Vamp Injured In Arson Blaze

Fire Fighter Glen Blazo, 22, of Hicksville Fire Departments Protection H. & L. Co. #1 was slightly injured at the scene of a fire that was set by the homeowner.

The fire, in a 2-car detached garage at 121 Fourth St., Hicksville was reported by neighbors at 4:46 AM on April 14. Delayed detection of the fire led to the total destruction of the garage. Only the quick actions of vamps prevented the destruction of 2 nearby dwellings and garages. The rear porch of #121 Fourth St. suffered an estimated \$3000.00 damage. Total damage to the garage was put at \$7000.00.

Blazo was struck a glancing blow by a vehicle that jumped over hose lines on Jerusalem Ave. and Fifth St. He sustained injuries to his hand and fingers. He was taken to the County Medical

Center by F.D. ambulance, treated and released.

Meanwhile, vamps chased the vehicle, made positive identification of the vehicle, plate number and driver and reported back to County Police.

As it turned out, the driver of the vehicle was homeowner Dennis Bosted of 121 Fourth St., Hicksville. He was charged with arson. Police detectives in their report to local papers and other media failed to report the injury and charged filed by fire fighters in Blazo's injury.

It was reported that Bosted had violated an order of protection 3 times since March by returning to 121 Fourth St. and harassing his wife. Bosted set fire to the garage with a flammable liquid. His wife and 11 year old son escaped the home unharmed.

Bosted was arrested sev-

Jones Manor Opens -- Is It Enough?

The Jones Fund is operating a home for poor people again at the Jones Manor on the Sound in Bayville. The fund purchased an existing adult home, Farcyton Manor, licensed for 46 beds, and began operations on March 8.

The Fund, controlled by 5 trustees, was set up in compliance with the will of Samuel Jones, who, in 1836, left \$30,000 for the support of the poor. The fund has grown to \$2.8 million. Jones Institute on West John Street in Hicksville was sold in 1980, after 55 residents were relocated.

John Dawson, Chairman of the Fund's Trustees said "No specific contact has been made with the former residents. They have made new accommodations." He added there are no plans to increase the amount of beds and they are in the prospect

of getting familiar with staff requirements. He sees a need for a recreational program at the facility. He will seek volunteer services, although no invitation has been extended to groups who have volunteered at the Hicksville Institute.

A coalition of community groups challenged the sale of the Hicksville Jones Institute in court and lost. New York state dropped a lawsuit against the Jones Fund to require them to open a new home when the Jones Manor on the Sound began operations.

The trustees have fulfilled legal requirements, yet questions being raised by community groups are more moral than legal. The Fund, which has grown to \$2.8 million, producing an income of \$200,000 a year might be able to aid more poor than the 46 beds for which Jones Manor is licensed.

One way to help in our recessionary times would be to offer emergency shelter to the homeless. According to a preliminary survey of 31 volunteer agencies released on April 13, 1983 by the Nassau Action Coalition, at least 5,000 county residents needed emergency shelter last year.

"Money doesn't belong in bank, it belongs in services and facilities for the poor," said Herb Klein of Hicksville, a community member who opposed the sale of the original institute. He summed up his feelings "Here is \$2 1/2 million that is private money, that is not taxpayers money. Here is an opportunity to provide for the poor that would not cost the taxpayers anything. The trustees should not be sitting on that money."

Arthur Dobrin, Leader of the Ethical Humanist Society of Long Island,

would like to at least see as many new beds as possible added to Jones Manor and to have their budget made public. He emphasized the lack of beds for the poor in Nassau County and said in essence the taking over of this facility resulted in a net loss of 50 beds. He will continue to be involved in the present day problems of the poor. "We are going to make sure that the Jones Institute is not forgotten," he said.

Stamps Unfold An Interesting History Lesson

Hot air balloons are the colorful subject of a block of 20-cent commemorative stamps now available at the main post office and all branches and stations.

The stamps feature modern hot air balloon plus the *Intrepid*, a Civil War balloon, and the *Explorer II*, which made its flight in 1935.

The *Intrepid* is considered to have been the first aircraft used for military purposes in the United States. President Lincoln was convinced by Thaddeus S. C. Lowe, a professor, to fund a military balloon observer corps which was headed by Lowe. Shortly thereafter, the Confederacy countered with their own balloons. Thus,

the Civil War became the first American war in which aircraft were used.

Lowe's balloon corps grew to include seven balloons and more than 200 soldiers. The balloons were filled with hydrogen gas generated with acid and iron in horse-drawn carts which had been built specifically for this purpose.

Some 100 years later, the *Explorer* was launched. A joint U.S. Army and National Geographic Society sponsored flight, the balloon took off in 1935 from a rock depression near Rapid City, South Dakota. On board with Captains Albert W. Stevens and Orvil A. Anderson were many

scientific instruments and biological test equipment.

The purpose of the flight was to study stratospheric gamma rays, radio transmissions and to determine if spores could survive in the stratosphere. Reaching 72,395 feet, it set a world record for altitude. When it landed some 225 miles away, the balloon was swarmed by spectators from nearby White lakes, South Dakota, as well as enthusiasts who had followed the balloon from the launch.

The stamps were designed by Davis Meltzer, a Pennsylvania freelance artist who is associated with the National Geographic Society.

herself, nor did she use her influence to make life easier for herself... When a flood of sick came in she was on her feet for twenty-four hours at a stretch. She was known to pass eight hours on her knees dressing wounds."

What was it that caused Florence Nightingale to live the way she lived? Why did she serve in such dramatic fashion?

The answer to these questions is simple. Florence Nightingale was driven by a strong sense of purpose.

God is purposeful. And of all living creatures, man is most like the Creator in his ability to set goals and pursue them intelligently. Some psychologists believe that man cannot live a rational life without a clear and strong sense of purpose. In Mark 10:32-34 we find

Jesus exhibiting a strong sense of purpose. We can note in these verses three characteristics in the life of one who is driven by the power of purpose.

First, we see that the power of purpose can cause a person to walk alone at times. Jesus was walking alone to Jerusalem where he would ultimately accomplish His purpose, at the Cross. Others followed Him on this journey, but from a safe distance. Anyone possessed by the power of purpose, especially the Christian who is possessed by the power of God's purpose for his life, will have to walk alone at times toward that

purpose. For the Christian, this means living for Christ when others won't... living by His moral principles when others refuse.

Secondly, we learn from Mark 10 that the power of purpose can make a person steadfast. Steadfastness is faithfulness to a cause. According to Luke 9:51 Jesus steadfastly set His face toward Jerusalem. Man's opportunity for salvation is a result of His steadfastness toward His purpose. We thank God for this. And God will thank us to be equally steadfast in our commitment to His purpose for our lives. If a person is drenched in the power of his

purpose, then it should be evident in his steadfast commitment to that purpose. Likewise, if a Christian is drenched in the power of God's purpose, it should be evident in a person's every day actions of steadfast commitment.

Thirdly, the power of purpose gives a person magnetism, as we find was the case for Jesus in Mark 10. The disciples were amazed and afraid, yet they followed the Christ. Like Jesus, people who are dominated by the power of their purpose will draw others unto them. The way they live draws admiration and the desire for imitation. Christians

should therefore be people who, because they are engulfed in the power of God's purpose, magnetically draw others to follow them.

Everyone needs a sense of purpose. And there is no greater purpose for man's life than that which God gives.

Allow the power of God's purpose to reign in your life. If, need's be, walk alone to accomplish this purpose. Determine to walk in a steadfast manner, never compromising and never altering your Christ-like walk. Walk through life with Jesus, in the light of His purpose, and attract others to follow you into His glory.

"Getting To Know You"

A Hicksville Success Story

Once a country boy and now as a successful insurance broker, Larry McCaffrey's life has centered around Broadway, Hicksville. He grew up here as a small town country boy and today operates the McCaffrey-Naso Insurance Agency located at 560 S. Broadway, which he founded in 1950.

Commenting on the drastic change in his surroundings, McCaffrey said "I would very much have liked to have my kids grow up in the Hicksville that I grew up in, but it would have been quite impossible to have started my business had it not been for the major growth."

Larry McCaffrey was born in Hicksville on July 25, 1919. His father was from County Cavan, Ireland; his mother a member of the Peter Mayer farm family, lived on Old Country Road where the Old Country Road School now stands. As a child with 4 brothers and 1 sister, McCaffrey lived over the Ralston Grocery store on the East Side of Broadway and later moved across the street where his father owned a deli. In the early 20's Broadway was a place of small stores and the owners and families lived upstairs. Sausmers Hardware, Guck-enbergs Ice Cream Store, Beatty's Stationery, Kunz Butcher shop helped form a close knit community. The family later moved to Jerusalem Ave. at the corner of Nicolai St, next door to Pastor Rusch of Trinity Lutheran Church. "It was a beautiful time, everybody knew each other," McCaffrey recalls. "When I was drafted into the army Leary Loeffler told me my notice was in the mail box."

He has many vivid memories of his grammar school days at St. Ignatius, spending precious pennies at Re-Pete's Candy Store; football & baseball games in the Nicholi Street, lot, now Trinity Lutheran Church. He also recalls the Voigt

He was drafted into the Army in World War II, serving overseas. He is the recipient of the Purple Heart. After the War, he returned to Hicksville, worked in New York and walked over the Brooklyn Bridge to attend St. John's University, graduating in 1947. He earned a CPCU degree in insurance in 1950 and started the insurance agency.

Married to Dorothy Schultz from Bay Ridge, Brooklyn and the father of 6 children and 1 grandchild, McCaffrey still found time to be active in community affairs. He was a trustee of the Hicksville School Board in the 50's during a period of growth - 4 grammar schools and one high school. The Board purchased 20 acre sites from Levit to insure ample room for sports activities for young people.

As a member of the Lion's McCaffrey held all the offices, including President. Thru the Lions he participated in sight saving classes to take vision impaired youngsters on trips to Bronx, Zoo, Mitchell Field, etc. Like many other suburban dads, his children led him into lots of coaching assignments in baseball and basketball.

flag program started when he was President of the Chamber of Commerce in 1963. Donations were solicited, flags and brackets were purchased, which TOB attached to meters on Broadway. He favors a "more realistic approach to the use of the Broadway properties," and Larry McCaffrey should know when it comes to Broadway....he has been there for a lifetime.

and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. There shall annually be assessed upon all the taxable real property in said Town of Oyster Bay Public Lighting District at the same time and in the same manner as other town charges an amount sufficient to pay said principal and interest as the same become due and payable, but if not paid from such source, all the taxable real property within said Town shall be subject to the levy of ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with

the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution, which takes effect immediately shall be published in full in Oyster Bay Enterprise Pilot, Locust Valley Leader, Massapequa Observer & Mid Island Herald, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

WHEREAS, pursuant to proceedings heretofore had and taken, and more particularly an order dated March 22, 1983, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, has determined it to be in the public interest to increase and improve the facilities of the Syosset Woodbury Community Park District in said Town, consisting of the construction of a sanitary sewer connection to permit sanitary sewage facilities to be provided to said Syosset Woodbury Community

Park District; and WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize such increase and improvement of facilities and to provide for the financing thereof; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. There shall annually be assessed upon all the taxable real property in said Syosset Woodbury Community Park District at the same time and in the same manner

as other Town charges an amount sufficient to pay said principal and interest as the same become due and payable, but if not paid from such source, all the taxable real property within said Town shall be subject to the levy of ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.
