Fire Fighter Glen Blazo, 22, of Hicksville Fire Departments Protection H. & L. Co. #1 was slightly injured at the scene of a fire that was set by the

The fire, in a 2-car det-ached garage at 121 Fourth St., Hicksville was reported by neighbors at 4:46 AM on April 14. Delayed detection of the fire led to the total destruction of the garage. Only the quick actions of vamps prevented the de-struction of 2 nearby dwell-ings and garages. The rear porch of #121 Fourth St. suffered an estimated \$3000.00 damage. Total damage to the garage was put at \$7000.00.

Blazo was struck a glane-ing blow by a vehicle that jumped over hose lines on Jerusalem Ave, and Fifth St. He sustained injures to his hand and fingers. He was taken to the County Medical

Center by F.D. ambulance, treated and released. Meanwhile, vamps chased the vehicle, made positive identification of the vehicle, plate number and

As it turned out, the driver of the vehicle was homeowner Dennis Bosted of 121 Fourth St., Hicksville. He was charged with arson. Police detectives in their report to local papers and other media failed to report the injury and charged filed by fire fighters

groups challenged the sale of the Hicksville Jones Institute in court and lost. New York state dropped a lawsuit against the Jones Fund to require them to open a new home when the Jones Manor on the Sound began operations.

The trustees have fulfilled legal requirements, yet ques-tions being raised by community groups are more moral than legal. The Fund, which has grown to \$2.8 million, producing an income of \$200,000 a year might be able to aid more. poor than the 46 beds for which Jones Manor is licensed.

One way to help in our recessionary times would be to offer emergency shelter to the homeless. According to a preliminary survey of 31 volunteer agencies released on April 13, 1983 by the Nassau Action Coalition, at least 5,000 county residents needed emergency shelter last year.

"Money doesn't belong in bank, it belongs in services and facilities for the poor. said Herb Klein of Hicksville, a community member who opposed the sale of the original institute. He summed up his leelings "Here is \$2 1/2 million that is private money, that is not taxpayers money. Here is an opportunity to provide for the poor that would not cost the tax payers anything. The trustees should not be sitting on that money." Arthur Dobrin, Leader of

McCaffrey held all the offi-ces, including President. Thru the Lions he participated in sight saving classes to take vision impaired youngsters on trips to Bronx, Zoo, Mitchell Field, etc. Like many other subur-ban dads, his children led him into lots of coaching assignments in baseball and basketball.
