## Hicksville Faces School Tax Increase

At the February 23 meeting of the Hicksville School Board, the Budget Advisory Committee asked for a public meeting to immediately alert residents of an impending school tax increase.

Committee Chairman Larry Wolfson reported lengthy studies revealed the necessity of an approximate \$2 1/2 million (or \$2.50 per \$100) increase without critically affecting existing programs. He also anticipates a 3 to 5% decline in state aid. Co-chairperson Pam Kemmler told the Board "Give the community the figures now. We are facing a large tax increase for Hicksville." She wants to educate residents as to what plans will be made to address this situation. President Charlene Anci agreed to start preparations for a public meeting on the subject.

Anci also wants to stimulate a letter writing campaign to state legislators against state aid cuts. And, on March 15 a day in Albany is planned by state PTA's, School Boards, Teachers, etc. to demonstrate opposition to Cuo-

mo's cuts.

Financial considerations dominated other areas of the meeting. Superintendent Catherine Fenton gave as her report an analysis of the second quarter financial statements prepared by Richard Weigang. She praised his efficient handling of the business office of the district.

While the Board was awarding bids and approving claims and warrants, Trustee Thomas Nagel questioned large expenditures for file cabinets and musical instruments, and suggested careful consideration be given to a long range plan to justify rental or purchase of such equipment.

Nagel voiced opposition to a recommendation to a change in compensation for substitute teachers, which would increase the salary rate according to number of accrued working days. The motion was tabled. Nagel said, "The problem is much more than money. The substitute program needs to be addressed. I would rather see a flat rate and stop counting the days. I recommend we sit down with the teacher's union and address

the problem of the long term sub."

The Board approved a memorandum of agreement between the district and the Hicksville Secretaries' Association. It handled routine personnel matters and increased a part time physical education teacher in the high school, Victoria Vrona, to full time.

The Board approved the revision of policy DEAA - Real Property Tax Exemption and the Adoption of Administration Goals policy. Textbooks and recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped were approved. The date of the Annual Meeting was established as May 25, 1983 and the Board accepted the 1982-83 Budgetary Transfers and Budget Operational Reports for the 2nd quarter in the amount of \$232,829.33. Revision of Board policy regarding Public's Right to Know was received for consideration and discussion.

An overview of the District's K-2 Mathematics Program, including Computer Education was presented by Mr. Richard Hogan. Carrie Clark expressed con-

cern about the regents math failure rate in the high school. Dr. Fenton acknowledged the "serious problem". She is giving a report to the Board at the next meeting. Jr. High Teacher Max Joseph advocated strongly encouraging students into math programs because "we are entering into a technical future." In another area, he asked for more positive reaction to emergency situations and questioned why there was no early dismissal during the recent snowstorm.

The long range planning committee, chaired by Mr. Arena is planning a March 10 meeting to initiate district plans, taking into consideration the report of the Budget Advisory Committee.

President Anci has proposed district support of a child fingerprinting program. She suggested PTA volunteer involvement and schools would provide space. Fingerprints would be maintained by parents.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Education will be on March 9 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Bldg.

## Congress Begins Work On Restoring Stability To Social Security

This past week, the House Ways and Means Committee concluded its hearings on proposals to restore financial stability and solvency to our Nation's Social Security system, and will soon begin the process of putting together the legislation needed to accomplish this.

There is no doubt that remedial action is needed. Right now the Social Security Trust fund is losing \$20,000 per minute every minute of every day. Benefit payments continue to exceed the tax revenues being paid into the Trust Fund. Unless the Congress takes action the Social Security Trust Fund faces insolvency as early as July of this year!

I can assure you that the Congress will not permit the Social Security system to fall into bankruptcy. There will be action to restore financial stability so there will be no interruption of benefit payments for today's recipients, and there will be assurance of benefits for future recipients.

What is uncertain at this time is the type of corrective action the Congress will take. The Ways and Means

Committee hearings focused on the controversial set of recommendations from the National Commission on Social Security Reform. This would bring the Social Security Trust Fund an estimated \$169 billion in additional revenues by 1990.

There is growing opposition to some of the proposed changes, such as delaying the cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) in Social Security for six months, taxing some Social Security benefits, and putting newly hired federal and postal service workers, and workers for non profit groups under Social Security.

It is too early to predict what corrective legislation the House Ways and Means Committee will propose. But I plan to use three criteria in making judgments on any proposals:

- 1) Social Security benefit levels to current recipients must not be cut
  - 2) Changes in the system must be allocated as fairly as possible.
  - 3) Solutions must be effective over the long term.
- Within such guidelines workable changes can be made. I welcome your views.

Governor Cuomo's proposals for changes in aid to education have evoked heated responses locally because they would result in significant decreases to many Long Island school districts. In the past, despite similar annual proposals by then - Governor Carey, no substantial changes were made. This year may be different, however, because the courts have decided not to act and, in the Levittown decision, have thrown the matter back into the lap of the Legislature.

"Equitable Financing for

Public Education: What Next After Levittown?" is the subject of an all-day conference, sponsored by Nassau Citizens Budget Committee, to be held on

Saturday, March 19, from 9 AM to 3:15 PM, in Adelphi University's University Center, Garden City. The \$10 fee includes continental breakfast and lunch. Checks made

According to Phoebe Goodman, Executive Director of the independent budget reform group, "NCBC hopes an exchange of views among concerned citizens from 'poor and wealthy' Long Island school districts and the prestigious speakers will spark a Long Island consensus leading to equitable changes acceptable to the public".
