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Dangerous Corner To Get Traffic Signal

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced that a traffic signal will be installed at the intersection of Old Country Road and East Avenue in Hicksville.

Town To Close Old Incinerator Readies For Resource Recovery

On Sept. 25 Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced that he and the members of the Town Board have scheduled the closing of the Town incinerator for December 31, 1986.

"Plans are currently underway to use this site for a state-of-the-art recycling/resource recovery plant," said Colby, "and closing of the incinerator will facilitate this project.

The incinerator, although aging, poses no health threat to the surrounding community. This fact was recently confirmed by the findings of three-and-one-half months of continuous air sampling by the Nassau County Board of Health. The plant is currently operating at partial capacity

under a consent agreement with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. Colby said, "notwithstanding the Health Department's findings, the community has expressed concern and the Town Board has chosen to demonstrate its good faith by shutting down the operation."

The December 31st closing

is predicated on the construction of the transfer station now being built by the contractor who is currently hauling Oyster Bay's waste to Pennsylvania. The transfer station is expected to be completed by late fall and the additional time will allow the shipper to streamline operations and make any necessary adjustments before taking on the additional tonnage.

HHS Commended Students

announced that these seniors placed in the top 50,000 of more than one million participants through their performance on the qualifying test in the 32nd annual Merit Program.

"The very high test performance of the young men and women who are honored as Commended Students in the Merit Program is indicative of exceptional scholastic ability," stated an officer of NMSC, which conducts the program. "We hope that NMSC's recognition of

these high school students will increase their motivation to make the best use of their talents and to develop the skills that will be needed by the future leaders of our nation. Being named a Commended Student in this keen competition is a credit to those young citizens as well as to their schools, which play a key role in their development."

Participants entered the current Merit Program by taking the PSAT/NMSQT in October 1985, when most of them were juniors.

Although their qualifying test scores are high, the 35,000 young people throughout the nation who are Commended Students scores slightly below the level required for Semifinalist standing in the Merit Program. Only the 15,000 Semifinalists, including H.H.S. seniors Scott O'Callaghan and Michael Doherty, whose names were announced on September 11, will continue in the competition for some 6,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 1987.

Town Sets Oct. 7 Hearing On Boarding and Rooming Houses

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Angelo A. Delligatti announced that the Town Board has scheduled a public hearing for October 7 to more clearly define the Code of Ordinances as it relates to boarding and rooming houses and to amend those sections dealing with land and building requirements as they pertain to these facilities.

Delligatti said, "under consideration are clear definitions as to what constitutes a boarding house or rooming house, which are only permissible in 'D' and 'E' Residence Districts, and minimum criteria for lot size and habitable area permitted."

The hearing will also take under advisement amending the present law to require annual inspections of boarding houses and rooming houses by the Planning and Development Department. Such uses would require the prior approval of

the Zoning Board of Appeals.

At RR Crossings

Even If It's A Tie - You Lose!!!

Nassau County Executive Francis T. Purcell urged motorists to exercise extreme caution when traversing rail-highway crossings.

"Many drivers fail to recognize the potential hazards of railroad crossings," said Purcell. "Each year people are maimed or killed in accidents involving motor vehicles and

trains. Motorists can easily avoid such tragedies with safe driving habits and common sense."

Purcell said that the Long Island Rail Road has developed several railroad crossing safety tips for drivers:

1. Watch for the round yellow warning sign and white pavement markings when you approach a railroad crossing.
 2. Slow down at the yellow and black "RR" sign. Listen and look for trains before crossing the tracks...be prepared to stop.
 3. Be aware of the railroad crossbuck that lets you know how many tracks you are crossing.
 4. Gates and flashing lights are used at LIRR crossings. Stop before the gates are lowered across your side of the road. Remember, just as with any red traffic signal, the flashing red lights mean you must stop!
- Purcell also said that a detailed pamphlet outlining railroad crossing safety, "Even if it's a Tie... You Lose", is being made available by the LIRR through libraries, driver education classes, and community organizations in Nassau County. 1986 International Holiday Mailing Dates

"For those with relatives in the armed services stationed overseas, and those who wish to mail holiday greetings and packages to others living in foreign countries, now is the time to plan for holiday mailings," says Roger Nienaber, General Manager/Postmaster of Hicksville Division.

Parcels sent to military personnel in Australia, the Far East and Southeast Asia have to be mailed by October 17 if shipped by surface mail, the least expensive form of shipment.

November is the month when most parcels shipped via Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL) should be sent. PAL packages are airlifted domestically to a gateway facility, then airlifted on a space available basis from

the gateway to the APO (Army or Air Force Post Office).

Packages up to 30 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth may be sent by PAL. Mailers pay the regular Parcel Post rate to the U.S. exit port or from the port of entry plus a fee for air service. The air service fee is 30 cents for parcels weighing two pounds or less, 60 cents for three to four pounds, 90 cents for three to four pounds, and \$1.20 for four to 30 pounds.

November mailers can also ship military parcels by Space Available Mail (SAM). Items shipped by SAM are transported by surface means in the contiguous 48 states and flown on a space available basis from

the U.S. to the overseas destination or from the overseas destination to the U.S. Packages up to 15 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth may be sent by SAM for regular Parcel Post rates to the U.S. exit port or from the U.S. port of entry.

When mailed from a military post office outside the 48 contiguous states, the weight of any piece cannot be more than 70 pounds and the size cannot exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined.

Here are three calendars of suggested mailing dates to assure parcels and greetings will arrive on time. More information on international mailings is available from postmasters or post office window clerks.
