# "Auxiliaries Reign On Snow"

While the blizzard of February 11 smothered the nor-theast with billowy drifts of down, thousands of Nassau County commuters braved County commuters braved the storm in one grand, futile attempt to thwart Mother Nature's game plan. High winds and heavy snows frustrated the pro-gress of those travellers caught up the "nut-hour" caught up in the "rush-hour" crawl and brought several vehicles to a halt on major roadways and sidestreets throughout the area. Emergency personnel responded to calls for assistance and reports of motorists stranded in the bitter night.

Throughout the storm, volunteers from Auxiliary Police Unit 312 provided invaluable service by dislodging cars from snow-

drifts and transporting disabled motorists to shelter. From four o'clock Friday afternoon until four o'clock Saturday morning, the-Hicksville Auxiliary Police patrolled the snow-covered roads, alert to motorists in need of assistance. Of course, as the storm pro-gressed, travel became treacherous, and many members of the medical profession found that they could not report for duty. When they called the County Police for emergency transportation, the 2nd precinct called upon the Auxiliary Police to assist in providing safe passage for those most urgently in need. Deputy Inspector Thomas Schneiderr, Chief of the Hicksville Unit, and Patrol Officer Robert Ohliger were on hand to deliver doctors

By the time most commuters had found some safe harbor for the night, the officers of Unit 312 had found their own cars snow bound at their headquarters on West Barclay Street. After some healthy digging out, the Unit resumed patrols Saturday evening when Patrol Officers Kenneth Molloy and Robert Ohliger volunteered forduty. While the roads were less crowded, they were by no means less perilous. Sergeant Gary Ward, a veteran officer of the unit, narrowly escaped injury when the patrol car he was assigned to bound at their headquarters patrol car he was assigned to was struck broadside by another vehicle. For the last decade the Lions Club of Hicksville has been holding a winter blood drive in honor of hemophiliacs. The event has helped to keep hospital blood supplies at adequate levels during a season when illness and bad

weather prevent people from donating blood. The pints of blood the Lions Club has collected have helped patients with

heart disease, cancer, hemophilia, and other blood dis-orders. Each pint of blood can be separated into five components that can be used to treat five hospital

patients. According to Ed Blas-kowsky, chairman of the blood drive, everyone in the community is urged to donate at the blood drive. Anyone in good health, weighing a minimum of 110

pounds, and between the ages of 17 and 66 can donate blood every eight weeks.

Long Island Blood Services, a division of the Greater New York Blood Program, must collect 3,000 pints of blood a week for the 41 Long Island hospitals. This non-profit health service is sponsored by the New York Blood Center and the American Red Cross.

Often in counseling I ask the question, "Given all the positive and negative forces positive and negative totelling in your life, when you put it all together, are you basically happy?" When the person says, "No," I realize that we have work to do.

I believe that Jesus Christ

is at the center of personal happiness and a successful life. To live a life favorable to him is to permit God's Spirit to exert control over our lives. And if we permit his control of our lives, then his will becomes our will. And what is Christ's will? Jesus once said, "I came that you might have life and have

it more abundantly." His will is that we have happiness and purpose in life.

I would like to suggest

what I call the three P's to developing a relationship with God. They are: People, Prayer, and Pursuit. Sort of three P's in a pod-the pod, or encompassing factor, is God himself.

Our first P is for People. It is difficult to discover God in a vacuum. On several occasions teenagers leaving for college have told me that they didn't plan to attend church at college. They wanted to use the time in college to make up their own

mind about God. Taking such a position they cut off one of the surest ways to experience God — being around people whose lives are God-touched. If your faith ever becomes weak, that is the time when your church attendance and your activity with other Christians needs to be strongest. God will use his people to reach out to you if you don't avoid them.

Our second P in a good relationship with God is Prayer. God is not the Tooth Fairy who has an unlimited

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# Fiscal Stability Will Be Restored

By Nassau County Exec. Francis Purcell

Everyone in Nassau County should know by this point that we have a fiscal problem. The problem, simply stated, is that we have more money going out than coming in. That creates a deficit and we cannot and may not live in a deficit situation. The federal government may roll over a deficit. Therefore deficit. Therefore, we have changes to make in the way we do business. Since income has fallen short, and that can be traced to the current financial conditions in the nation, we must cut our spending and expenses in order to exist within the budget and debt-free.

To that end, I had a meeting with all the department heads in my administration last week. Some 52 agencies were represented. I gave them a 15-point formula for cutting costs. I told them it was my aim to restore this county's fiscal stability. I made them aware that while we have a fiscal problem, I had no intention of letting it become a crisis. To achieve that, they must be ready to do a job.

my statement, I detailed some 15 points which were going to be implemented to gain our end. Among these points, is an extended moratorium on hiring, which will translate into a reduction of county payroll by some 400 to 500 employees. This will be done through normal attrition. When an employee leaves or retires, he or she will not be replaced, except, of course, where some vital service is involved such as a person at the Patterson Home or the medical center. Even that, however, will require my personal approval.

This attrition program, to uty executives to whom they report to focus on means to these sessions will involve me directly. All departments will file monthly reports on cost-cutting. Beyond these, we are exploring the possi-bility of furloughing employees and I will discuss this with the heads of the various unions. Should this way not be possible, we will go to the alternative of layoffs. Similarly, departments will be severely restricted on overtime.

In the area of properties, I have called for a review of all leases for housing county units in privately owned future.

buildings and a study of county owned properties with the thought of selling what we can't use and don't need. Telephone use, post age and travel outside the county will come under strict, new controls.

We are at a point in time where adjustment must be made. With further cutbacks in federal and state aid most likely and with revenue ources dwindling, it cannot be business-as-usual any longer. I won't make up the costs by piling tax increases on the homeowner...therefore we must cut costs and programs to make for a leaner, more efficient government.

It is my purpose to restore fiscal stability in our county and to put Nassau in better shape than ever in the near

"We Will Pay More For Less With Governor's Budget," Colby

Recent newspaper articles about the governor's budget proposals have quoted the governor's statement "We will do more with less." What the governor actually means is that WE will PAY means is that WE will PAY more for less. In his \$18.5 billion budget proposal, the governor calls for \$900 million in new taxes and user fees, at the same time that his budget for state spending will increase by 5.4% over last year's budget and at the same time the State is facing a deficit in the current budget of nearly \$2 billion!

The governor's aid to schools proposals, aptly tagged the "Robbing Hood" plan, might also be applied to the rest of his budget proposals. Beside the loss of \$17.3 million in school aid for Long Island, towns and cities stand to lose \$13 million in special municipal aid

under the proposed budget, and it doesn't stop there. A 34 million dollar reduction in local highway assistance is called for at a time when our news media is constantly calling attention to the nation's deteriorating highway systems. Our local property taxpayers would be forced to pay even more for the cost of highway construction and repairs, trans-portation, and sewer con-struction, should these budget proposals be

The governor's proposals include taxes and user fee increases on such items as bowling, golf, racquetball and tennis, beauty shop and and tennis, beauty snop and barber services, drycleaning and parking! Long-distance interstate telephone rates could rise by up to 3%. Add that last increase to the fact

that the governor has not been able to force an equitable rate schedule for Long Islanders' phone calls from one locality to another, and you can see exactly why we will PAY more for less here on the Island.

Drivers license fees could go up from \$1 to \$4 and vehicle registration fees could go up as much as 50% immediately with a proposal that beginning in June of 1984, registration fees would (Continued on Page 11)

....Because if he does not, who will?"....#3, the admin-istrator must have a compassionate understanding of the needs and problems of war veterans and their fami-lies, widows and orphans. The VA chief embodies the idea that the government says and does, he must give evidence that he does indeed evidence that he does indeed understand and that he cares."....The Legion reminded the Senate com-mittee that the Veterans Administration is an agency replete with problems and a vast agency that manifests both the best and the worst of bureaucracy.
