Towns of Oyster Bay & Hempstead Set Joint Meeting For Dec. 9

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby announced that the Towns of Oyster Bay and Hempstead will conduct joint public hearings on December 9 to consider two proposals. One will increase the established maximum amount which can be spent on improvements to the joint Community Hall and Swimming Pool district and the second will take under consideration improvements to the water supply and water distribution facilities within the joint Water Districts.

Colby said, "Within the joint pool district there are nine swimming pools, two of which are located in the Hicksville area. More than 2,000 residents of Oyster Bay and Hempstead enjoy using these facilities which require maintenance and improvement."

The hearing on water improvements is at the request of the Board of Commissioners of the Hicksville Water District

so that they will be able to continue supplying adequate, acceptable water within the district.

The Water District is requesting permission to install a 600-foot well on property located at Plainview Road and Old Country Road (Triangle Park) in Hicksville.

"The Town recently signed an agreement to lease a portion of Triangle Park to the Water District," Colby said. "The funds from the agreement will be used to improve the park with benches, play equipment and landscaping."

The hearings will be held at Levittown Hall, Levittown Parkway, Hicksville, beginning at 9 AM.

Colby noted that since the hearings are being held on the day of a regularly-scheduled Oyster Bay Town Board meeting, the Oyster Bay meeting will begin at 11 AM.

Eleven members of local PTA units attended this year's 89th annual New York State PTA Convention held November 9-12 at the Concord Hotel, Kiamesha Lake. Concerned people from all paths and persua-

sions highlighted the broad base of this organization whose priority is the development of children.

At a recent Hicksville PTA Council meeting, delegates reported on the various workshops they attended, including, legislation, special education, AIDS, Crack and other illegal drugs, parliamentary procedures, safety, parent-child relationships and PINS (Pupils In Need of Supervision).

Carol Marks, Senior High School PTA President, reported that all 21 resolutions, plus 2 emergency resolutions presented at convention, were passed either in original or

amended form. These resolutions will now be sent to the Legislature in Albany for consideration.

In the keynote address, Dr. Thomas Sobol, Scarsdale Superintendent of Schools, told the delegates that the interests of children were continuing to lose ground. Reviewing the spate of reports on American schools published during the past 6 years, he noted that students' test results and achievements were analyzed, but human qualities were totally ignored. The more recent reports have focused on teachers in regard to the needs of society not children.

Citing many statistics that

Parola Opposes LIA's 10-Cent Gas Tax, Calls For GOP Highway Plan

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) stated his opposition to the 10-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax proposed by the Long Island Association (LIA), while affirming his continued support for an Assembly Republican proposal to guarantee that additional state funds are available to address Long Island's critical traffic problems. Parola maintained that the Assembly Republican's Dedicated Highway Fund legislation would ensure that existing state highway user taxes and fees would be used exclusively for road and bridge construction and repair.

"While it is laudable that the LIA is proposing solutions to the critical problems affecting Long Island, another tax on our already over-taxed residents and businesses is not the answer," Parola said. "The Dedicated Highway Fund would guarantee that funds raised from transportation uses would be spent on transportation maintenance." Parola further asserted that in a state budget of over \$40 billion, adequate resources should be readily available to fund the necessary repair of the state's

roads, bridges and infrastructure. The lawmaker noted that while approximately \$1 billion is generated each year through state gasoline excise taxes, state Department of Motor Vehicle (DMV) registrations and licenses and highway use taxes, less than half of that amount (about \$490 million) is used for our highways and local roads, with the remaining funds diverted into the state general fund. "Had this proposal been adopted at an earlier date, the 1983 transportation bond issue probably would

not have been necessary. However, the governor and other Democrats in Albany have refused to adopt our proposal," he said. According to Parola, the legislation would: — establish a Highway Rehabilitation Fund comprised of revenues from the highway use tax, the motor fuel excise tax, and fees collected by the state Department of Motor Vehicles; — target monies from the fund for use in highway reconstruction, bridge reconstruction or replacement. 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Colby & Gulotta End Tax Lien Speculation System

Stating that "A system which does not take into consideration the sanctity of one's home and which condones the taking of one's property without fair remuneration is a system which can no longer be countenanced," Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Thomas S. Gulotta and Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby led the Nassau County Board of Supervisors in the passage of a local law which effectively ends Nassau County's 47 year old tax lien speculation system - a system which allowed some unfortunate homeowners to lose their homes to tax lien speculators for only a few dollars in unpaid taxes. "The existing tax lien speculation system is dead," Gulotta said.

According to Gulotta, majority leader of the Board, the tax lien reform measures passed by the Board of Supervisors "impose a humane and compassionate system of checks and balances on the method by which the County collects past due taxes. Primarily, the Board's action ensures that no one will ever again lose the equity in their home to a speculator for the failure to pay a few dollars in property taxes."

The reform legislation promoted by Supervisors Gulotta and Colby has three major provisions. The most radical change in the tax lien collection procedure ends the practice whereby a tax lien speculator would purchase a lien against a home

in tax arrears and then, at the expiration of a two year period, gain full title to the home solely for the amount of the unpaid tax. Under the newly adopted legislation, at the end of the two year tax lien period, if the homeowner were still in tax arrears, the lien holder would be required to institute a court supervised foreclosure proceeding, with the full value of the home, after the payment of the past due tax, interest and any reasonable court costs, going to the homeowner.

In addition, the new legislation provides for an improved notification procedure in plain and simple language. Under the new system, homeowners in tax arrears will be made fully aware that they owe past due taxes, and what steps must be taken so as to not jeopardize their home. "By requiring personal notification to the homeowner in plain and simple English, rather than complex legal terminology, we will be ensuring that no one will be put in the position of losing their home unknowingly and without a full opportunity to pay their back taxes," Supervisor Colby said.

The final aspect of the tax lien reform package was described by Supervisor Gulotta: "The Board has authorized the establishment of a Hardship Review Board which would be empowered to hear the cases of those individuals in tax arrears who had a legitimate hardship reason for being behind in their taxes. In

addition to having the authority to grant a years extension to the normal two year tax lien period, the Hardship Review Board would also be able to provide counseling and advice to those individuals having difficulty in meeting their tax obligations."

This new local law, which will now be going into effect with the Board's unanimous assent, was made retroactive to cover all individuals with a tax lien outstanding against their home.

"The tax lien speculation systems is dead," Supervisors Gulotta and Colby declared. "No one in Nassau County will ever again lose the value of their home because of the non-payment of taxes. This reform legislation provides the protection that every Nassau County homeowner deserves."

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Mail Early Season Opens

The Postal Service is cooperating with the business community of Hicksville in urging customers to shop early and mail early for the holidays.

General Manager/Postmaster Roger Nienaber asks holiday shoppers to mail early this year to make sure that mail is addressed correctly (including ZIP Codes) and that packages are wrapped correctly so that

cards and parcels reach their destinations in plenty of time for the holidays.

"Normally, we handle about 1.5 million pieces of mail a day — including cards, letters and packages, in the Hicksville Division but during the holiday season, volume goes up to about 3-4 million pieces," the Postmaster says. "We in the Postal Service take pride in carrying your messages of

love and joy. Mailing early helps us deliver the messages on time."

The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly. Postmaster Nienaber says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Customers should also take care to write legible ZIP Coded addresses for both the address and the return

address. The use of ZIP Codes following the name of the particular city and state aids us in processing the mail.

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season."

New Program For Senior Citizens

Nassau County Executive Francis T. Purcell recently announced the receipt of a \$95,000 legislative grant from the New York State Department of Social Services for an in-home respite program for frail elderly.

"This program will provide excellent in-home care for the frail elderly," said Purcell. "We will be making this type of needed service available to families who could not normally afford it."

The grant, secured

through the efforts of New York State Senator Dean Skelos, will provide respite services and/or supportive counseling to approximately 150 families during its first year of operation. The program, to be administered by the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs, will operate under contract with the Education Assistance Center of Long Island, Inc. The Education Assistance Center will recruit, train and supervise a corps of volun-

teers who will be available to provide in-home, short and long term care, giving temporary relief to relatives and friends caring for frail elderly. Respite care, less costly than institutional care, is more responsive to the needs of frail elderly and allows senior citizens to continue living at home with caring relatives.

Services will be rendered on a sliding scale fee basis, and will concentrate on lower to middle income families who cannot afford

standard home health care fees and for whom Medicaid-supported respite services are unavailable.

The program will begin with a six-month planning and program development phase which will include recruitment and training of volunteers. When fully operational, the program will serve about 20 to 25 families per month. Those interested in training as volunteers should contact the Education Assistance Center of Long Island at 489-7733.

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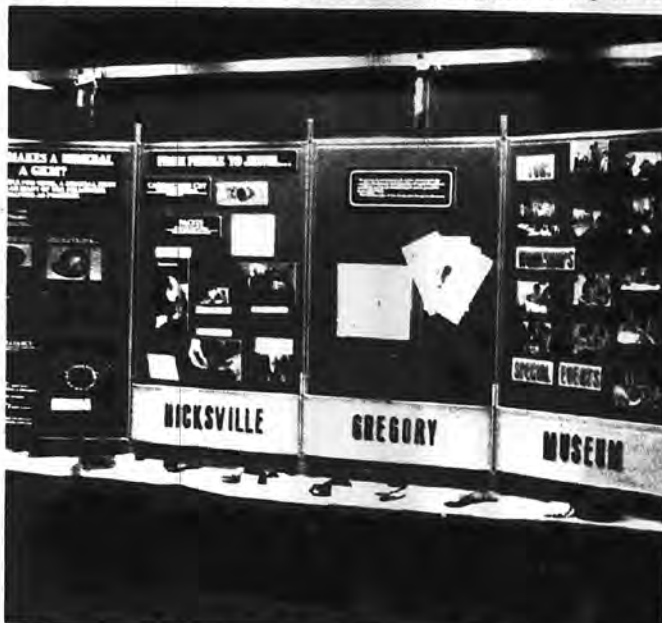

IN THE PROVERBIAL PITS

Most of us think we are pretty good—not worthy of going to hell. In commercials we are told to use a variety of products. Why? Because we are worth it. Commercials and best-selling books discourage us from seeing ourselves in a negative light, unable to be in control over every situation in life—even over our life beyond life.

Therefore, if someone says to you, "Go to hell," it is an affront. The person who says such a thing infers that in his opinion you are not number one but that you are the pits. We have no right to say such a thing, for it is much like the pot calling the kettle black. Yet, when Jesus Christ returns to earth at the end of time, he will have to tell billions of people to "go to hell." Why? Because all people are sinners and cannot save themselves. Until we recognize our sinfulness, we will never desire a savior. The problem is that we all think we're pretty good people. Compared to what?—other sinner, maybe—but not to a righteous God.

An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, capital notes and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Massapequa Post, Bethpage Tribune, Mid Island Herald & Locust Valley Leader, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law.
