RESOLUTION NO. 266-1983 BOND RESOLUTION DATED MARCH 22, 1983. A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$316,350 SERIAL BONDS AND \$16,650 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE ORIGINAL IMPROVEMENT OF THE SYOSSET LANDFILL.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the original improvement by the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, of the Syosset landfill, consisting of the regrading, paving, capping and gas venting of such landfill.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$333,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$316,350 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and
b) By the issuance of \$16,650 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law.

Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the

aforsaid specific object or purpose is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 6-a of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of, and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, bond anticipation notes and capital notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money; or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Massapequa Post, Bethpage Tribune, Plainview Herald and Oyster Bay Guardian, the official newspaper, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Robbery Squad detectives arrested two men 3-23-83, and charged them with two robberies that occurred on the same day and closed out four other robbery cases.

Det. Charles Judson and Raymond Mayberry, Robbery Squad, arrested Robert Denton, 20, of 23 Freeport Ave., Point Lookout, and Richard Rosen 31, of Plover Lane, Hicksville. The two are charged with the Robbery of the Epstein residence, 259 Ellen Place.

Carpenters Union Local #1772 in its April newsletter printed the following:

"The Hicksville F.D. is using non-union labor on their expansion program. Our executive board mailed a letter regarding our disapproval of non union labor, but to date have received no response. I ask for your support, **DO NOT DONATE ANY MONEY** to Hicksville Fire Dept. Also, tell them why you refuse to donate funds." This letter sent out over the signature of Business Rep. Ernest Dunckack.

Asst. Chief Owen Magee, Dept. Public Information Officer stated that the request by the Union, if followed, could cripple the Fire Dept. operations and programs in fire safety and fire prevention. Many functions and programs are not eligible for tax funding and need resident donations. But, Magee said the cause of the problem is that the union brass does not know what it is talking about. "They are way off base."

The facts are as follows:

1. The Board of Fire arrested in the rear of Uncle Sams, Hempstead Tpke., Levittown at 3:25 A.M. by Det. Sgt. Wm. Wagner of the Robbery Squad.

He was charged with the robbery of a Mobile S/S, 710 Fulton Ave., Hempstead and another Mobile S/S, Old Country Rd. & Duffy Ave., Hicksville. A total of \$775 dollars was taken in the robberies. No recovery was made.

The investigation is continuing. The subject was arraigned in 1st District C., Mineola.

Local Union Urging Non-Support Of Fire Dept.

Commissioners, elected by taxpayers are in fact the Fire District. They are mandated by state laws as to how money is spent. The Hicksville Fire Dept. is a separate entity and does not hire or spend taxpayers money. The Chief officers make requests for equipment and apparatus, etc.

2. The Fire Commissioners must act in the best interests of taxpayers and in accordance with the law. They must accept the lowest responsible bid, any exceptions must be resolved before the bid is awarded.

3. The Fire District pays union scale in accord with state law.

4. The program in question - Station #2 Woodbury Rd. and Briggs St. has been inspected twice by state authorities and was in accordance with all requirements and laws.

5. The Fire District did in fact answer the Union's inquiry.

The irresponsible statements by the Union, before checking, constitutes a grave

threat to the Fire Dept. operations. Fire Dept. officers will meet to decide if legal action will be taken to force retraction of statements that are erroneous.

Hicksville fire fighters respond day and night to anyone's call for help or assist in any way possible whether it be a resident, or persons visiting or driving through. It is done regardless of union/non-union, race, creed or color. It is done at great personal and financial risk to themselves.

They ask only for your support.

Magee stated no one group should ever be allowed to dictate the operations involving the public safety, and asks residents to continue their support. Efforts have been made as this report goes to press to enlighten the union on the differences between "fire district" and "fire department" the Union has always been a supporter. The Fire Dept. does not like to lose support from anyone.

Matters such as the proposed plans for the Plaza at Mid Island, the illegal truck depot in the Sears parking lot close to residences, and the continued operation of the cement hopper by a Mr. Agostino, although this operation is in contempt of court decisions, will all be discussed and progress reported.

Incidentally, the Building Dept. of the TOB has rejected the request of Grosco Corp. to open a second restaurant (199 seats) on the lower level of the site at Mid Island Plaza where this Corp. has plans for a dinner theatre and various restaurants and food boutiques. While the over-all plans for this area sound as if they will upgrade this section of our business area, which, if it went downhill could easily turn into a flea market type of discount - only operation, the plans for such upgrading must be studied carefully. It is hoped that the Chairman of the Board and the President and other Grosco officials will be at a Council meeting soon, so that their plans can be more readily understood by residents of Hicksville, whose concern is understandable.

A REMINDER: TOB's Solid Waste Management Facility located east of the corner of Round Swamp Rd. and Bethpage Sweet Hollow Rd., will be open from 10:20 am to 6 pm for five consecutive weekends beginning Sat., April 16 and continuing Sats and Suns through May 16 for residents tackling spring cleanup projects who don't want to wait for their regular rubbish collection day to get rid of accumulated refuse. You will be required to show proof of residency and only private cars and trucks will be permitted... no vehicles with commercial plates will be allowed. Rubbish which can be divided into bundles not weighing more than 50 pounds or measuring greater than four feet in any direction may be placed at the curb for collection on a resident's regular rubbish pickup day. However, items exceeding these guidelines require a special bulk pickup which can be arranged by calling the Sanitation Collection Services Div. at 921-3850.

SENIOR CITIZENS and veterans will be able to apply for their property tax exemptions of Wed., Apr. 13 from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. when the County Dept. of Assessment will have special evening hours to accommodate them. Chairman of our County Board of Assessors Abe Seldin tells us. These applications may also be filed during the normal business hours, 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Mon. thru Fri. until the legal filing deadline, which this year is May 2nd. The Dept.'s offices are located on the 4th floor of the Nassau County Office Building at 240 Old Country Road in Mineola on the southwest corner of County Seat Dr. and Old Country Rd. Parking facilities are available south of this building and the N-15 bus stops at the door.

Preplanning Makes Sense

It would not be amiss for persons during their lifetime to decide what they consider a dignified and meaningful funeral. This phrase has different meanings for different people, almost as wide a range as individual life-styles. Parola: School Aid Massacre Averted ... Suburbs Not Getting Fair Share

Expressing dissatisfaction with the final negotiated school aid package, Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) today spoke out on the education funding plan.

Parola said that despite the tremendous effort put forth by the residents of the 14th Assembly District working with him and his fellow legislators to convince Governor Cuomo of our education needs, he was disappointed in the final negotiated school aid package.

"Fighting together with Senators Norman Levy, Ralph Marino and John Dunne, we were successful in defeating the governor's original education proposal which would have devastated quality education in the suburbs by not only cutting state aid but through a change in the formula that would have brought drastic cutbacks in future years," Parola declared.

"I was pleased to personally deliver many thousands of letters to the governor's office protesting these school aid cuts which demonstrated the active interest our taxpayers have in seeing that we receive our fair share," the assemblyman added.

"As a result of our combined efforts we received the following increase from the governor's original school aid proposal: +\$1,814,466 Hicksville +\$72,816

"While this is certainly a victory, we were unable to

achieve total reform of the system that would bring meaningful relief to the taxpayers of our county."

Parola continued, "Residents of Nassau have endured the highest taxes in the nation to support quality education. For many years suburban districts have committed well beyond their means to continue this support, yet the state's commitment to education has steadily decreased since the late 1960's.

"During the Assembly debate on the State budget, my amendment to give special aid to low to moderate wealth districts located in high cost areas was defeated on a party line vote," Parola explained.

"I am greatly disappointed in Governor Cuomo's and Speaker Stanley Fink's failure to confront the inequities that now exist. Under a final negotiated package, a wealthy district with high property wealth like Great Neck receives a 4.5 percent in aid over last year, whereas the average increase in my low-to-moderate property wealth districts is 1.1 percent.

I am, however, pleased that the school aid bill did include increases, excluding aid programs that are tied directly to school expenditures such as transportation and building, as follows: Hicksville +\$72,816 "Despite the fact that we put forth our best effort, much more needs to be done

to relieve our overburdened taxpayers." Parola concluded. "Our victory over the governor's proposal is

great but we must further enrich the levels to our districts in the supplemental budget."

Recently information came to light regarding the American Legion as opposed to The American Legion, of which we are members... Seems there was an article written in 1962 for The Denver Post entitled "The First American Legion"... The article detailed former President Theodore Roosevelt's concern during the early years of World War I, that the war had reached a stalemate... To offset this stalemate, and to turn the tides of war in favor of the Allies, he offered to raise a division under his own command... This division was called the American Legion... Teddy solicited for volunteers through newspapers and magazines and though no one could ever put an exact count on the number of volunteers responding frequently 50,000 was the number most used... The article further stated that Roosevelt sent out buttons and I.D. cards to the volunteers and instructed them to wait until called... When the United States entered the war in 1917, Roosevelt submitted his plan to President Wilson and Secretary of War Newton D. Baker... Sam Game-well, a member of this first American Legion stated in

the article why he felt Roosevelt's plan never became a reality... "Teddy was a big man," Gamewell said, "And they were afraid to let him go because of politics, after all he was a hero of San Juan Hill... If he had come back from the World War a hero again there would have been no stopping him..." This first American Legion had no organization outside of Teddy Roosevelt... Its members never held reunions, never corresponded, and never organized, so the article stated... I have heard of this 'other American Legion' quite a few years ago but put it aside as a unfounded rumor until the above information came to light through the American Legion News Service... There used to be a lot of good interesting stories going around when I first became a member of The American Legion and I, for one, enjoyed listening to the tales of the old soldiers or the sea tales of the old sailors... Some were very amusing, some were frightening and some were quite unbelievable no matter which way you looked at the story... Being an old Navy man myself I naturally enjoyed the Navy and Marine stories

the most and some at the time seemed too far fetched to be true but in later years I found proof of some of these tales in updated history books dealing with WW... Then there are some tales which although eye witnessed you cannot relate in print no matter how funny they may be because of the embarrassment possible to one or two of the principals even after these many years... Then there are also some great tales of Legion doings at conventions that are really funny but must be kept under wraps to uphold the dignity of the momentarily undignified... Once again, and for the last time this year, please look and see if you have a 1983 Dues card in your wallet at this time... If you haven't you are as of April 1st, suspended from all privileges and benefits that an American Legion membership brings...
