Hicksville To Formally Dedicate Korean & Vietnam War Memorial On Nov. 11

In formal ceremony on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, Hicksville will unveil and dedicate memorials to the men and women of the community who served or lost their lives in the Korean War and in the Southeast Asian conflict. The ceremony will begin at 9:45 instead of 10 a.m. - as previously announced - and will be followed by the traditional Veterans Day service immediately after, culminating in the veterans' rifle salute and "Taps" at 11 a.m.

Participating in the unveiling and solemn dedication ceremony will be: leaders and members of Hicksville veterans posts and their auxiliaries; reverend clergy of the community's churches and temples, and several speakers, including Conrad Steers, President of the Nassau Chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America and the Chairman of the Hicksville Veterans Monument Fund Drive which is still raising erection

funds from the public.

Congressional Medal of Honor holder George Lang, who attended Hicksville schools and served in the U.S. Army in Vietnam, will be among the distinguished guests present. Among the speakers will be William Bennett, President of the Board of Education, who served in Korea. The program coordinator, Richard Evers, is pleased to announce, as well, that students from the National Honor Societies and the Senior Class officers of both the Hicksville Senior and Junior High Schools will participate. The President of the High School Honor Society, Jeff Fried, will speak on behalf of the Hicksville student body.

Invitations are being extended to the parents of all known Korean and Vietnam War casualties now residing in or near Hicksville, and all "Gold Star" families are cordially invited to be present for this tribute

to their fallen heroes.

The ceremonies will be held at the Hicksville War Memorials Site, the south end of the Junior High School, Jerusalem Avenue and Fourth Street, and will

begin at 9:45. Participants in the program are asked to be present at least by 9:30. In the event of rain, the dedication ceremonies will be held in the Junior High School auditorium.

Controls Over Boarding & Rooming Houses Tightened By T.O.B.

The Oyster Bay Town Board has amended the Code of Ordinances to more clearly define the regulations regarding land and building usage as they pertain to boarding and rooming houses, according to Town Councilman Angelo A. Delligatti.

"The Board set the minimum lot size for a boarding

house or a rooming house in either a "D" or "E" residence district at 12,000 square feet. The minimum habitable area of the dwelling cannot be less than 2,000 square feet, and the dwelling may not cover more than 25 percent of the lot. There must be one person who resides on the premises who rents or

leases the entire premises.

The Board also stipulated that there will be at least one annual inspection of all boarding houses in the Town by inspectors from the Town's Department of Planning and Development. Additional inspections may be conducted if deemed necessary.

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Hicksville Student Wins National Safety Award

Barbara Balistreri, a senior at Hicksville High School, is a member of a team of six BOCES Nassau Tech students who have won a prestigious Award of Honor from the National Safety Council. Only sixteen such awards are being given nationwide.

The students, all enrolled last year in Nassau Tech's Large Animal Care program, submitted a project called "No Nonsense Horse Sense." Inspired by last year's tragic fire at Belmont Racetrack, the project included student-developed pamphlets, flyers, telephone labels, bumper stickers, crossword puzzles and other materials on the theme of safety. Their goal was to distribute such materials to all stables in the county.

Approximately 6,000 safety projects were prepared for competitions held by various national youth organizations, such as Future Farmers of America, Vocational Industrial Clubs of America, Girl Scouts and

State Senators Michael J. Tully, Jr. (R-Roslyn Heights) and Ralph J. Marino (R-Oyster Bay) met in Albany on October 7 to discuss proposed legislation to insure swift and certain punishment of criminals convicted of drug-related crimes, particularly "crack." Senator Marino formerly was Chairman of the Senate Standing Committee on Crime and Correction of which both he and Senator Tully are now members.

Senator Marino also serves on the Senate Judiciary Committee.

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Board of Ed Addresses Shortfall In Current Budget

On Oct. 22 Hicksville Board of Education President William P. Bennett made a report to the Board and residents assembled for the regular business meeting about the annual convention of the New York State School Boards Association held last weekend in Rochester. He reported on sessions he attended, particularly those dealing with the teaching of values and issues in the schools which go beyond the subject matter in the academic curriculum. He noted that our district will be in the forefront in responding to current problems faced by schools. He also recognized two awards presented at a luncheon held by the New York School Public Relations Association, meeting in Rochester at the same time as NYSSBA. The November issue of the **Bulletin Board** received an award of merit for excellence in educational journalism, and the 1985-86 calendar won an award of honor. Mr. Bennett, Mrs. Wolf, and Dr. Fenton joined public relations officer Alayne Shoenfeld at the luncheon for these presentations. Mr. Bennett also noted that HHS student Barbara Balistreri, who has received honors by the National Safety Council at a ceremony at Nassau Tech, Miss Balistreri's picture has appeared in the Nassau Tech calendar and in promotional materials for their programs.

Mrs. Wolf also reported on the NYSSBA convention, listing the resolutions passed at the annual business meeting and discussing matters addressed by the delegates.

During the committee reports segment, Mr. Nagle mentioned the presentations made by Dr. Toepfer, consultant on the middle school plan, and he praised the team effort on the

part of the secondary administrators and staff. Reporting on the Finance Committee meeting, Mr. Nagle addressed the shortfall in the current budget and explained that a 20% freeze will be in effect until January in an effort to save approximately \$400,000. The actual shortage is \$250,000. The situation will be reviewed in January, when further decisions will be made regarding the freeze on the general fund expenditures.

In Other Matters....

The Facilities and Community Affairs report included an update on the project to place monuments to Korean and Viet Nam veterans on the lawn of the Junior High School in the memorial park area. Mr. Bennett noted that the community had raised \$7800 for this project and that the site is being prepared by the Facilities and Operations crew. The unveiling of the monuments will take place on Veterans Day, November 11, at 9:45 am.

"The 'road testing' of these two laws revealed certain defects, primarily in procedures for resolving consumer complaints and in the range of vehicles covered, which the Legislature has now acted to correct.

"Both laws are intended to assist purchasers of seriously or permanently defective motor vehicles, commonly known as 'lemons,' by requiring replace-

ment or refunds when repair efforts over a reasonable period of time fail to correct major problems.

"The first significant change expands the scope of the new car 'lemon law.'

"Until this year, only passenger motor vehicles that failed to live up to a manufacturer's warranty were subject to the replacement or refund provisions of the law. Now, purchasers of new light trucks, vans and lease vehicles will receive the same protection.

"Another important change is that motorists will have a new option, beginning January 1, 1987, for resolving 'lemon law' disputes. Motorists will be able to pay a fee to bring their problem before a professional arbitrator regulated by the State Attorney General's Office. The arbitrator would then act as an objective third party to negotiate a solution.

The November issue of the **Bulletin Board** received an award of merit for excellence in educational journalism, and the 1985-86 calendar won an award of honor. Mr. Bennett, Mrs. Wolf, and Dr. Fenton joined public relations officer Alayne Shoefeld at the luncheon for these presentations. Mr. Bennett also noted that HHS student Barbara Balistreri, who has received honors by the National Safety Council at a ceremony at Nassau Tech, Miss Balistreri's picture has appeared in the Nassau Tech calendar and in promotional materials for their programs.

Mrs. Wolf also reported on the NYSSBA convention, listing the resolutions passed at the annual business meeting and discussing matters addressed by the delegates.

During the committee reports segment, Mr. Nagle mentioned the presentations made by Dr. Toepfer, consultant on the middle school plan, and he praised the team effort on the

part of the secondary administrators and staff. Reporting on the Finance Committee meeting, Mr. Nagle addressed the shortfall in the current budget and explained that a 20% freeze will be in effect until January in an effort to save approximately \$400,000. The actual shortage is \$250,000. The situation will be reviewed in January, when further decisions will be made regarding the freeze on the general fund expenditures.

In Other Matters...

The Facilities and Community Affairs report included an update on the project to place monuments to Korean and Viet Nam veterans on the lawn of the Junior High School in the memorial park area. Mr. Bennett noted that the community had raised \$7800 for this project and that the site is being prepared by the Facilities and Operations crew. The unveiling of the monuments will take place on Veterans Day, November 11, at 9:45 am.
