Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$333,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as

a) By the issuance of \$316,350 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and b) By the issuance of \$16,650 capital notes of said

Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated the Supervisor, the chief fis-cal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issu-ance of the bonds herein ance of the bonds herein authorized or bond antici-pation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107:00 of the Lu

Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the LEGAL NOTICE

aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 6-a of paragraph a of Section Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will

exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby dele-gated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local

I ask for your sup-port, DO NOT DONATE ANY MONEY to Hicksville ... Fire Dept. Also, tell them why you refuse to donate funds." This letter sent out over the signature of Busi-

ness Rep. Ernest Dunckack. Asst. Chief Owen Magee, Dept. Public Information Officer stated that the request by the Union, if fol-lowed, could cripple the Fire Dept. operations and pro-grams in fire safety and fire prevention. Many functions and programs are not eligible for tax funding and need resident donations. But, resident donations. But, Magee said the cause of the problem is that the union brass does not know what it is talking about, "They are way off base."

Seems there was an article written in 1962 for The Denver Post entitled The First American Legi-on."...The article detailed former President Theodore Roosevelt's concern during the early years of World War I, that the war had reached a stalemate...To offset this stalemate, and to turn the tides of war in favor of the Allies, he offered to raise a division under his own command...This division was called the Amerifor volunteers through newspapers and magazines and though no one could ever put an exact count on the number of volunteers responding frequently 50,000 was the number most used...The article further stated that Roosevelt sent out buttons and I.D. cards to the volunteers and instructed them to wait until called...When the United States entered the war in 1917, Roosevelt submitted his plan to President Wilson and Secretary of War Newton D Baker Sam Gamewell, a member of this first American Legion stated in the article why he felt Roosevelt's plan never became a reality..."Teddy was a big man," Gamewell said, "And they were afraid to let him go because of polit-ics, afterall he was a hero of San Juan Hill... If he had come back from the World War a hero again there would have been no stop-ping him."...This first American Legion had no American Legion had no organization outside of Teddy Roosevelt...Its members never held reun-ions, never corresponded, and never organized, so the article stated...I have heard of this 'other American Legion quite a few years ago but put it aside as a unfounded rumor until the above information came to light through the American Legion News Service.-...There used to be a lot of

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau LEGA' MOTICE

County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the purchase of and installation of equipment at various beaches located throughout and in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New

Section 2, The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes is \$102,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$102,000 serial bonds of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law.
