L.I. Arts-In-Education Conference To Feature Hicksville Schools' Comprehensive Arts Program

The first Long Island Arts-in-Education Conference, to take place at the C.W. Post Center, Long Island University on Wednesday, February 19, will include presentations by three Nassau County Districts identified by the New York State Department of Education as having exemplary programs in the arts. These districts are Herricks, Mineola, and Hicksville. Overviews of the model programs will be presented to Long Island superintendents, board of

education members, PTA leadership, and state officials. This full-day conference, the first of its kind, will provide material for the forthcoming publication, *The State of Arts in Education on Long Island*. The Hicksville program will be presented by Supervisor of Comprehensive Arts Dr. Terrell Stackpole, who initiated the program in 1981. He will be assisted by Henry Gates, Department Chair for Comprehensive Arts at Hicksville Junior

High School. The two sessions will serve to explain the three component comprehensive program, made up of Arts Curriculum, Arts Integration, and Arts Enrichment, that have been developed through the cooperative effort of the schools and the community. The Long Island Arts-in-Education Conference will culminate with a performance by Dr. Stackpole with his jazz trio. A recognition award will be presented to composer Morton Gould and the keynote speaker for the

event will be Schuyler Chapin, Dean of the Columbia University School of the Arts. On Wednesday, January 12, Dr. Stackpole, will serve as speaker/clinician for the annual conference of the Nassau County Music Administrators Association, again sharing aspects of the Hicksville Program, and on February 24-27 will serve as clinician for the Eastern Division Convention of the Music Educators National Conference, to take place in Boston.

The Mercy League of Hicksville/Syosset/Glen Cove held its annual holiday luncheon at the Woodbury Country Club in Woodbury in Dec. Man, 82, Dies In Gas Explosion

John Schwamb, 82, a widower, of 14 Holman Blvd., Hicksville, died at Nassau County Medical Center, East Meadow, of injuries incurred after natural gas accumulations in his home exploded.

Hicksville firefighters responded to the 11:13 p.m. alarm on Dec. 29.

Schwamb, a long time resident, died the following day of extensive burns to 100% of his body.

A long time neighbor and friend, Edward Wagner heard a muffled explosion and went outside to investigate. He notices that Schwamb's house was on fire and ran over. He heard Schwamb's calls for help but could not gain entry. Without wasting time, he notified the Fire Dept., who arrived shortly after. Several Vamps gained entry and found the victim upright and conscious on a burning sofa and removed him from the building. A strong smell of gas was evident.

A valiant effort was made to save Schwamb, but the extensive burns and his age were too much.

Hicksville Vamps involved in rescuing the victim were M. Azzue, Co. 6, who was overcome by heat and smoke; rookies J. Evans, Co. 1, M. Murphy, Co. 1 and firefighter, J. Rizzos.

Fire damage was slight but the explosion caused extensive damage to the dwelling. The south wall was pushed out six inches.

Hicksville Chief William Donlon was in charge of operations. Sixty Vamps and nine units responded. LILCO crews and Fire Marshals are investigating. What is known is that the explosion is gas related and that no leaks were evident.

Hicksville Chiefs commended the actions of Vamps on the scene for the rescue and their efforts to save the victim, and also to the neighbor, Edward Wagner, who wasted no time in calling Vamps.

Morning's First Draw of Water May Contain Excessive Lead

By Sup. Joseph Colby

Late last year, I received letters from local water districts along with a report from their consulting engineers, Holzmacher, McLendon and Murrell, which indicated that there was a possibility that the lead content in solder used in the installation of new copper water service piping could cause unacceptable, excessive lead content to be found in the morning's first draw of water.

The engineering report

indicated that the problem had recently been discovered locally and had been noted throughout the country as well as in other nations.

The Town's Department of Planning and Development took steps and notified all licensed plumbers by mail that, effective immediately and until further notice, all solder used with copper water service piping in the Town of Oyster Bay shall be of significantly reduced lead

content -- 95% tin/ 5% antimony.

I also wrote to the Nassau County Health Commissioner and requested that he take any and all steps necessary to protect the public health. The Health Department supported the Town's action and has undertaken a testing program in Oyster Bay and other parts of Nassau.

In addition, the County has brought this matter to the attention of the State Health Department for its evaluation and possible statewide action, and the State Division of Housing

has reported that it is actively reviewing this matter. The results of the County testing program are expected to be available in several weeks.

In the meantime, owners of newly occupied homes are being advised to flush out their plumbing systems with the equivalent of a year's normal use of water. In addition, if water from a fixture in a house less than a year old has not been used for one day, it is recommended that the first half gallon be disposed of and not used for human consumption.

Getting To Know You

Hicksville's "Artist-in-Residence"

Artistic treasures hang in the Hicksville Library, the Gregory Museum and St. Ignatius Church, all created by Olga Laumann Hoebel, long time Hicksville resident. Her painting, "The White Pine" is in the public library, a portrait of the founder of the Gregory Museum, Dr. Gardiner Gregory, adorns the entrance hall of the museum and a painting of Christ on the Cross is in St. Ignatius Roman Catholic Church.

At 77, Olga Hoebel lives in retirement and is known for paintings of the Adirondack Mountains as well as Long Island marines and landscapes. She is also a portrait painter and a painter of still life. Her art has won many awards as far back as 1936. She has exhibited in seven solo shows and in numerous group shows. Exhibits include some in New York City, the capitol in Albany, the Garden City Hotel and the Salisbury Club.

Olga was born in Europe and developed an early love for art. Her father, Emil Laumann, took her to the museums every Sunday. In 1923 she came to the United States to live with an aunt and uncle who owned Laumann Well Drilling Co. in Bethpage. Arriving on the 4th of July, it was fascinating to see all the people dressed in finery. "I had always lived in big cities and was enchanted with Long Island," she recalls, reflecting on the rural Hicksville of 1923. Olga married Louis Hoebel a member of an established farming family. They had no children and were married for 43 years until his death.

It was after marriage that Olga began to concentrate efforts in Art. She attended Nassau Collegiate Center in Garden City to study art. After being the first art teacher in Adult Education in Hicksville High School, she opened an art studio in the backyard for adults and teenagers. In Oct. 1949, Ms. Hoebel founded the Palette Club, a local art group for professionals and amateur artists. It grew from a small local club to a large league known as the Independent Art Society, with members all over Long Island.

During World War II, Ms. Hoebel was active in the Red Cross as a nurse's aide. She was the only Hicksville resident to graduate with 22 other aides at Meadowbrook Hospital in 1942; worked in local hospitals and went to Grumman's for the blood banks when the workers donated blood for the war effort. "I became an aide because there was not much nursing care at home. Most of the nurses were in the hospitals at the front," she said.

Olga has always been active in community groups in Hicksville, was listed in Who's Who of American Women, and is the recipient of many art awards. One achievement of particular pride is her admission to the National League of American Pen Women. She was president of the Long Island Branch from 1966-68.

Olga, with her deep roots in Hicksville, credits this community for creating an interest in art in the mid island area. She says "New York City, of course, is the

center of art, but in the mid part of this century it was Hicksville that created an interest in art in this region."

Although in retirement, Olga is still active in a senior

citizen club, still paints and writes and shows a keen long productive life. Olga Laumann Hoebel is a fine example of a free spirited liberated women.

care of the family by being recertified every six years. No other medical specialty requires diplomates to prove competence on a continuing basis.

The written examination is designed to prove the candidate's continuing competence in the various components of family practice—internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics; psychiatry and community medicine.

To qualify initially for certification a physician must have successfully completed three years of residency training in family practice and passed an intensive 1-day certification examina-

tion. There are some 388 residency training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

There now are more than 26,000 diplomates of the specialty, each of whom must be recertified within seven years of initial certification. Most are members of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national M.D. group to require members to take continuing medical study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.
