A few months ago, Dr. Krahn's third book, "REACHING THE INACTIVE MEMBER," was published. This book was based on his doctoral dissertation and helps congregations understand and reach members who are inactive. Dr. Krahn is senior Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, 40 W. Approve Two R-O Zones In Hicksville

Two applications for R-O (residential-office) zoning in Hicksville have been approved by the Oyster Bay Town Board, it was announced this week by Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

The two applications, one by attorneys Jerome Ness and Joseph Edelman and the second by Dr. John F. Whitaker, sought the zone change for property located at 370 and 362 South Oyster Bay Road, respectively. Both were granted, subject to certain restrictive covenants.

"In granting these applications, the Town Board took into consideration the

concerns expressed by residents at the public hearing, which was held on November 9, 1982," Clark stated. "In order to give adjoining residents the maximum of privacy, Edelman and Ness will be required to erect a six-foot stockade fence along the rear of their property as well as plant hemlocks or dense evergreens while Whitaker will be required to plant hemlocks along the rear of his property to augment the existing fence and also put in plantings along the southerly portion of his property."

"Edelman and Ness will be limited to two additional tenants with no more than

four employees on the premises at any given time," Clark continued. "No more than a total of three people will be permitted to work on the Whitaker premises at one time and hours of operation will be limited to 10 AM to 8 PM Monday through Friday and 10 AM to 1 PM on Saturday."

In addition, there will be no parking in the rear portion of the properties and no neon rotating or moving illuminated signs will be permitted. The Town will not issue a certificate of occupancy until a site plan has been submitted and approved by the Planning Advisory Board and

accepted by the Town Board. The site plan must show all curb cuts, parking, location and wattage of all lighting, trees, screening, fencing and signs.

Clark noted that Edelman and Ness brought suit against the Town to contest the residential zoning as applied to a strip of 21 homes along South Oyster Bay Road. A 1979 court ruling upheld the lawyers' claim. The Town then created the R-O zone, which provides for the conversion of a residence to office use within specific guidelines, while retaining the residential character of the surrounding area.

Parola Develops Tough Anti-Crime Package

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C Wantagh) today announced details of anti-crime legislation he has sponsored in the state Assembly for the new legislative session.

The area lawmaker said, "For too many years the fight against crime has been stymied because a preoccupation with the rights of the offenders has been allowed to take precedence over the rights of the victim. The result is that our laws now protect the perpetrators of crime rather than the law-abiding citizens."

"The view we share and that I have voiced since I was elected to represent you, is that laws should protect the

innocent and provide sure and severe punishment for the hardened criminals."

"For the 1983 session, I have focused my efforts on gaining legislative approval for bills that deal with various aspects of criminal law including those that will prevent crimes from occurring," Parola said.

"On the neighborhood level, where any effective fight against crime must begin, I have sponsored legislation whereby qualified neighborhood groups which have started crime prevention programs would be eligible to share \$3 million in state funds."

"It is a sad commentary on our society, but the fact

remains that many public spirited New York State citizens have been forced to band together to protect themselves from the hordes of criminals who are making the streets unsafe to walk on and their homes unsafe to live in," Parola noted.

"With this funding groups such as auxiliary police and civilian patrols work closely with local police departments and engage in block watches, community patrols and learn anti-crime techniques that are effective in stopping crime before it happens."

Parola continued, "There are any number of areas where the fight against crime has to be concentrated, and

tough legislation revising the sentencing procedure for those serving time in prison is one of them. Under terms of legislation I have sponsored, certain prisoners will serve definite sentences rather than indeterminate sentences of imprisonment for their crimes."

"It is a matter of great concern that, time and time again, persons sentenced to long terms in prison appear on the streets within a short period."

"My bill is meant to provide courts with the means of fixing the length of time a convicted felon must serve behind bars as an alternative to leaving the decision to the parole boards."

Abolish The MTA: Yevoli

In 1965, the Metropolitan Commuter Authority was created by law expressly for the purpose of taking the Long Island Railroad, which was then owned by the Penn Central R.R., out of bankruptcy. It was supposed to become a well-run, modern railroad under a defined program administered by the newly created authority. For at least three years, according to most available accounts, the program seemed to get off to a good start.

Then, in 1968, the Metropolitan Transportation Authority was formed to replace the MCA. It incorporated the troubled New York City subway and bus systems, the bankrupt Penn Central and the Erie-Lackawanna commuter systems. Merged into this transportation monster was the Triboro Bridge and Tunnel Authority whose surplus revenues were to be used to support the city transit operation and the suburban commuter operations. Future acquisitions included Conrail's Westchester commuter line, Stewart Airport at upstate Newburgh, N.Y., Republic Airport at Farmingdale, Long Island and several

financially strapped suburban commuter bus companies. The MTA soon became the largest regional transportation authority in the United States.

In those years, government functioned under the erroneous premise that "big is better." The so-called "super agencies" of the sixties were supposed to produce maximum efficiency and substantial economies through the coordinated systems administered by the new centralized authorities. No problem would be too big or too small and improvements would occur faster and cheaper than ever before. A wonderful dream that soon became a nightmare for the state and its taxpayers. Money was spent at a speed that could best be measured in light years and, since most of these authorities were autonomous, they were answerable to no one. Of them all, the MTA stands out as the biggest and most costly bureaucratic blunder ever created by the "big is better" syndrome. Fifteen years and several billion dollars later, the city's subways and busses have never been worse, while travel on the suburban commuter lines is

expensive and erratic.

The Long Island Railroad has had more than its share of problems since becoming a member of the MTA's gigantic family. Although the LIRR carries more commuters on a daily basis than any other line in the country, its status in the MTA seems to be relegated to that of a tolerated but clearly distant relative. A perfect example of the LIRR's unfair treatment by the MTA is the now defunct East River Tunnel. No other project could have done more to ease congestion on the line. When completed, it would have provided desperately needed rail lines to Grand Central Station and eliminated 50% of the commuter traffic at Pennsylvania Station. After years of promises and after spending hundreds of millions of dollars, the MTA has abandoned the project. What about the MTA's plans to electrify the LIRR's rail service through Suffolk County? A long overdue improvement that is no closer to reality today than it was ten years ago. One more example of the MTA's failure to meet the LIRR's pressing needs.

The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the resurfacing and reconstruction of various roads located throughout and in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, including road striping thereon and the purchase and installation of traffic signs and

devices necessary in connection therewith.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes is \$2,775,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$2,636,250 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

b) By the issuance of \$138,750 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivisions 20 (c) and 20 (d) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby

further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

ARMED BANK ROBBERY

A lone armed bandit robbed the tellers at the L.I. Trust Bank, 222 Old Country Road, Hicksville, of \$25,008 cash Jan. 25 before narrowly escaping capture by two police officers.

The man, a male, white, 6', 190 lbs., wearing a ski jacket and carrying a brown tote bag, entered the bank at 9:20 A.M. and announced a stickup after taking out a handgun. He ordered several tellers to fill up the bag but, "leave out the bait money." Detectives feel he is the same man who robbed that bank on Jan. 20, '82 where he said the same thing and escaped with \$12,783 cash. This morning the robber left the bank with the filled bag and was followed by an assistant manager, Michael Fassula. The bandit fled down a side driveway where a 2nd Pct. police car was parked with two officers in it. P.O.'s Charles Marklin and Raymond Flood, Fassula spotted the officers and yelled, "Stop that man". Officer Marklin stopped the suspect just as he was about to get into an unknown mus-

tard colored compact car with out of state plates. The suspect turned around and pointed the gun in Marklin's face saying, "Don't make me do it." The officers were unaware the man had just robbed the bank. Marklin shoved the suspect and dove over the car. P.O. Flood, backed the police car up to the suspect who suddenly pointed the gun at him. Flood ducked and the suspect sped onto Old Country Road, westbound. Marklin fired one shot into the passenger side window of the car but it sped away. The officers pursued the car but lost it in the side streets several blocks from the scene. No one was injured. Second Squad and Robbery Squad personnel are investigating.

A 19 year old gas station attendant at a Hicksville Gas Station was robbed of \$90 at gunpoint at 8:00 p.m. Jan. 29.

Phillip Tetzolp was alone in the Getty Station, at 178 Old Country Rd., when the suspect, a white male, about 18 years old, approached him, holding a handgun and demanded the station's money. After getting the money the suspect was last seen westbound on Old Country Rd., on foot.

Tetzolp was not hurt during the robbery and he described the suspect as being a white male, armed with a handgun, about 18 yrs., 120

lbs., 5'5" tall, wore a light brown sheepskin jacket and brown pants.

The Second Squad is investigating.

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King Urges Study Of Housing Plan For Elderly

Nassau County Comptroller Peter T. King endorsed an idea put forth at the recent New York State Association of Counties Public Policy Forum on Aging. The plan, which would be funded by a given non-profit corporation, involves senior citizens being able to tap into the equity of their homes without selling. "Many of our Nassau senior citizens are poor in terms of cash but far better off in terms of mortgages. This new system, which involves a reverse annuity mortgage, is essentially a loan against the value of the house for a fixed period. The homeowner receives monthly checks and repays the loan at the end of the period. If they have to sell at this point, the equity built up in the house precludes any financial snag. This would be ideal for areas such as Nassau County, with

notable appreciation of property value," King stated.

The corporation would immediately renovate the house, maintain it, pay insurance and taxes and pay the homeowners a monthly stipend. In return, the corporation receives title to the house upon the death or move of the owner. The corporation then sells the home and reinvests the money in this program. "Too many senior citizens find themselves disenfranchised from their homes because of financial woes. They deserve to reap the benefit of a peaceful retirement in their own community, their own home. Under this new program, the community has the benefit of these citizens, the necessity for more single occupancy housing is somewhat abated, and good houses are maintained," concluded King.

9. Paint Up, Clean Up and Spruce Up Hicksville.
10. Confer with its own members on legitimate business complaints from customers.
11. Provide a social milieu for its members. Meetings provide mutual benefits in future business activities.

Is there another organization in Hicksville that can address the needs of the mercantile and professional establishment of Hicksville? Answer: An emphatic "No."
