Chamber of Commerce Meeting

The next luncheon meeting of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce will be held on Tuesday, April 19 in the Quaker Room of the Milleridge Inn at 12:30 p.m.

The cost is \$6.75 per person and the menu is a choice of meat, fish or fowl.

On the agenda are financial reports, new member report of the board meeting, and committee reports.

The program speaker is Mr. Len Myers who has a proposal to discuss which could prove to be beneficial to the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce.

Hicksville fire fighters battled a smoky fire for four hours at the DePew Mfg. factory. The fire, at Duffy Ave. and Charlotte Ave., was reported via automatic sprinkler alarm at 8:06 p.m. on April 5th. 90 Vamps, using 10 pieces of apparatus under Asst. Chief Owen Magee responded to the 2 alarm fire.

The DePew Co. uses hazardous materials in its manufacturing process. Chemicals such as organic peroxide, M.E.K. peroxide plus storage of propane and plastic resins. While no large quantity of chemicals were involved, the smoke was toxic and self contained air masks were used all through the fire fighting.

The factory had the potential to contribute a greater hazard to Vamps. Mutual aid assistance was

requested from Jericho and Plainview for stand-by duty at fire headquarters. Bethpage and Jericho supplied ambulances at the scene. Levittown Ladder Co. 6, Westbury Engine 10, East Meadow Rescue and Floodlight worked at the scene. The East Meadow Haz-Mat team assisted Hicksville's Haz-Mat team in searching for chemicals and isolating them. For a time it was feared some chemicals might cause problems. The organic peroxide chemicals must be refrigerated. If not, they become unstable. The problems were rectified.

The fire is believed to have originated in a trash can and spread up to the roof. The cause of the fire is under investigation by the Fire Marshall and Police Arson Squad.

Chief Magee, assisted by

Chiefs Schuckmann and O'Brien, commended all Vamps working the fire. He attributed their quick actions to keeping the building intact. There was only one minor injury. Damage was confined mostly to the roof area.

The Hicksville Ladies Auxiliary supplied refreshments at the scene. The Hicksville Water District adjusted valves in the area and boosted water volume to the area. LILCO gas and electric crews also assisted at the scene.

Preliminary plans for the 25th Homecoming Dance was discussed with request for table holds for members of the 1933 and 1963 classes.

Hicksville Athletic Director Richard Hogan accepted a laminated program of the 1968 Alumni Homecoming Scoreboard dedication that was in honor of the Orange and Black's 1966 New York State and Nassau County Championship. It will be placed in the school's trophy case.

Board Of Education Reviews Budget

At its meeting of April 13, after listening to petitions from residents regarding budgetary cuts, the Board of Education adjourned to Executive session and returned to continue budget discussions. They went through all the codes, except 2000, and adopted reduced figures. A special Budget meeting is scheduled for Thursday, April 14 to continue discussions and focus on "Code 2000-Instruction."

The possible budget trimming residents asked about were guidance counselors and the foreign language program in the elementary school. Superintendent Catherine Fenton cited figures to show why plans are being considered to teach students within the classroom, rather than pulling

them out for special classes at the elementary level. "Each year our class size drops," she said. "Projections for 83-84 are 37 classes with enrollment of 15, 16 or 17 students. With declining enrollment, we have a high budget with small class size. 125 teachers at the elementary level with 85 special teachers... 2 teachers per 17 kids." She is also concerned with fragmented classes.

Several other residents spoke in favor of the elementary foreign language program and the guidance counselors. And Linda Strogan asked that the Gifted and Talented Program in the Junior High be kept intact. A representative of the Junior High PTSA asked that the guidance counselors remain the same,

the summer program not be cancelled and the 9th period at the Junior High remain. President Charlene Anci affirmed there were no plans to cut summer school or the 9th period in the junior high. Possibilities for budget reduction in the future will be studied by the Long Range Planning Committee chaired by Daniel Arena, currently studying building and facilities use. This committee will meet on April 28 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Bldg.

During the Action Section of the meeting, the Board approved a Memorandum of Agreement with the Hicksville Building and Grounds Unit, C.S.E.A., establishing a new negotia-

tion agreement covering the period of July 1, 1982 to June 30, 1985.

The Board approved recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped, awarded bids and approved Claims and Warrants. It approved the extension of the food service contract with Educational Management Services Inc.

The Board approved routing personnel matters and special mention was given to retirements. Best wishes were extended to Esther H. Menes, teacher, retiring after 19 years of service. Pauline Schlenker, retiring after 25 years of service, was highly praised by Mr. Nagel.

Answers On Emergency Planning

If Shoreham is safe, and the likelihood of an accident is extremely remote, why do we need an emergency preparedness plan?

Planning in advance for even the most unlikely set of events makes good sense, whether planning for a hurricane, a chemical spill, a fire in your home or a nuclear power plant accident.

It just makes good sense to prepare for the possibility of something unusual happening because planning ahead provides added safeguards.

To insure that the public health and safety is protected, LILCO has worked with Suffolk County planners for seven years on an emergency preparedness plan. It's a plan that takes full account of seasonal population changes, meteorological conditions and roadways, and details the responsibilities of emergency personnel.

But all of these elements - geography, weather conditions, population and roadways - are considered in the design of an emergency plan, and emergency plans have been developed and successfully drilled under all kinds of conditions.

There is every reason to believe that with the sophistication of our county planners and the commitment of our emergency personnel, we can provide the same measure of protection for Long Island as is provided everywhere else.

Keeping Informed

Keeping informed is the best way to insure that emergency planning will work for you.

Residents living within a 10-mile radius of the Shoreham plant are already receiving relevant information about the nuclear power station.

As the date for commercial operation of Shoreham nears, special booklets will be mailed to neighbors of the plant. These booklets will contain detailed information about emergency planning. In addition, information will be provided through monthly bill inserts, special bulletins and local newspaper and radio announcements.

Long Island residents should understand that emergency preparedness planning is not a new idea. It is something that has been successfully carried out all over the country to respond to any situation where unified public action is required.

Time and again, the strength and spirit of residents and emergency personnel have forged a strong working relationship that enables us to meet whatever crisis we have had to confront.

In the case of Shoreham, the chances that we will ever have to face such a crisis are slim, indeed. But it's always better to be prepared.

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced Town Board approval of a new reduced speed limit of 20 M.P.H. during school hours, on Division Avenue in Hicksville.

"Following the recommendation of a Nassau County Police Department Traffic Survey conducted in the area of Hicksville Senior High School, the Town has lowered the speed limit on Division Avenue between

At The Town Board Meeting

Supervisor Colby said, "This is a much more intelligent use of the property." Decision was reserved.

Metro-House Constructors, Inc. of Woodbury received a one year extension on their special use permit. This extension was granted because of the delays Metro-House received from Nassau County said a spokesperson of the Town.

The Town Board approved a request by St. Stephan Lutheran Church, 270 Broadway, Hicksville, for a roll off waste container for their Earth Day Events to be held on April 23, 1983 and October 22, 1983.

A resolution was passed for new reduced speed limit of 20 m.p.h. during school hours on Division Ave. in Hicksville. The Town Board also approved a school caution sign to be erected on 2nd Street, near the corner of Jerusalem Ave.

A special use permit was granted to the Elkom Company, Inc. at 15 Cantiague Rock Road, Hicksville. The permit will allow Elkom to build a 2400 sq. ft. addition to their existing building. It will be used for administrative offices, storage of automobile parts and 6 garage bays for repair to their vehicles. They are also going to relocate several gasoline pumps on the premises.

The permit has the following restrictions, no rebuilding of engines or straightening of chassis; vehicular repairs to the public and the sale of gasoline to the public is prohibited; business hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily and 9 a.m. to noon on Saturdays; low-growing shrubbery on the property by Cantiague Lane and Cantiague Rock Road; no body or fender work or welding done outside; and all the lighting has to be directed on the property with no spill over to adjacent areas.

Illegal Hopper Operation In Contempt Of Court Removal Ordered By Supreme Court Justice

Clark said that, "The defendant, Vincent Agostino, Inc., is in contempt of a court decision dated December 22, 1982, which clearly required that he stop operations and remove the illegally erected cement hopper located at the site. The judgement had required Agostino not only to stop

operating but to dismantle the hopper within thirty days."

Justice Murphy found that, although attorneys for Agostino had filed an appeal and had requested permission to let the hopper remain inoperative on the premises pending the outcome of the appeal, Agostino had, in

fact, continued operation.

Clark added that "Agostino has been ordered by the court to remove the cement hopper and to stop operating within twenty days, or the Town will have the option to remove the hopper at the expense of the corporation."

Grosco Productions had an article on your front page, the Chamber of Commerce had their say, so: how about giving the people who are trying to preserve their property a chance to explain their reasons for opposing it.

1. Does the Chamber of Commerce and the Herald know that there are two sets of blueprints? One extended set, dated Jan. 1983, sent to bar owners to entice them into renting a space in the

Entertainment Center and one set presented to the Town Board and the Chamber of Commerce at their meeting. (I am in possession of these blueprints and the cover letter that was mailed with them if you should like to view them.)

2. Do the people of Hicksville know that this is not only going to be a lovely little restaurant or dinner theater seating 200 people? If the special-use permit is granted by the Town Board for this Entertainment Center, it will have a capacity of 1332 people and parking for 600 cars. (This is a tremendous amount of noise the residents would have to tolerate as the patrons exit from the catering facilities, dinner theater and bars.)

3. Do the people know that Grosco Productions

It will also be noisy for the people on north and south boundaries as all cars must pass their houses to exit.)

4. Do the people of Hicksville know that once this variance is granted and if this business fails ANY kind of business could open in that building without restrictions? (This is a quote by Supervisor Colby at the Town Board meeting of Jan. 11, 1983).

dealing with radiation-related disability claims of veterans. Several federal agencies, including the Defense and Energy Departments, have information about nuclear weapons tests such as individual exposure histories that they have been hesitant to release. The Veterans Administration has been inflexible about considering evidence of record in radiation-based claims. After 17 months of delay, the Veterans Administration has agreed to liberalize its guidelines to provide medical treatment to military personnel who took part in open air atomic tests and whose illnesses might have been caused by exposure to radiation. This change was announced at a Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee hearing in Washington on April 6th. Now this change brings these veterans one step closer to obtaining the same limited rights that the VA has granted to Vietnam veterans exposed to the defoliant Agent Orange.
