At The School Board Meeting

An announcement of a special meeting of the Board of Education on Saturday morning to discuss analysis and assessment of programs met opposition from board members at the March 23 meeting. Superintendent Catherine Fenton requested this meeting and set the time "to discuss programs and possible limitation of pro-grams." Since this would have an impact on specific people, she also anticipated a lengthy executive session



Museum historians believe it remained intact through the 1930's and sections may have stood until the early 1950's when the fairgrounds were demolished to make way for the new County Court building.
