largest Donation

The Hicksville Interfaith Nutrition Network (I.N.N.) began operating on April 1, 1985, continues to provide a free hot lunch to needy, hungry, or homeless people of all ages in the Mid Island community. Monday through Friday, at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Hicksville. At the present time, approximately 300 individuals are served each week.

Each weekday, a dedicated group of volunteer men and women prepare the meal under the guidance of a daily coordinator who establishes the menu based on what food is available. Two other volunteer ladies have assumed the responsibility of weekly supervision and coordination. The Board of Directors, again, all volunteers from Hicksville organizations, has the overall operating responsibility of the "Soup Kitchen".

The food to be served is obtained through government surplus sources, Long Island Cares, donations from commercial establishments such as bakers, restaurants, merchants, and

individuals. Some food items are purchased. Supplies such as disposable cups, plates, napkins and cutlery are either purchased, or donated by church or synagogue groups or individuals, and recently a generous donation of several cartons of cups, napkins and assorted plastic ware came to the I.N.N. from Wendy's restaurants.

The Board of Directors has determined that the operation of the Hicksville I.N.N. costs approximately \$25 per day, \$125 per week, and \$500 per month. Donations have been received from churches and synagogues, clubs, organizations, school children, Sunday schools, youth groups, businesses and individuals. Some funds were received through a fund-raising appeal, but, the largest donation so far, came from an unsolicited donation made by The Jim Gill Golf Classic held on May 3, 1986 where about 100 golfers enjoyed a golf outing followed by a party that evening where prizes and awards were given out, and made a

Hicksville Family To Host French Student

Mr. & Mrs. Kaminek of 159 Miller Road, Hicksville will host Gauthier Mejanel from France for four weeks this summer. They have invited Gauthier Mejanel to share their home and family life through a program sponsored by the Nacel Cultural Exchanges. This program brings New York State communities students from all parts of France who wish to learn about our American way of life by living with a New York State family. The Nacel organization provides medical and accident insurance and the students bring their own spending money. The students will have the opportunity to develop greater fluency in speaking English and to establish lasting American friendships. Frequently American teenagers are invited by the family of their French visitor for

a French homestay the following summer.

The Nacel Cultural Exchanges is a participant in the President's International Youth Exchange initiative. Libertarians To Meet

John Seymour of Levittown, the Libertarian Party candidate for 14th Assembly district, will speak on campaign issues before the Nassau Libertarian Party's next meeting on July 21st. Seymour plans to speak on libertarian solutions to problems. Libertarians strongly favor free markets and individual liberty, and Seymour's proposals reflect this outlook. Seymour can be expected to hit current GOP Assemblyman Fred Parola of Wantagh for his

vote in December 1984 to increase the pay of state legislators to \$43,000 a year. The state constitution prohibits the legislators from increasing their own pay, so a special session was called after the election to pass the pay raise. Seymour proposes a rollback of the pay increase.

The Libertarians need to gather 1500 signatures to put John Seymour on the ballot. Out Of The Frying Pan Into The Fire?

If one believes everything that one reads in the daily press and listens to the television news, we are going to turn LILCO into a public agency.

This is because many of us believe what we hear and what we read is "gospel". We wish it were. But repeated enough times in our public press, the most blatant inaccuracies are printed and are believed by great numbers of us.

Now, it will take much study to determine what to do about ALL nuclear installations, not just Shoreham. But, to narrow it down to Shoreham, and add to this problem the many other associated problems which will affect LILCO if it becomes a public power, is not an easy task but it should be addressed by non-partisan experts in this field. Then, and only then can believable resolutions be considered. We know that this has not been done, for we have read what has been released by the governor's appointed committee, and run, with their comments in the press. We know what has been considered by our elected officials after they had heard in some numbers from individual citizens who believe what they read and, so form their opinions based on half-truths and inadequate solutions. Both "sides" should be sitting down with these problems and continue working until the very best solution for the residents of Long Island can be determined.

To us, the bottom line is, not only, more study is needed, but also, if you really believe that turning LILCO over to be run by the government will produce cheaper power and at least as efficient service, we have a beautiful bridge in Brooklyn, we'd like to sell you.

A Community Service

New Federal Regulations?

The United States Coast Guard is presently considering Federal Regulations promulgating a national standard for operating a vessel while intoxicated. They have 3 options: (1) The Coast Guard could adopt a mandatory Federal standard; (2) The Coast Guard could prescribe a standard that would apply only in the absence of a State standard; or (3) The Coast Guard could adopt State Standards.

Petitions Filed

Led by GOP party chairman Joseph Mondello, Republicans seeking elective office in this year's elections filed more than 23,000 pages of designating petitions with the Nassau County Board of Elections on July 10. The petitions were in addition to 1,466 pages which, pursuant to the Election Law, were filed in Albany on July 9 on behalf of candidates who live in Nassau but whose districts cross county lines. In all, Republican candidates from Nassau filed a total of 24,699 pages of petitions containing 451,105 signatures!

As a veteran diver, Gary will assist with the tasks of excavation, photography, and radio communications, as well as establishing the field site on a tiny treeless cay in the Indian Ocean.

Throughout the month of August teams of divers and marine archeologists will be researching the remains of a wreck believed to be that of the 18th century British whaler and gunship the "Lively". An 1829 chart of the area identifies the wreck, but in a location 45 miles north and west of the existing wreck site. Could this be the "Lively", or perhaps some other ship of that day. The goal of this expedition, is to raise the cannons and excavate the wreck's forward section to determine the exact identity of the ship. View From Pennsylvania Station

The busiest ticket office on the Long Island Rail Road will soon have the longest mural in the transit system.

Over 13,000 tickets are sold on an average weekday at the LIRR's Pennsylvania Station. Many of the 105,500 LIRR commuters that go through the station daily will be delighted when they glance at a mural that is to be installed behind the counter of the station's ticket office. The project is part of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority's Arts for Transit program.

The mural, 2 feet high and 52 feet long, will be unveiled by LIRR President Bruce C. Melver during a ceremony at Penn Station on Wednesday, July 23, 1986, at 11 a.m. Other MTA and LIRR officials also are expected to attend.

"This is the first mural we have placed at Penn Station, and we're very excited," said Mr. Melver. "We hope our customers and others who pass through this station will enjoy this aerial panorama of the magnificent city that surrounds Penn Station."

New York professional photographer Paula Barr

created the mural, called "Four Directions," by photographing the north, south, east, and west views of the city from atop a building adjacent to Penn Station. The photo to the north shows, among other buildings, the RCA and Chrysler in their Art Deco splendor at night; the World Trade Center and the Hudson River at twilight on the south; on the east, the Brooklyn Bridge, East River, and the Metropolitan Life building during the late afternoon; and, at sunset, the Javits Convention Center, the piers, and New Jersey.

The "Cibachrome" prints, a process that gives the photos a glossy finish, are laminated onto plexiglass. Cibachrome allows for high-quality prints so detailed that in some of the photographs people can be clearly seen in their offices or on the streets.

MTA's Arts for Transit office, which administers all performing and visual arts programs, initiated and coordinated this exhibit with the artist and the LIRR.

The mural will be on display for six months.

CHECKING IT OUT

Foreign buyers often have different expectations and demands than other prospects do. Before Chinese will buy real estate, they'll bring in a "kung chuan" expert, who'll test to see if the building is right in terms of wind, water, wood, earth and metal - elements of the building that are very important to them.

American buyers, on the other hand, are more likely to call in an engineer to inspect the building for quality of construction and adequacy of the heating and ventilation systems.
