Approve Two R-O Zones In Hicksville

Two applications for R-O residential-office) zoning in Hicksville have been approved by the Oyster Bay Town Board, it was announced this week by **Town Councilman Thomas** L. Clark.

The two applications, one by attorneys Jerome Ness and Joseph Edelman and the second by Dr. John F. Whitaker, sought the zone change for property located at 370 and 362 South Oyster Bay Road, respectively, Both were granted, subject to certain restrictive

covenants. "In granting these appli-cations, the Town Board took into consideration the

concerns expressed by residents at the public hearing. which was held on November 9, 1982." Clark stated, "In order to give adjoining residents the max-imum of privacy, Edelman and Ness will be required to erect a six-foot stockade fence along the rear of their property as well as plant hemlocks or dense ever-greens while Whitaker will be required to plant hem-locks along the rear of his property to augment the existing fence and also put in

plantings along the south-erly portion of his property. "Edelman and Ness will be limited to two additional tenants with no more than

four employees on the pre-mises at any given time," Clark continued. "No more than a total of three people will be permitted to work on the Whitaker premises at one time and hours of opera-tion will be limited to 10 AM to 8 PM Monday through Friday and 10 AM to 1 PM on Saturday."

In addition, there will be no parking in the rear portion of the properties and no illuminated signs will be permitted. The Town will not issue a certificate of occupancy until a site plan has been submitted and approved by the Planning Advisory Board and

accepted by the Town Board. The site plan must show all curb cuts, parking, location and wattage of all lighting, trees, screening, fencing and signs. Clark noted that Edleman

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and Ness brought suit against the Town to contest against the Town to contest the residential zoning as applied to a strip of 21 homes along South Oyster Bay Road. A 1979 court rul-ing upheld the lawyers' claim. Abolish The MTA: Yevoli

In 1965, the Metropolitan Commuter Authority was created by law expressly for the purpose of taking the Long Island Railroad, which was then owned by the Penn Central R.R., out of bankruptcy. It was sup-posed to become a well-run, modern railroad under a defined program adminis-tered by the newly created authority. For at least three years, according to most available accounts, the pro-gram seemed to get off to a good start.

Then, in 1968, the Metro-Then, in 1968, the Metro-politan Transportation Authority was formed to replace the MCA. It incor-porated the troubled New York City subway and bus systems, the bankrupt Penn Central and the Erie-Lackawana commuter sys-tems. Merged into this transportation monster was the Triboro Bridge and Tunnel Authority whose surplus revenues were to be used to support the city transit operation and the suburban commuter opera-tions. Future acquisitions included Conrail's West-chester commuter line, Stewart Airport at upstate Newburgh, N.Y., Republic Airport at Farmingdale. Long Island and several financially strapped suburban commuter bus compan-ies. The MTA soon became the largest regional trans-portation authority in the United States.

In those years, govern-ment functioned under the erroneous premise that "big is better." The so-called "super agencies" of the sixties were supposed to produce maximum efficiency and substantial economies through the coordinated systems administered by the new centralized authorities. No problem would be too big or too small and improvements would occur faster and cheaper than ever before. A wonderful dream that soon became a nightmare for the state and its taxpayers. Money was spent at a speed that could best be measured in light years and, since most of these authorities were autonomous, they were answerable to no one. Of them all, the MTA stands out as the biggest and most costly bureaucratic blunder ever created by the "big is better" syndrome. Fifteen years and several billion dollars later, the city's subways and busses have never been worse, while travel on the suburban commuter lines is

expensive and erratic

The Long Island Railroad has had more than its share of problems since becoming a member of the MTA's gigantic family. Although the LIRR carries more commuters on a daily basis than any other line in the country, its status in the MTA seems to be relegated to that of a tolerated but clearly distant relative. A perfect example of the LIRR's unfair treatment by the MTA is the now defunct East River Tunnel. No other project could have done more to ease congestion on the line. When completed, it would have provided desperately needed rail lines to Grand Central Station and Grand Central Station and eliminated 50% of the com-muter traffic at Pennsylva-nia Station. After years of promises and after spending hundreds of millions of dol-lars, the MTA has aban-doned the project. What about the MTA's plans to electrify the LIRR's tail ser-vice through Suffolk County? A long overdue improvement that is no closer to reality today than closer to reality today than it was ten years ago. One more example of the MTA's failure to meet the LIRR's pressing needs.



King Urges Study Of Housing Plan For Elderly

Nassau County Comp-troller Peter T King endorsed an idea put forth at the recent New York State Association of Counties Public Policy Forum on Aging. The plan, which would be funded by a given non-profit corporation, involves senior citizens being able to tap into the equity of their homes with-out selling. "Many of our Nassau senior citizens are poor in terms of each but far better off in terms of mortgages This new system, which involves a reverse annuity mortgage, is easenloan against the tially a loan against the value of the house for a fixed period. The homeowner period. The homeowner receives monthly checks and repays the loan at the end of the period. If they have to sell at this point, the equity built up in the house pre-cludes any financial snag. This would be ideal for areas such as Nassau County, with

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notable appreciation of property value." King stated.

The corporation would immediately renovate the house, maintain it, pay insu-rance and taxes and pay the homeowners a monthly sti-pend. In return, the corporation receives title to the move of the owner. The corporation then sells the home and reinvests the money in this program. "Too many senior citizens find them selves disenfranchised from their homes because of financial woes. They deserve to reap the benefit of a peaceful retirement in their own community, their own home. Under this new program, the community has the benefit of these citizens, the necessity for more single occupancy housing is somewhat abated, and good houses are maintained," concluded King.
