School Budget Advisory Committee Calls Joint Public Session

Although rising costs of personnel, equipment, and instructional materials as well as the uncertainties regarding Gov. Cuomo's budget relating to state aid to education threaten to ost the school tax rate of Hicksville residents, the district is taking steps to address this critical issue.

The Budget Advisory Committee of the Hicksville Board of Education, led by chairman Larry Wolfson and co-chair Pam Kemmlein will meet on Monday. March 7, at 8:15pm in a joint

Board to discuss Code 2000, the instruction segment of the budget.

A Task Force composed of representatives from the Hicksville Congress of Teachers, PTA Council, the Council of Administrators, the custodial and secretarial units, and the Superintendent's cabinet will hold a first meeting on Monday, March 14, at 8:15pm, and interested members of the community are invited to join Budget Committee and Task Force members for this important

A tour of district facilities

will be conducted for the Committee by Facilities and Operations Director William Becker to view capital improvements and illustrate the need for expenditures included in the preliminary budget. The tours are scheduled for March 16 at 1:30 m and 7:15pm.

All these activities are aimed at studying the budget situation and the impact on local taxes and keeping the public informed throughout the budgetmaking process. Estimates based on current budget recommendations could raise the tax rate by approximately \$3.70 per \$100 assessed valuation, and the Board, Committee members, and administrators are final budget presented to the voters on May 25 will be a sound and responsible one which will maintain the high level of quality of the dis-trict's instructional program.

Under the proposal, promoters of flea markets must obtain formal written proof from the local municipal government stating that all local laws, ordinances, rules and locally enforced require-ments of the locality have been met before these events can receive a "show" permit from the State Tax Commission.

Noting that within the past several years, local communities have seen an extensive proliferation of flea markets, Levy and Hea-ley stated, "some of these shows have not complied with local zoning and build-ing regulations which are designed to protect the safety and well being of the public."

In addition, the two legislators stressed that local governments should have more power to regulate and/or prohibit flea markets which in other communities, through the attraction of large crowds,

have brought increased traf-fic congestion and excess litter into the area.

"Community homeowners have the right to expect that flea markets will not infringe on the residen-tial character of their neighborhoods and that the oper-ators of such events adhere to local zoning and building laws," concluded Levy and Healey.

Kehres has mapped out the next battle in Koneck's attempt to become the first swimming All-American in Mount Union history.

"The thing we have to do is work hard the next eight to 10 days, try to recover, and view the championships as high quality training and do even better yet, because it will take considerable improvement to be in the top 12 nationally," he said.

Mount Union finished fourth in the OAC meet matching the highest finish in school history and improving last year's fifth place. Kenyon College won the title for the 30th consecutive season.


