The Hicksville Community Council (which really means all of you), fresh from the triumph of its Annual Awards Dinner last month, has scheduled an informative, interesting program for Thursday, Nov. 6, starting promptly at 8 p.m. in the downstairs community room of the Hicksville public Library on Jerusalem Ave.

A panel consisting of Dr.

Conrad Toepfer, a nationally-known expert on the middle school, Mr. Jay Klein, principal of the Hicksville Junior High School, Mr. Richard Hogan, principal of the Hicksville High School, President of the Hicksville Board of Education William Bennett, and Mr. Peter J. The Hicksville High School HIGHLIGHTS

This past week has been one of truly great proportions for Hicksville High School and her students, largely as the result of the Homecoming and its activities and the Volunteer Club's Blood Drive. Let's take a look at each.

The Homecoming festivities began last Saturday with a parade from the Junior High School to the High School football field. The game commenced soon after, with the Hicksville Comets attempting to rout the Massapequa Chiefs. At the half-time, Hicksville trailed Massapequa 15-14. Then, the floats were paraded around the track, with a massive trophy being awarded to the Senior Float. After this, the Sophomore and Junior Princesses, as well as the senior Homecoming Queen, were crowned; they were Michelle Heberer, Lisa Connaughton, and Manuela Morin, respectively. The game continued, with Hicksville to finally lose with the score of 43-20. That evening, a dance was held in the gym.

Blood Drive. The words evoke the image of a masked

doctor attempting to jab, a ten-foot long needle into a trembling victim's arm. Yet, this was really not the case last Thursday, a fact that 115 high school students can swear to from personal experience. Twelve other students attempted to give blood, but were medically excused due to low body weight or blood complication. This number shows an increase of nineteen donors from the Blood Drive held last October. This blood will help supply Long Island with blood needed to supplement operation patients who have lost blood. The blood collected at the high school will supply 575 people with blood, or blood products.

But who ran this Blood Drive? It was the work of the Volunteer Club, advised by Mrs. Barbara Walling. Its officers are as follows: Larry Menzie, President; Joanne Rivera, First Vice-President; Florence Hogan, Second Vice-President; Lisa Reinhardt, Corresponding Secretary; Roseann Pilutik, Recording Secretary; Kim Baitz, Treasurer. When

asked as to the club's purpose, Mrs. Walling stated that it is simply "to help other people."

Their activities cover a broad base of activities in a wide range of areas. On the international level, they are supporting Joaciana Alves Paulino, their foster child in Brazil. They range from visiting the elderly at the United Presbyterian Home to throwing parties for the children at St. Christopher's Home for Kids. They collect food and clothing for various organizations for the needy. To raise money for the American Cancer Society, the members of the Volunteer Club sell flowers to the student body on holidays so the flowers can then be distributed anonymously to "secret admirers."

All in all, the Volunteer Club represents a group of students dedicated to helping others and enriching the world around them. Through their efforts, the world around them is a better place.

Oyster Bay Throws Switch On Largest Natural Electric Power Operation

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby held a press conference today, October 30, at the site of Long Island's largest methane gas to electricity generating operation.

Referring to the operation located at the Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex, Colby said, "Gone are the days when prospectors headed west to find gold in the hills; nowadays we can find revenue in the hills by drilling for methane gas where garbage was once landfilled."

The Supervisor noted that during the first ten years of a twenty-year contract the Town will gain approximately \$1.6 million of revenue in the general Town Budget.

"The Oyster Bay facility will be the largest of Energy Tactic's Long Island operations. At full capacity its three generators will deliver 2 1/2 megawatts of electricity to Liko...enough energy to feed the needs of 1300-1500 homes," said Colby.

In September of 1985, after considering three viable proposals, the Town of Oyster Bay selected Energy Tactic, Inc. of Yaphank to install the equipment necessary to draw off the methane and signed a twenty-year agreement with them.

The extraction of methane gas from decaying garbage is a widely used method of limiting landfill odors and removing the key element in underlying landfill fires as well as gaining a previously untapped source of revenue.

In explaining the operation, Colby noted that wells are strategically spaced on the landfill site, to a depth of 50 feet. Perforated plastic pipes are then inserted into the center of the wells. The individual pipes are connected to the header

equipment which delivers the gas to the compressors feeding the three engines.

At present there are 13 active extraction wells on site and their number will eventually reach more than 30 as access to the more recently capped sections of the landfill becomes available.

Colby noted that during the first half-dozen years of the facility's operation the project will generate the highest level of electricity production and therefore the greatest amount of revenue for the Town.

"An important feature of any operation of this nature is the safety factor," said Colby. "This project is inherently secure since the gas, as it is extracted from the landfill, contains insufficient oxygen for any degree of combustion. Only when the fuel source is contained in the engine cylinders is the air then mixed to fire the engines. Monitoring of the system takes place both on site and through direct equipment observation in E.T.'s Yaphank offices."

The Supervisor concluded, "Landfills have existed for hundreds of years. They served a purpose at a time when more sophisticated methods of garbage disposal were unknown or untried. The technology that Energy Tactic, Inc. has developed gives to towns such as Oyster Bay a method by which to rid landfills of potentially harmful methane gases while supplementing budget revenues."

The additional review is required under conditions to be imposed by the Town Board during a one year moratorium on change of zone and special use permit applications.

At The Board of Education Meeting

(Continued from last week)

The adoption of a workbook titled **The Long Island Story** for use in grade 4 in keeping with the local history component of the state social studies curriculum was the first item on the action agenda. This book was recommended by Director of Instruction Robert Durso, Willet Avenue Principal Michael Dunn, and Willet fourth grade teachers Irma Carlson and Barbara Bunting.

In further actions, the Board deleted policies on vacation time for administrators and the placement of clerical employees, adopted a resolution renewing the use of services of the Nassau Tech Occupational Education Citizens Advisory Council, and adopted the high school program of studies for 1987-88. This will be the first year of the new four-year high school following the reorganization which will be implemented next September.

Actions taken on fiscal matters including the acceptance of warrant, transfer, and cash flow reports, the approval of insurance coverage for the district treasurer and other employees requiring such a bond, and the award of bids for athletic supplies, industrial arts supplies, and magazines and periodicals for a total award of \$31,400.74.

Following personnel items, the Board approved recommendations of the Committee on Special Education generated at the meetings of September 24, October 1, and October 8. Mr. Nagle expressed high praise for the work of the special education administrators and staff, noting the excellence of Hicksville's program and the fine reputation it holds in our region.

Dr. Fenton reported on the participation of the marching band in the competition sponsored by **Newsday**. Fifty-five of our students were involved and they put on an excellent demonstration for the judges and the audience.

The Superintendent's report continued with an overview of the budget preparation calendar for this year. Public committee discussions of the 1987-88 budget will begin on December 17 on the Board committee meeting night. Dr. Fenton also noted that the Comprehensive Assessment Report (CAR) will be presented at the November Board meeting. This report, prepared by the state, is a compilation of results of testing in the Pupil Evaluation Program in elementary reading, writing, and math, Regents testing, and

other statistical information including attendance, enrollment, and dropout rates. Regulations require that this information be published annually.

Dr. Fenton concluded her report with an update on the reserve account and on the memos sent to educational organizations regarding the availability of rental space at the Junior High School.

Other information items included the presentation of the policy on corporal punishment for revision and textbooks for use in tenth grade social studies and K-2 reading classes.

The Board approved four staff appointments among the personnel items. Marie Marshall, currently serving as Coordinator of Enrichment Programs, was appointed as an Assistant Principal for the new Middle School, and Mary Sue Carr, Physical Education and Health Chair at the High School, was appointed Coordinator of High School Transition Programs. Patricia Collier was assigned as a half-time Kindergarten teacher at Old Country Road, and Robert Baker was appointed part-time Latin teacher at the Junior High.

The Board accepted the resignation of SHS social studies teacher Joseph Umbria, who will retire at the end of the current school year. Mr. Umbria will have served the district for 28 years when he leaves the staff in June.

Rita Pendergast, Charlotte Anstey, and Kathryn Gorman were appointed as teacher aides at Old Country Fork, and Lee, and Anthony Neglia, Christopher Zounek, Earl Hurley, Robert Kast, and Joseph Bueno were appointed to positions in the Facilities and Operations Department.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Education will be held on November 25 at 8:15 pm in the conference room of the Administration Building on Division Avenue. Board committee meetings will be held on November 19. The Curriculum and District Facilities, Community Affairs Committees will meet at 8 pm and the Finance and Policy Legislative Committee meetings will begin at 9 pm.

BALLOT PROPOSAL NO. 1: ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOND ACT OF 1986,

Chapter 511 of the Laws of 1986.

This act will create a state debt of up to \$1.45 billion "...to provide moneys for the preservation, enhancement, restoration and improvement of the quality of the state's environment."

Of this amount, \$1.1 billion will go towards cleaning up hazardous waste sites throughout the State. Industry will pay 50% of the debt service on this portion of the Bond Act through existing waste-end taxes and petroleum transfer fees (State Superfund). If existing revenues are inadequate for industry's half share, the petroleum fees are to increase as well as regulatory fees.

Also, \$100 million will be available to municipalities in interest-free loans to assist them in closing their nonhazardous waste landfills.

The remaining \$250 million will be for land acquisition, municipal and urban cultural parks, and historic preservation. A limited number of projects involving the Forest Preserve and environmentally sensitive areas such as lands of exceptional beauty, open space, wildlife habitat, wetlands, pine barrens, aquifer recharge areas, and trailways will be funded. Bond Act moneys could provide up to 50% of funds necessary for acquisition, development, or improvement of indoor or outdoor municipal recreational facilities. Urban cultural park projects would be eligible for 100% funding. There would also be assistance, up to 30%, for historic preservation projects where the sites are owned by not-for-profit corporations, municipalities, or the State.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY CHAPTER 9 "EXPLOSIVES AND FIREARMS"

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, that Chapter 9, "Explosives and Firearms" of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

AMEND: Section 9-5: Approval of County Police Department prerequisite to issuance of permits under this chapter.

ADD: Section 9-5: Permit Fees; Approval of Nassau County Police Department-Bomb Squad; Persons Exempt from Fee; Proof of Insurance; Expiration of Permits.

A. A fee of (\$10.00) shall be charged for each town permit issued under this Chapter; however, there shall be no fee for the issuance of a permit to a school or educational institution approved by the Board of Regents of the State of New York.

B. No permit will be issued pursuant to this Chapter without first obtaining the approval of the Nassau County Police Department-Bomb Squad, in writing, which approval shall be attached to the application for the permit before the application is acted upon.

C. No permit shall be issued until an indemnity insurance policy in limits of not less than five hundred thousand/one million dollars (\$500,000/\$1,000,000) for personal injury or death and five hundred thousand/one million dollars (\$500,000/\$1,000,000) for property damage in an approved company is filed with the Town Clerk.

D. A permit issued pursuant to this Chapter shall only be in effect for the individual special event for which the permit is requested.

E. All permits issued pursuant to this Chapter shall expire upon conclusion of the special event for which they are issued.

F. No permit granted hereunder shall be transferable.

AMEND: Section 9-6: Permit Fees; Person Exempt From Fee; Expiration Date of Permits.

DELETE: Entire body of Section 9-6.

ADD: In its place and stand the following:

Section 9-6: Rules and Regulations for Fireworks Displays.

A. The actual point at which the fireworks are to be fired shall be at least three hundred (300) feet from the nearest permanent building, public highway or railroad or other means of travel, and at least fifty (50) feet from the nearest aboveground telephone or telegraph line, tree or other overhead obstruction.

B. The audience at such display shall be restrained behind lines at least three hundred (300) feet from the

point at which the fireworks are discharged.

C. Only persons in active charge of the display shall be allowed inside those lines.

D. All fireworks that fire a projectile shall be so set up that the projectile will go into the air as nearly as possible in a vertical direction, unless such fireworks are to be fired from the shore of a lake or other large body of water, when they may be directed in such manner that the falling residue from the deflagration will fall into the lake or body of water.

E. Any fireworks that remain unfired after the display is concluded shall be immediately disposed of in a way safe for the particular type of fireworks remaining.

F. No fireworks display shall be held during any windstorm in which the wind reaches a velocity of more than thirty (30) miles per hour.

G. All the persons in actual charge of firing the fireworks shall be over the age of eighteen (18) years, competent and physically fit for the task.

H. There shall be at least two (2) such operators constantly on duty during the discharge, and at least two (2) soda-acid or other approved-type fire extinguishers of at least two and one-half (2½) gallons' capacity each shall be kept at as widely separated points as possible within the actual area of the display.

I. The pyrotechnist in charge, or any assistant, must be qualified for this profession and have his credentials available for examination by the Town Clerk.

J. Care must be used by the pyrotechnician in the selection of assistants, for whose acts he shall be deemed responsible.

K. All discharges must be kept within the territorial limits of the area for which the permit is issued. This area shall be cleared of spectators and kept cleared during the display. The area shall be marked by red lanterns kept lighted during the period of the display.

L. All mortars shall be imbedded in the ground and be protected by sandbags. No mortar piece exceeding five (5) inches in diameter shall be used or discharged.

M. No fire balloons, girandoles, parachutes or stick skyrockets shall be used or discharged.

N. No more than one (1) display shall be permitted at a given place and date.

O. Displays shall carefully clean up the grounds immediately after each display, and all undischarged fireworks and explosives of any kind shall be removed by the displayer before leaving the location.

P. In the finale or closing set pieces of fireworks, the tubes shall not be larger than two (2) inches in diameter. The tubes shall be constructed of cardboard only. On the ground finale, the tubes shall not be larger than three (3) inches.
