"Auxiliaries Reign On Snow"

While the blizzard of February 11 smothered the northeast with billowy drifts of down, thousands of Nassau County commuters braved the storm in one grand, futile attempt to thwart Mother Nature's game plan. High winds and heavy snows frustrated the progress of those travellers caught up in the "rush-hour" crawl and brought several vehicles to a halt on major roadways and side streets throughout the area. Emergency personnel responded to calls for assistance and reports of motorists stranded in the bitter night.

Throughout the storm, volunteers from Auxiliary Police Unit 312 provided invaluable service by dislodging cars from snow-

drifts and transporting disabled motorists to shelter. From four o'clock Friday afternoon until four o'clock Saturday morning, the Hicksville Auxiliary Police patrolled the snow-covered roads, alert to motorists in need of assistance. Of course, as the storm progressed, travel became treacherous, and many members of the medical profession found that they could not report for duty. When they called the County Police for emergency transportation, the 2nd precinct called upon the Auxiliary Police to assist in providing safe passage for those most urgently in need. Deputy Inspector Thomas Schneider, Chief of the Hicksville Unit, and Patrol Officer Robert Ohliger were on hand to deliver doctors

and nurses to hospitals as far away as Long Island Jewish-Hillside Medical Center.

By the time most commuters had found some safe harbor for the night, the officers of Unit 312 had found their own cars snow-bound at their headquarters on West Barclay Street. After some healthy digging out, the Unit resumed patrols Saturday evening when Patrol Officers Kenneth Molloy and Robert Ohliger volunteered for duty. While the roads were less crowded, they were by no means less perilous. Sergeant Gary Ward, a veteran officer of the unit, narrowly escaped injury when the patrol car he was assigned to was struck broadside by another vehicle. Sgt. Ward

and D.I. Schneider were standing alongside the patrol car assisting a disabled motorist at the time of the collision. Luckily, no injuries were reported by the occupants of the moving vehicle.

The Auxiliary Police is made up of volunteers who give of their time and talents to provide assistance to the community. While all emergency services deserve praise for their actions during the storm, the members of Unit 312 rate special recognition from the Hicksville community: not only for their outstanding performance during this emergency, but also for the hundreds of "invisible" hours spent each year in this unique form of service.

Hicksville Lions Annual Blood Drive

The tenth annual Lions Club of Hicksville blood drive will be held on Wednesday, February 23 from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. A Long Island Blood Services bloodmobile will be stationed at the Hicksville Methodist Church located at Old Country Road and Nelson Avenue. To make an appointment to donate blood call Ted Marotti at 681-5190.

For the last decade the Lions Club of Hicksville has been holding a winter blood drive in honor of hemophiliacs. The event has helped to keep hospital blood supplies at adequate levels during a season when illness and bad weather prevent people from donating blood.

The pints of blood the Lions Club has collected have helped patients with

heart disease, cancer, hemophilia, and other blood disorders. Each pint of blood can be separated into five components that can be used to treat five hospital patients.

According to Ed Blaszkowsky, chairman of the blood drive, everyone in the community is urged to donate at the blood drive. Anyone in good health, weighing a minimum of 110 pounds, and between the ages of 17 and 66 can donate blood every eight weeks.

Long Island Blood Services, a division of the Greater New York Blood Program, must collect 3,000 pints of blood a week for the 41 Long Island hospitals. This non-profit health service is sponsored by the New York Blood Center and the American Red Cross.

DEVOTIONS By The Rev. Dr. John H. Krahn

Often in counseling I ask the question, "Given all the positive and negative forces in your life, when you put it all together, are you basically happy?" When the person says, "No," I realize that we have work to do.

I believe that Jesus Christ is at the center of personal happiness and a successful life. To live a life favorable to him is to permit God's Spirit to exert control over our lives. And if we permit his control of our lives, then his will becomes our will. And what is Christ's will? Jesus once said, "I came that you might have life and have

it more abundantly." His will is that we have happiness and purpose in life.

I would like to suggest what I call the three P's to developing a relationship with God. They are: People, Prayer, and Pursuit. Sort of three P's in a pod—the pod, or encompassing factor, is God himself.

Our first P is for People. It is difficult to discover God in a vacuum. On several occasions teenagers leaving for college have told me that they didn't plan to attend church at college. They wanted to use the time in college to make up their own

mind about God. Taking such a position they cut off one of the surest ways to experience God—being around people whose lives are God-touched. If your faith ever becomes weak, that is the time when your church attendance and your activity with other Christians needs to be strongest. God will use his people to reach out to you if you don't avoid them.

Our second P in a good relationship with God is Prayer. God is not the Tooth Fairy who has an unlimited

source of extra money to solve all problems. God is not an escape artist to invoke when all else fails. A powerful prayer life must also be a consistent prayer life as we try to discover God's will for our lives. Let me try to illustrate. If you're in a little boat approaching a sandy beach and you throw out the anchor, and it digs into the sand, and you pull on the anchor rope until the boat slides into the sand, what have you done? Have you moved the shore to the boat, or have you moved the boat to the shore? Of course, you've moved the boat to the shore. The purpose of prayer, likewise, is not to move God and heaven to you, but to move you until you want what God wants.

Our third P is pursuit. To know God and his will we must pursue our Christianity as we pursue any other worthwhile endeavor. We must be disciplined as Christians, not only in weekly worship, but also in studying his Word, and in taking the opportunity to touch our fellowman with his love. We do not pursue God in order to have God on our terms, but to discover his terms and follow them to a happy and successful life.

Make a very deep commitment of your life to Jesus Christ. People, Prayer, and Pursuit will help you along the way in your search for happiness and success.

At The Town Board Meeting

On Tuesday, Feb. 15, the Oyster Bay Town Board postponed a hearing for a zone change of Res. D to R-O Residence by Arthur Gross, M.D., at 372 So. Oyster Bay Rd., Hicksville. It was rescheduled for March 22, 1983 at 10 a.m.

A public hearing was held for a special use permit to expand a building for storage at Slomin's on So. Broadway and Lauman La. in Hicksville.

The building would be used as a garage for storage and repair of Slomin's vehicles. Decision was reserved.

The Town Board also reserved a decision to erect a stop sign at Blueberry La., northbound and Clarissa Dr. in Hicksville.

A face lift will begin soon on the town parking garage in Hicksville. The board voted in favor of a bid of \$197,326 to F.A.C. Construction Corp. of Hicksville.

A spokesperson for the town said the parking garage will be open during repairs and there will be no loss in parking spaces when the work is completed.

The Site Plan Approval for the Twin Country Recycling Corp., 499 West John St., Hicksville was approved.

The plan includes landscaping, fencing, paving, various trailers, off-street parking, an inground sprinkler system along the roadways and stock piles of raw materials not to exceed 25 feet in height.

Fiscal Stability Will Be Restored

Everyone in Nassau County should know by this point that we have a fiscal problem. The problem, simply stated, is that we have more money going out than coming in. That creates a deficit and we cannot and may not live in a deficit situation. The federal government may roll over a deficit. Therefore, we have changes to make in the way we do business. Since income has fallen short, and that can be traced to the current financial conditions in the nation, we must cut our spending and expenses in order to exist within the budget and debt-free.

To that end, I had a meeting with all the department heads in my administration last week. Some 52 agencies were represented. I gave them a 15-point formula for cutting costs. I told them it

was my aim to restore this county's fiscal stability. I made them aware that while we have a fiscal problem, I had no intention of letting it become a crisis. To achieve that, they must be ready to do a job.

In my statement, I detailed some 15 points which were going to be implemented to gain our end. Among these points, is an extended moratorium on hiring, which will translate into a reduction of county payroll by some 400 to 500 employees. This will be done through normal attrition. When an employee leaves or retires, he or she will not be replaced, except, of course, where some vital service is involved such as a person at the Patterson Home or the medical center. Even that, however, will require my personal approval.

This attrition program, to be monitored by a special committee, is expected to save some \$4 million to \$5 million. Department heads also will meet with the deputy executives to whom they report to focus on means to cut other costs. Some of these sessions will involve me directly. All departments will file monthly reports on cost-cutting. Beyond these, we are exploring the possibility of furloughing employees and I will discuss this with the heads of the various unions. Should this way not be possible, we will go to the alternative of layoffs. Similarly, departments will be severely restricted on overtime.

In the area of properties, I have called for a review of all leases for housing county units in privately owned

buildings and a study of county owned properties with the thought of selling what we can't use and don't need. Telephone use, postage and travel outside the county will come under strict, new controls.

We are at a point in time where adjustment must be made. With further cutbacks in federal and state aid most likely and with revenue sources dwindling, it cannot be business-as-usual any longer. I won't make up the costs by piling tax increases on the homeowner...therefore we must cut costs and programs to make for a leaner, more efficient government.

It is my purpose to restore fiscal stability in our county and to put Nassau in better shape than ever in the near future.

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C Wantagh) today urged his constituents to write to him protesting the school aid portion of the governor's 1983-84 state budget.

Referring to the governor's comments made to him at a recent press conference, Assemblyman Parola said, "By telling me to have

my constituents write to him expressing their displeasure with his proposed school aid package, Governor Cuomo may get more than he bargained for.

"Suburban areas are the ones hardest hit under his proposed school aid budget," stated Parola. "I resent the fact that we who are paying the most for education are being asked to

pay even more. "I'm not going to stand by while the governor slashes nearly \$3 million from our district's school aid," Parola asserted.

"I urge all residents of the 14th Assembly District to let their voices be heard. Send the governor the message that we want quality education for our children under a fair, equitable school aid formula.

"I invite every teacher, homeowner, school administrator, student and senior citizen who feels the governor's school aid proposal is way out of line to write to me at 3700 Hempstead Turnpike, Levittown, N.Y. 11766. I will personally present these letters to the governor's office so that our unified voice will be heard loud and clear," the lawmaker concluded.

"We Will Pay More For Less With Governor's Budget," Colby

Recent newspaper articles about the governor's budget proposals have quoted the governor's statement "We will do more with less." What the governor actually means is that WE will PAY more for less. In his \$18.5 billion budget proposal, the governor calls for \$900 million in new taxes and user fees, at the same time that his budget for state spending will increase by 5.4% over last year's budget and at the same time the State is facing a deficit in the current budget of nearly \$2 billion!

The governor's aid to schools proposals, aptly tagged the "Robbing Hood" plan, might also be applied to the rest of his budget proposals. Beside the loss of \$17.3 million in school aid for Long Island, towns and cities stand to lose \$13 million in special municipal aid

under the proposed budget, and it doesn't stop there. A 34 million dollar reduction in local highway assistance is called for at a time when our news media is constantly calling attention to the nation's deteriorating highway systems. Our local property taxpayers would be forced to pay even more for the cost of highway construction and repairs, transportation, and sewer construction, should these budget proposals be adopted.

We will do more with less? The governor's proposals include taxes and user fee increases on such items as bowling, golf, racquetball and tennis, beauty shop and barber services, drycleaning and parking! Long-distance interstate telephone rates could rise by up to 3%. Add that last increase to the fact

that the governor has not been able to force an equitable rate schedule for Long Islanders' phone calls from one locality to another, and you can see exactly why we will PAY more for less here on the Island.

Drivers license fees could go up from \$1 to \$4 and vehicle registration fees could go up as much as 50% immediately with a proposal that beginning in June of 1984, registration fees would

Thanks to Dick Evers for filling in for me in writing this column last month, and as usual, Dick did a good job. The annual meeting of the Life Membership Committee was held last Monday and all nominations were discussed. Last week I wrote a bit about the Veterans Administration which I hope was informative to both our membership and the general public alike. I have just a bit more to impart regarding the Veterans Administration and the Legion's continuing deep and sincere interest in that organization. As you all know by this time there has been a new administrator selected to head the Veterans Administration and at a Senate hearing before the selection was made the Legion made its feelings known. But not as you think. No candidate was offered or pushed by The American Legion but rather some qualifying suggested rules for the new administrator to live up to were put forth. Such as #1, that the administrator be a manager of high ability as it is important to veterans, as well as all American, that the VA be managed efficiently. And

towards this end, the Legion has already indicated that it would support a manpower and efficiency study of the \$25 billion-a-year agency to make sure it is run cost-effectively. #2, veterans "expect the administrator to articulate our thoughts and feelings, our just needs and our problems, in the highest councils of the government. Because if he does not, who will?" #3, the administrator must have a compassionate understanding of the needs and problems of war veterans and their families, widows and orphans. The VA chief embodies the idea that the government has a soul: "In all that he says and does, he must give evidence that he does indeed understand and that he cares." The Legion reminded the Senate committee that the Veterans Administration is an agency replete with problems and a vast agency that manifests both the best and the worst of bureaucracy. Three problems that a new administrator must give his attention to were put forth to the committee and they were the unmet needs of Vietnam veterans, especially the

urgent questions about the possible health effects of Agent Orange; the aging World War II portion of the veteran population, numbering 12 million, average age 63, whose health-care needs will strain the VA system; and the growing number of women in military service. Noting that within the next ten years, women will comprise as much as 12 percent of the total military manpower of the nation. This means that more and more of them will comprise as much as 12 percent of the total military manpower of the nation. This means that more and more of them will have claims on the government through the VA. This brings to attention the fact that the agency has served mostly a male clientele and will be ready to deal with a more balanced population, with a greater variety of needs. The Senators were informed that The American Legion has had women members since it was founded following World War I, and it insists that the federal government deal compassionately and effectively with the problem of women veterans. And

lastly, the Legion after making its views known, reserved the right, to speak out and debate with the next VA chief concerning any of his policies with which it might disagree. So now you have a bit more information about the depth of the Legion's thinking on the administration of the VA.
