Although rising costs of personnel, equipment, and instructional materials as well as the uncertainties regarding Gov. Cuomo's budget relating to state aid to education threaten to boost the school tax rate of Hicksville residents, the district is taking steps to address this critical issue.

The Budget Advisory Committee of the Hicksville Board of Education, led by chairman Larry Wolfson and co-chair Pam Kemelein will meet on Monday, March 7, at 8:15pm in a joint public session with the

Board to discuss Code 2000, the instruction segment of the budget.

A Task Force composed of representatives from the Hicksville Congress of Teachers, PTA Council, the Council of Administrators, the custodial and secretarial units, and the Superintendent's cabinet will hold a first meeting on Monday, March 14, at 8:15pm, and interested members of the community are invited to join Budget Committee and Task Force members for this important session.

A tour of district facilities

will be conducted for the Committee by Facilities and Operations Director William Becker to view capital improvements and illustrate the need for expenditures included in the preliminary budget. The tours are scheduled for March 16 at 1:30 m and 7:15pm.

All these activities are aimed at studying the budget situation and the impact on local taxes and keeping the public informed throughout the budget-making process. Estimates based on current budget recommendations could

raise the tax rate by approximately \$3.70 per \$100 assessed valuation, and the Board, Committee members, and administrators are working to ensure that the final budget presented to the voters on May 25 will be a sound and responsible one which will maintain the high level of quality of the district's instructional program.

The public is encouraged to attend and participate in Budget Committee meetings, which are held in the conference room of the Administration Building on Division Avenue.

ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING

A 16 year old Hicksville boy was accidentally shot by his employer Feb. 23 as they were counting the day's receipts while closing the store.

Stanley Greenberg, 25, the owner of the Northern 5&10e Store, 424 Jerusalem Ave., Hicksville, was founting the money at 6:30 PM and had his licensed .38 Cal. Walther automatic handgun, on the counter next to him. Edward Bilello, 16, of 22 Hunter St., Hicksville, an employee, walked up to the counter and picked up the gun. Greenberg yelled "at

him to put it down which Bilello did. Greenberg then picked up the gun and cautioned Bilello that he "should never point a gun at someone like this," and suddenly the gun went off, the bullet striking Bilello in the stomach. He was rushed to NCMC in a police ambulance and is currently in critical condition in surgery. Eighth Squad and Homicide Squad personnel are investigating but no charges are being brought against Greenberg at this time.

ARMED ROBBERY

At 11:30 on Feb. 28 Thomas Walsh, the Manager of

the Grand Union store, located at 434 Jerusalem Ave. Hicksville, was on the telephone, when he was approached by two males. One of the men pointed a hand gun at Mr. Walsh's stomach and stated this is a stick up, this is no joke get the money. The men forced the victim into the office which is near the front door, and made him open the safe. Finding no money inside, the pair removed approx. \$1000 dollars from the cash drawers, and after ordering Walsh to lie on the floor, fled the store on foot in an unknown direction.

The robbers are described

as follows:

1- Male Hispanic, 23 years, 5'8", 135-145 lbs. wearing Khaki Jacket and Khaki pants. Armed with hand gun.

2- Male Hispanic late 20s, 5'11" to 6', 170 lbs. wearing Blue Jeans, and Army Jacket.

No injuries were reported during the incident. Detective George Kuebler of the Eighth Squad is investigating.

The Royal Diner, 495 Old Country Rd., Hicksville, was burglarized on Feb. 28. Entry was gained by breaking a rear window. \$550 in cash was reported stolen.

The Hicksville fire department responded and extinguished the blaze.

Bills Would Give Local Governments More Control Over Flea Markets

Senator Norman J. Levy (R.C-Merrick) and Assemblyman Phil Wealey (R.C-Massapequa) have introduced legislation which would give local governments greater control over the establishment of flea markets within their geographical boundaries.

Under the proposal, promoters of flea markets must obtain formal written proof from the local municipal government stating that all local laws, ordinances, rules and locally enforced requirements of the locality have been met before these events can receive a "show" permit from the State Tax Commission.

Noting that within the past several years, local communities have seen an extensive proliferation of flea markets, Levy and Healey stated, "some of these

shows have not complied with local zoning and building regulations which are designed to protect the safety and well being of the public."

In addition, the two legislators stressed that local governments should have more power to regulate and/or prohibit flea markets which in other communities, through the attraction of large crowds,

have brought increased traffic congestion and excess litter into the area.

"Community homeowners have the right to expect that flea markets will not infringe on the residential character of their neighborhoods and that the operators of such events adhere to local zoning and building laws," concluded Levy and Healey.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the resurfacing and reconstruction of various roads located throughout and in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, including road striping thereon and the purchase and installation of traffic signs and devices necessary in connection therewith.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes is \$2,775,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivisions 20(c) and 20(d) of paragraph a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Massapequa Observer, Mid Island Herald, Oyster Bay Enterprise Pilot, Locust Valley Leader together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Ken Koneck, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth P. Koneck of 21 Wellesley Lane in Hicksville and a 1980 graduate of Hicksville High School, has become the first swimmer in Mount Union College history to qualify for the NCAA Division III Championships in two events.

college located in Alliance, Ohio, achieved the distinction at the Ohio Athletic Conference Championships this past Thursday, Friday and Saturday at Oberlin College. He qualified for nationals, and set school records, in the 500-yard freestyle and 1,650-yard freestyle with times of 4:44.35 and 16:41.52, respectively.

Kehres has mapped out the next battle in Koneck's attempt to become the first swimming All-American in Mount Union history.

"The thing we have to do is work hard the next eight to 10 days, try to recover, and view the championships as high quality training and do even better yet, because it will take considerable improvement to be in the top 12 nationally," he said.

Mount Union finished fourth in the OAC meet, matching the highest finish in school history and improving last year's fifth place. Kenyon College won the title for the 30th consecutive season.

Sam Schiener became a druggist and returned to a Hicksville business, which was well-respected.

The 1929 loss to Great Neck was part of a 13 year jinx which ended in 1936. The celebration barn fire lit the Hempstead Plains for miles around.

Hicksville Republican Club News

We all missed our February meeting due to the blizzard; and, consequently, missed the very timely and informative program scheduled for that meeting concerning financial planning. However, we will be able to reschedule this program to be presented at another club meeting.

Along this vein, a new drive has been launched in the Congress to increase individual income taxes. Congressman Norman Lent said that House Speaker Tip O'Neill and other liberals in the House are demanding that the third year of the income tax reduction program voted by the Congress in 1981 be revoked, along with the law taking effect in 1985 requiring indexing of income tax rates to inflation. Their argument is that these tax reductions already voted into law by the Congress must be repealed because of prospective deficits.

These proponents of tax increases are making the wrong move at the wrong time, in Lent's opinion. Higher taxes don't cure deficits — if anything they help cause them by stifling

the economy. Proof that higher taxes are of little use in curbing deficits can be found by reviewing the tax revenue and deficit records of the U.S. Treasury for the past two decades. In that period tax revenues have skyrocketed to some \$650 billion per year, from less than \$100 billion. But instead of declining, federal deficits have skyrocketed right along with the bigger tax revenues.

If the Congress follows the demand of Speaker Tip O'Neill and his fellow liberals and eliminates the ten percent reduction in individual income tax rates due to take effect July 1, it will mean an actual increase in taxes for most Long Island taxpayers. Inflation has pushed many family incomes into higher tax brackets. This, plus increasing Social Security taxes will mean that most taxpayers will find their total federal taxes increasing, if they don't get the ten percent reduction now scheduled for July 1. Long Islanders certainly don't need higher income taxes this year.

Lent believes that farther down the road, the indexing

of income tax rates is just as important. Set to become effective in 1985, indexing will automatically reduce the point at which a taxpayer moves into a higher tax bracket by the amount of current inflation. This provision was designed to halt so-called "bracket creep" by which inflation has pushed taxpayers into higher and higher income tax brackets although their real income is not increasing.

The tax relief provided in these two measures now being targeted for repeal by the liberals is sorely needed by the average taxpayers — the middle income families who are the mainstay of Long Island. The middle income families have been hardest hit by "bracket creep." "Bracket creep" produces huge amounts of tax revenues, without any apparent increases in taxes. Most people don't realize this, said Lent.

Section 1. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the purchase by the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, of machinery and apparatus costing over \$30,000, to be used for constructing, reconstructing, repairing, maintaining or removing snow and ice from any physical betterment or improvement.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes is \$928,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$881,600 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

b) By the issuance of \$46,400 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law, Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law,

the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable.
