The Hicksville Division of the Postal Service currently employs over 30 hearing impaired employees. Many were students at the Mill Neck School for the Deaf. The school recently held a luncheon to thank Dolores Witowski, Hicksville Post Office Personnel Assistant, for her outstanding contribution to all handicapped people.

In presenting the award, Peter Minnick, Mill Neck Job Developer, emphasized Ms. Witowski's extraordinary efforts in devoting her time and efforts to special programs. She is currently enrolled in Nassau Community College's Sign Language Course.

Ms. Witowski and two

other postal supervisors, John Hopkins and Gregory Staab, received a letter of thanks from Postmaster General Preston R. Tisch in response to a letter from the father of a handicapped employee. The letter stated that these employees "displayed the highest of human god-given virtues, compassion, but they have remained true to their foremost mission, the expeditious moving of the mails. In keeping with President Reagan's program for hiring of the handicapped in the Federal sector, they are a genuine credit to him, to you sir, to the U.S. Postal Service and to our country."

For the January 7 meeting of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club, Program Chairman Mr. John Fitzpatrick had invited Mr. John Sarcona, a representative of the Long Island Association for AIDS Care to address the membership.

Mr. Sarcona spoke at length about the background of this tragic and fatal disease, and mentioned such things as how fast the disease is spreading and

what attempts are being made to try to stop it; what currently seems to be the best information as to what is fact and/or fiction about the spread of AIDS; some guidelines as to preventative measures suggested with regard to avoiding the disease; as well as the best estimate as to the extent of this scourge.

Mr. Sarcona said that the Long Island Association for AIDS Care is located in

Huntington; is funded by New York State and other sources; is one of seven such facilities in the state; and, is there to help people who have AIDS, or know some-

one who has it and could use help; or, to answer any and all questions, they have a Hot Line number 385-AIDS. He emphasized that they want to help.

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D'Amato Bill Would Eliminate Negative Effects Of S.S. "Notch"

U.S. Senator Alfonse M. D'Amato (R-NY) recently introduced legislation designed to eliminate the drastic and unfair inequities of the "Notch" provisions of the Social Security program.

"The Social Security program is a promise of security to all our nation's senior citizens, including those born between the 'notch' years of 1917 and 1921," D'Amato said. "We simply cannot abandon those who fought so hard to survive the Great Depression and to save our country in World War II. The arbitrary inequities that have been created as a result of the 'notch' pro-

vision must be eliminated.

"The cruel and unfair 'notch' sealed the fate of so many unsuspecting senior citizens who must now spend their so-called 'golden years' without good housing, proper medical attention and even decent meals," said D'Amato. "Our society is faltering when, for no reason other than balancing a budget, it neglects the needs of those who have given of themselves in times of war and times of peace."

III-Conceived 'Notch' Creates System of Unequal Benefits

The 'notch' was designed as a solution to the great problems facing the Social

Security program in the late 1970's. Because of incorrect predictions of future costs of the program, a projection was made in 1977 that Social Security would run a long-range deficit equal to approximately 40% of the projected cost of the entire program.

A new formula for Social Security eligibility and payments designed to avoid a deficit was calculated in 1977, to come into effect less than two years later. For those individuals reaching 62 years of age after January 1, 1979, the Social Security benefits were lowered. Little time was permitted for those who had made retirement

plans to change them quickly enough to adjust, and the effect of the 'notch' provision was immediately devastating.

Lost Benefits Would Be Returned to 'Notch' Senior Citizens

The D'Amato legislation would compensate for some of the lost income by incorporating three more years of employment after age 62 for computation in Social Security benefits, available for those who reached 62 in 1979 or later. It would also establish an income ceiling of \$29,700 for those three years after eligibility starts, and allow for a lump-sum retroactive payment.

County Tax Lien Review Board Appointed

Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Thomas S. Gulotta, majority leader of the Nassau County Board of Supervisors, has announced the appointment of the three member Nassau County Hardship Review Board. The establishment of the Hardship Review Board was part of the recently enacted tax lien reform legislation, which was sponsored by Supervisor Gulotta.

Under the terms of the tax lien reform legislation passed late last year, a Hardship Review Board was established to help ensure that no one in Nassau County would ever again lose the value of their home for the non-payment of a few dollars in property tax. The newly appointed review panel is empowered to grant up to a year extension to those homeowners who demonstrate a financial hardship and as a consequence find themselves unable to make timely property tax payments. In addition, the Hardship Review Board will provide financial counseling to those individuals who are unable to meet their tax obligations.

Supervisor Gulotta announced the following appointments to the Board: former Long Beach Supervisor Hannah Komanoff, who will serve a three year term, Reverend Arthur M. Mackey, of Roosevelt, who will serve for 2 years, and Debra Zaiff of Farmingdale, who was appointed to a one

year term.

Joining with Supervisor Gulotta in announcing the appointment of Mrs. Komanoff was the present Long Beach Supervisor, Bruce Nyman: "Supervisor Komanoff has the experience, compassion and the knowledge to serve on this Board. She'll be of great benefit to the people of Nassau County. I'm thrilled that the Board has approved her selection," Nyman said.

Supervisor Gulotta observed: "I am proud to have recommended these three fine public spirited citizens to the Nassau County Hardship Review Board. Serving without remuneration, these individuals have agreed to give of themselves to help ensure that the former injustices of the tax lien system, which resulted in tragic instances of unfortunate individuals losing their homes for failing to pay a few dollars in property tax, will not be repeated in Nassau County. The Hardship Review Board will provide a compassionate and human response to the process by which Nassau County collects property taxes."

Former Supervisor Komanoff served for 11 years on the Nassau County Board of Supervisors. Representing the City of Long Beach, Mrs. Komanoff was the first woman to be elected to serve on the County's legislative body. Prior to her service with

Nassau County, Mrs. Komanoff served on the Long Beach Board of Education, serving as its President for many years.

Reverend Arthur Mackey of Roosevelt is a long time community activist who is well known in the County's religious community. Currently serving as President of the Nassau County Council of Black Clergy, he is Pastor of the Mt. Sinai Baptist Church in Roosevelt. In addition, Rev. Mackey serves as a Special Assistant for Community Relations to the Nassau County Human Rights Commission. Rev. Mackey joined with Supervisor Gulotta in the effort to raise funds to repurchase the home of Annie Kennedy of Hempstead. Mrs. Kennedy was among those individuals who lost title to their

home under the old tax lien speculation system.

Debra Zaiff of Farmingdale is Director of Client Advocacy for the Family Service Association of Nassau County. Also serving as a Financial Counselor for the Family Service Association, Ms. Zaiff specializes in cases involving senior citizens. The Family Service Association is a non-profit, non-sectarian human service agency headquartered in Hempstead which helps families in distress. Among its many services, FSA provides Family and Senior Citizen Financial counseling services.

"The Hardship Review Board is now a reality," Supervisor Gulotta declared. "This august body of public spirited Nassau

On most Saturday mornings from 9:30 until 11:30, many Hicksville students are either sleeping or at a local job. Frequently, school is the farthest from their minds. They don't want to hear about formulae or data, but just want to sit back and relax.

But, this is not the case of all students, as Hicksville Juniors Lisa Chang, and

Manisha Patil have demonstrated. They recently completed a six-session program of seminars at Adelphi University, attending seminars concerning recent developments in the Chemistry field. Along with over one hundred of their peers from Nassau, Suffolk and Queens, Lisa and Manisha received a taste of college life. Through this program, they could see how

college programs in the sciences are run, observing first-hand what college lecture-life is really like.
