# **Continuing Education Trips**

During the past year, the Division of Continuing Education of the Hicksville Public Schools instituted a new program of educational and cultural excursions. These trips, ranging in length from six hours to see iengn from six nours ice shows and plays in Manhattan to 2½ days for visits to Washington, D. C., and Gettysburg and Pennsylvania Dutch country, have been very successful.

"The popularity of these trips has exceeded our wild-est dreams," noted Director of Continuing Education of Continuing Education Kenneth J. Keegan. "So far, more than 850 people have taken advantage of this pro-gram and most are new par-ticipants, people who have never-been involved with ather phases of the Adult Education Program."

The program has sponsored five show tours to Manhattan, a trip to Washington, D.C., another to Pennsylvania Dutch Country and Hershey, Pennsylvania, and two to Middlebury, Vermont, where the group stayed at an inn built in 1827. Trips to Tarrytown, New York, and the circus at Madison Square Gardea are on the schedule Garden are on the schedule for this spring.

"We already have several trips set for the fall semester and we will probably add one or two more," says trip coordinator Allan Wunsch. coordinator Allan Wunsch.
"We plan to visit Washington, staying two nights at the
Hyntt Regency. The
Capitol, National Archives,
Ford's Theatre, the Air and
Space Museum, Smithsonian Museums, Arlington

National Cemetery, Mt. Vernon, and the Viet Nam, Jefferson, and Lincoln Memorials are on the itiner-

"Fall trips are planned for Gettysburg and Amish farm country as well as a second trip to New Hope and Lahaska, Pennsylvania," he added, "All trips are complete packages, including transportation, hotels, all meals, escort, guides, admis-sions, and taxes."

"We are now working on our most ambitious trip of all," said Director Ken Keegan. "We are planning a full week in London for the 1984 Easter Holiday week including round-trip non-stop jet from New York to London, motor coach transfers between the airport and hotel, seven nights at a cen-

trally located hotel with con-tinental breakfast, a halfday escorted motor coach tour, and all taxes and fees." The estimated cost for the trip is \$580 per person.

"We are also looking into "We are also looking into trips to Boston, New Orleans, Williamsburg, and Newport," added Mr. Keegan. "This is a unique program, and one which doesn't cost the school district a cent. It is completely self-sustaining. Many of those who travel with us no longer have school age children and we are bringing school back we are bringing school back into their lives again by offering something of value which they enjoy."

Addressing concerns expressed how the commun-ity can financially continue to carry all of the vital programs, Karp said, "Our budget making process should be a continuous one that asseses and evaluates well in advance of the usual period that we commence budget discussion.

Karp believes that the School Board should have greater input into what makes up the major parts of the budget. "We should per-haps establish a budget subcommittee with members of the Administration and the Board responsible for specific parts of the budget so that we may develop areas of expertise within this framework."

Karp concluded by stating his commitment to maintaining our educational excellence while still pres-enting a budget that would be acceptable to all segments of the community.

Hicksville should vote No on Propositions 2 and 3 on May 25th. The Superintendent of Schools recommended to the Board of Education the elimination of foreign language in the elementary schools and the reduction of services of guidance counselors at the elementary level as well. The Board agreed after much deliberation both in public and executive session, and the reasons were both logical and educationally compatible. Why provide a foreign language on the elementary level in face of declining enrollment reflect-ing class sizes of 15 to 17 students in some 37 classes in 1983 and 1984? The fragmented day resulting from the large number of students taking a foreign language would seriously impact on the ability of the average student to receive continuous classroom instruction in the basics.

Ten years ago only 15 per cent of a class, some four or five students, went to the foreign language program. It was offered to gifted students only. Now the program is open to both average and above-average students as well. Only a few remain in the class for classroom instruction. Recently, a fed-eral commission warned America that a "tide of mediocrity imperils the future of America-we are being threatened by lax standards and misguided priorities in the schools." A fragmented day contributes towards "mediocrity."

We are not eliminating our foreign language program-the student may elect to take a three-year sequential program in the 7th grade. Thus, the basic education of our elementary school children is being strengthened by the rejection of Proposition 2. Why provide two teachers for students when only one is

We should also reduce the use of guidance counselors in the elementary schools. The superintendent's recommendation was also
