The Forum is held every year by Council in an effort to inform all interested residents. PTA cannot support any candidates for the School Board, but in the interests of better education, the PTA Council urges everyone to read all printed material available, to attend meetings dealing with school matters, and to vote in school elections.

Scholarship Award Deadline, Fri., May 13

The William M. Gouze, Jr. V.F.W. Post 3211 Albinus A. Hanlon Scholarship Award draws to a close next Friday.

Bill Bennett, chairman of the V.F.W. Post Scholarship Committee, has made available the necessary application forms and guidelines to both the Hicksville High School and Holy Trinity Diocesan High School.

Forms are also available at the V.F.W. Post, 320 South Broadway, or may be obtained from William P. Bennett, chairman of the

V.F.W. Scholarship Committee, 5 Fetal Lane, Hicksville. The award is a cash scholarship grant totaling \$500-\$125 for each year for a maximum of four years—and will be based on the graduate's scholastic record, character, personal ratings, and good citizenship.

To qualify, the applicant must be a member of the graduating class at the time of selection and must be a son, daughter, or grandchild of a member of the V.F.W. Post 3211, or the Ladies Auxiliary.

During the past year, the Division of Continuing Education of the Hicksville Public Schools instituted a new program of educational and cultural excursions. These trips, ranging in length from six hours to see shows and plays in Manhattan to 2½ days for visits to Washington, D. C., and Gettysburg and Pennsylvania Dutch country, have been very successful.

"The popularity of these trips has exceeded our wildest dreams," noted Director of Continuing Education Kenneth J. Keegan. "So far, more than 850 people have taken advantage of this program and most are new participants, people who have never been involved with other phases of the Adult Education Program."

Continuing Education Trips

The program has sponsored five show tours to Manhattan, a trip to Washington, D.C., another to Pennsylvania Dutch Country and Hershey, Pennsylvania, and two to Middlebury, Vermont, where the group stayed at an inn built in 1827. Trips to Tarrytown, New York, and the circus at Madison Square Garden are on the schedule for this spring.

"We already have several trips set for the fall semester and we will probably add one or two more," says trip coordinator Allan Wunsch. "We plan to visit Washington, staying two nights at the Hyatt Regency. The Capitol, National Archives, Ford's Theatre, the Air and Space Museum, Smithsonian Museums, Arlington

National Cemetery, Mt. Vernon, and the Viet Nam, Jefferson, and Lincoln Memorials are on the itinerary."

"Fall trips are planned for Gettysburg and Amish farm country as well as a second trip to New Hope and Lahaska, Pennsylvania," he added. "All trips are complete packages, including transportation, hotels, all meals, escort, guides, admissions, and taxes."

"We are now working on our most ambitious trip of all," said Director Ken Keegan. "We are planning a full week in London for the 1984 Easter Holiday week including round-trip non-stop jet from New York to London, motor coach transfers between the airport and hotel, seven nights at a cen-

trally located hotel with continental breakfast, a half-day escorted motor coach tour, and all taxes and fees." The estimated cost for the trip is \$580 per person.

"We are also looking into trips to Boston, New Orleans, Williamsburg, and Newport," added Mr. Keegan. "This is a unique program, and one which doesn't cost the school district a cent. It is completely self-sustaining. Many of those who travel with us no longer have school age children and we are bringing school back into their lives again by offering something of value which they enjoy."

Syosset School And Library Vote May 11th

Syosset residents will vote on Wed., May 11th from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for the annual School and Library election.

The proposed school budget is \$37,577,614 which is \$2,187,304 over the 1982-83 budget of \$35,390,310. This is an increase of 6.2% which represents an estimated tax rate increase of \$1.49 per \$100 assessed valuation.

School And Library Board Candidates

President Joan Davidson will not seek re-election to the Board of Education. Her seat and those of Nicholas Legatos and Alfred Corsico are up for election as their term expires June 1983.

Six residents have submitted petitions for candidacy with the District Clerk. Michael Rubin, Joan Gilroy, Susan Rostan and Herbert Karp have submitted as did Board members Legatos and Corsico.

Running for the Library Board are William Kaas, incumbent and Gladys Mandresh. Mary Reich has withdrawn her name as a candidate (see Letters to the Editor in this issue).

The following is an outline of the candidates, as submitted by them:

Alfred Corsico
"The Syosset community must have a voice," is the pledge that Al Corsico, candidate for School Board, made this week while addressing groups of prospective voters in the upcoming School Board elections scheduled for Wednesday, May 11.

Corsico, an incumbent Board member spoke on the subject of honesty and democracy while meeting Syosset residents at various coffees held on behalf of several candidates seeking election to the School Board.

An experienced educator and administrator, Corsico is running as an independent candidate and is seeking his third term on the Board.

In discussing his philosophy Corsico quoted words written by famed British playwright Noel Coward. "It is discouraging how many people are shocked by honesty and how few by deceit."

"Those words seem very appropriate for the community at-large at this time," Corsico said. "The basic principles and foundation our country was founded on, that duly elected officials have a right to be heard or at least should be given the courtesy of discussion, is crumbling in our community."

"The exclusion of the democratic process whereby majority Board members have excluded the minority Board members from receiving pertinent information important in the decision making process has existed starting with the December 6 vote on school consolidation to the recent Board meeting (April 11) where fellow Board member Nicholas Legatos was chastised for merely seeking more input to the writing of 'News and Views.'"

Corsico concluded his remarks by stating that, "It will be my duty when re-elected to the Board that all voices in the community will be heard, the majority, minority, elder, students, etc."

A 21-year resident of Syosset Corsico has served on the Board since 1977. A father of three children who have been educated in the Syosset School System, he has been very active in community affairs including the Willis PTA, the Syosset High School Band Parents Association and Little League Baseball.

Joan Gilroy
Joan Gilroy, an active, experienced parent leader in the Syosset school community is seeking election to the Syosset Board of Education as an independent candidate. Since May 1981, she has been President of the Syosset Council of PTA's and has served as President of the Village School PTA from 1979 to 1981.

Mrs. Gilroy has dedicated her many years of PTA service to "achieving cooperation and communication among parents, teachers, administrators and board members to benefit the education and welfare of all Syosset children. In September 1981, she saw a need

"to bring together all PTA members in a common bond" and successfully revived the annual PTA Council Orientation Conference. Mrs. Gilroy, in pursuing her goal, has published a Council newsletter to further enhance inter-school communication and attended various PTA Executive Board Meetings. In so doing, Mrs. Gilroy has acquired a "greater sensitivity" for listening to the needs of the entire parent community, an asset greatly needed on our school board today.

In addition, Mrs. Gilroy has addressed the Syosset Teachers Association, stressing the common educational objectives of parents and teachers and serves as a member of the PTA-STA Liaison Committee.

Committed to the preservation of our superb educational system, Mrs. Gilroy has always supported school budgets and in conjunction with administrators, reintroduced district budget coffee hours in 1982.

Mrs. Gilroy has served on both the 1981 and 1982 Citizens Advisory Committee on School Facilities, the 1981 and 1982 PTA Council Consolidation and Reorganization Committee and the Transition Committee.

As a Village PTA Executive Board Member her activities included, Budget Chairperson, School Board Reporter, Council Delegate, Preschool Chairperson and Amblyopia Testing Volunteer. She is knowledgeable of our school system, having attended as Council President the following committee meetings: Gifted, and Talented, Budget, Legislation, Elementary Education, Secondary Education and Press Conference.

It is evident that Mrs. Gil-

roy has not just expressed her concern for the entire school community, but has demonstrated her commitment with definitive action. She offers the community an experienced voice with a refreshing approach and the opportunity for representation from the "new" wave of parents.

Mrs. Gilroy, as a new board member, would be committed to "moving this district forward" and resuming discussions on educational issues, such as all day Kindergarten and a computer literacy policy.

Mrs. Gilroy received a B.A. degree in Sociology from Marymount Manhattan College and was awarded the "Gailhac M" medal for her student activity accomplishments. Having frequently travelled to the mid-west as part of her managerial responsibilities at the J.C. Penney Company, where she was employed from 1969 to 1973, Mrs. Gilroy proved to be an astute businesswoman. Residents of Syosset for over 10 years, Mrs. Gilroy and her husband Jim are the parents of two sons who attend Village School.

Mrs. Gilroy is also a member of SAGE, SCAN and Syosset International.

Herbert Karp
Herbert M. Karp, candidate for a seat on the Syosset School Board emphasized his commitment to education while campaigning this week among prospective voters. The school board election in Syosset is scheduled for Wednesday, May 11.

"I am obviously pro-education," Karp said, explaining that he has served as a professional in the education field for 26 years. He is currently an assistant principal in New York City. "I have been very active in school affairs in Syosset having served as a Board member for three years from 1976 to 1979. I also have three daughters, two of them have gone through the entire Syosset system and a third who is a fifth grader at the Village School."

As a former member of the School Board, Karp is running as an independent candidate this year as a result of, "the divisiveness that has shaken our community."

In discussing with people he has met why he is seeking to return to the Board, Karp said, "During these trying times I believe I can provide the responsible, thoughtful representation that is urgently needed in Syosset."

Karp pointed out that as a former board member he voted in the affirmative for all of the budgets and helped support those programs that have placed the Syosset School District in the forefront of Long Island school systems.

"Consequently as a result of my long term involvement I have gained the expertise, knowledge and weariness to continue these programs we are so proud of," he said.

Addressing concerns expressed how the community can financially continue to carry all of the vital programs, Karp said, "Our budget making process should be a continuous one that assesses and evaluates well in advance of the usual period that we commence budget discussion."

Karp believes that the School Board should have greater input into what makes up the major parts of the budget. "We should perhaps establish a budget subcommittee with members of the Administration and the Board responsible for specific parts of the budget so that we may develop areas of expertise within this framework."

Karp concluded by stating his commitment to maintaining our educational excellence while still presenting a budget that would be acceptable to all segments of the community.

Nicholas Legatos
Nicholas Legatos, a candidate for the Syosset Board of Education, who is seeking re-election on May 11, reconfirmed his commitment to his continuing support of programs that have given Syosset its reputation for educational excellence.

Speaking to groups of prospective voters during a week of campaigning at afternoon teas and coffees, Legatos stated that he has, "a broad interest in the educational welfare. I will continue to support programs that will help children of every ability level, learning disabilities, the average student, and the gifted."

A member of the Syosset School Board since 1977, Legatos has a long record of support of all programs that have contributed to quality education.

Among future programs that Legatos would work for is the expansion of computer programs.

"From my position as a manager of an engineering firm I know first-hand the value of computers and computer literacy. I believe the use of computers will continue to expand and will revolutionize technology and our educational process," Legatos said.

"I want Syosset to be in the forefront of this educational revolution," he added.

Other programs high on the list of priorities are Project Beyond, a program for gifted elementary school children, the Special Education and Developmental Learning Program.

"When re-elected I will actively continue to support the enhancement and maintenance of these programs while being mindful of fiscal management," Legatos added.

An active community member since 1971, Legatos has been involved with SCAN and PTA. He served as representative of the School Board on the BOCES Budget Advisory Committee. He and his wife, Dora, have four children all whom currently attend Syosset schools.

Susan Rostan
Susan Rostan is the mother of three children aged 10, 8, 5.

B.A. SUNY Stony Brook (psychology/math); graduate studies at Queens College; graduate studies at C.W. Post (fine arts); professional artist and teacher for 13 years.

She has served on Walt Whitman PTA Executive Board 1978-1983; Syosset Council of PTA's Delegate 1981-present; Syosset Council of PTA's Officer 1982-83 (Recording Secretary); Syosset Advocate of Gifted Education Vice President 1979-1982; PTA Council School Reorganization and Consolidation Review Committee 1981; member North Woodbury Civic Association; Syosset Environmental/Civic Workshops 1981-83; PTA Council Committees: Elementary Education 1979-82 Gifted and Talented 1979-82 (Council and Co-chairperson 1982-present); PTA Council Co-chairperson for the Landfill Meeting Committee 1983; Community Liaison for Legislative Issues 1981-1983.

To The Editor:

I believe the voters of Hicksville should vote No on Propositions 2 and 3 on May 25th. The Superintendent of Schools recommended to the Board of Education the elimination of foreign language in the elementary schools and the reduction of services of guidance counselors at the elementary level as well. The Board agreed after much deliberation both in public and executive session, and the reasons were both logical and educationally compatible. Why provide a foreign language on the elementary level in face of declining enrollment reflecting class sizes of 15 to 17 students in some 37 classes in 1983 and 1984? The fragmented day resulting from the large number of students taking a foreign language would seriously impact on the ability of the average student to receive continuous classroom instruction in the basics.

Ten years ago only 15 percent of a class, some four or five students, went to the foreign language program. It was offered to gifted students only. Now the program is open to both average and above-average students as well. Only a few remain in the class for classroom instruction. Recently, a federal commission warned America that a "tide of mediocrity imperils the future of America—we are being threatened by lax standards and misguided priorities in the schools." A fragmented day contributes towards "mediocrity."

We are not eliminating our foreign language program—the student may elect to take a three-year sequential program in the 7th grade. Thus, the basic education of our elementary school children is being strengthened by the rejection of Proposition 2. Why provide two teachers for 17 students when only one is needed?

We should also reduce the use of guidance counselors in the elementary schools. The superintendent's recommendation was also

Michael Smith of Plainview has announced his candidacy and filed his petitions to fill the seat being vacated by Joe Blum on the Plainview/Old Bethpage School Board. The election for the three year term will be held on May 11, 1983.

Michael Smith and his wife, Deborah Lubansky Smith, have lived in Plainview for seven years. Their older daughter, Erin, will enter Old Bethpage Elementary School in September, and their younger daughter, Jessica, will follow in two years.

In announcing: Mr. Smith indicated that he

moved to Plainview largely because of the school district and, as he would have children attending P/OB schools for the next fifteen years, he feels a strong responsibility to become further involved in educational planning and policy issues in Plainview.

Mr. Smith served for the last year on the Budget Committee of the School Board and wrote a plan proposing a development of a five year capital plan for the district. His report and the committee's recommendations were largely responsible for the Board's submitting to the voters plans for adding a long needed enclosure for the Parkway School Kindergarten and preparing specifications for new roofs for the Jamaica Avenue and Parkway Schools. Both these projects will be carried out with the expenditure of no new taxpayer dollars, and will draw down a 33% State reimbursement.

Mr. Smith, a graduate of Tufts University, is a career manager for the City of New York. For the last five years he has served in the Division of Special Education of the New York City Public Schools. Currently he is Assistant Administrator of Management for the Bronx and prior to that was Director of Personnel for Special Education. He previously taught for five years and from 1968-71 was on the faculty of Hofstra University.

Mr. Smith is making an effort to reach all elements in the community--parents, students, teachers, administrators, the PTAs, School Board members, and non-parent taxpayers. He has met or arranged meetings with most of these groups and is available to meet with anyone in the community.

The campaign Mr. Smith will be running will focus on two major issues:

- The need to better plan for the future needs of the district, particularly for the use and maintenance of the school buildings and

grounds. The district has long ignored basic upkeep and maintenance and eventually will face major capital expenditures without better planning.

- A need to bring new, young, involved people to the School Board. Mr. Smith will have children in the schools until 1998 and wants to guarantee his children the same fine education which has been offered children in this district in the past.

YOU'VE GOT WHAT IT TAKES

Lewis Carroll, author of *Alice in Wonderland*, wrote children's stories which not only captured the imagination of the children but also bore a message. In one of his fantasies he tells of a lock that runs around continually searching for something. Finally a curious bystander asks, "What is the matter?" "I am seeking," says the lock, "for something to unlock me."

How many of us are faced with the same dilemma as that of Lewis Carroll's lock? Many times we go through life locked up in ourselves and in our anxieties. We want someone to unlock us to release the latent powers within us. Someone to set us free from our fears and to show us and help us develop solutions.

The cross of Christ is God's statement that you and I have worth in his eyes. Whenever we see or wear a

cross, it proclaims, "God believes I'm worthwhile, and he wants me to start appreciating my value." Often though, we see ourselves as weak and ineffective and not very competent. The great majority of funeral directors adhere to a professional code of ethics which includes provisions for seeing that this doesn't happen. In order to eliminate those hidden costs, you will find that these funeral directors are explicit about the costs of goods and services. In addition, once the family decides on the kind of service desired, the funeral director provides a written document for the family to review and approve.

This usually includes description of the service and the prices. Any supplemental charges for merchandise or service also be listed. It should also make mention of any sums which the funeral director will advance on behalf of the family, e.g. Cemetery charges, church offerings, pall bearers. Here in N.Y. State the funeral directors itemize all funeral costs and the families receive the original copy of those costs.

clear and logical. Why provide three positions that are not needed? The responsibilities of the guidance counselors overlap with the principals, psychologists and specialists. Here again, the service is NOT entirely eliminated. A guidance counselor will remain on the elementary level to insure continuity for placement of 6th graders to 7th grade and will be available to provide this service in our large elementary schools.

So the bottom line is, "Why increase your tax rate unnecessarily?" It will become, if you vote for Propositions 2 and 3, a record breaking \$2 per hundred dollars of assessment with the inclusion of these programs—services that your superintendent and some of your elected trustees agreed to eliminate.

Vote No for propositions 2 and 3 on Election Day, May 25th.

Teaching foreign languages in the Hicksville Public Schools is not a frill; it is a necessity. To eliminate funding for this subject in the school budget is shortsighted policy.
