Town Makes Room For Hicksville Auxiliary Police

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark, announced Town Board approval of a request from Hicksville Unit #312 of the Nassau County Auxiliary Police for permission to use a portion of the Town's Public Parking Garage located at Duffy Avenue in Hicksville.

The Hicksville unit will be using a portion of the building as a command post radio station under an agreement signed by Town

Supervisor Joseph Colby. Clark indicated that the use of this portion of the building will in no way interfere with the Town's normal operations.

"More importantly," Clark said, "the Town of Oyster and its residents will benefit from the increased effectiveness of the Nassau County Auxiliary Police and its trained patrol force in the Hicksville community."

The Town had won a court decision against Agostino in December, 1982, which ordered him to stop his trans mix cement business and remove the illegally-erected hopper from the site on Railroad Avenue in Hicksville.

Agostino continued to operate in direct violation of the court order, forcing the Town to move for contempt.

In April, 1983, the Town won another decision which ordered Agostino to cease operation and dismantle the hopper or the Town would have the option of dismantling the hopper at the expense of the corporation.

Buck resides near the site of the cement business and testified for the Town in court proceedings.

As of Tuesday, June 7, the hopper had been taken down, but not removed from the premises.

Miss Wessell Elected President

Runhild E. Wessell helped organize and was elected the first president of the Greater New York Chapter of the Fulbright Alumni Association on June 2 at a meeting held at Pace University.

Miss Wessell, who taught in Hicksville High School from 1936-1973, had a Fulbright Scholarship to Germany in 1956. She is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College, has a Master's Degree from Columbia and studied in summer sessions at five different universities, including Princeton, where she had a scholarship under the National Defense Education Act.

Fulbright Scholarships were established after World

War II under the initiative of Senator J. William Fulbright to provide for an exchange of students, researchers and professors between the United States and foreign countries.

The New York Chapter will carry out the objectives of the national organization to increase understanding among nations by bringing Fulbright scholars together and to foster community support for the ideals of educational and cultural exchange. Several members of the New York Chapter will be entertaining some Fulbrighters from Europe early this summer and a few will come to Hicksville at the end of June.

At The Town Board Meeting

At a hearing which lasted for over 2½ hours, over fifty local residents appeared in opposition to the petition of American Villa Associates and the Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District who petitioned the Town Board for a change of zone from Res. D to Bus. F on property west of the southwest corner of Old Country Road and Gerhard Road in Plainview, of a 5.3 acre property, upon which they proposed a large medical building plus 310 parking spots.

John Klein, the attorney for the petitioner brought with him two experts, Bertron Neilson, a real estate expert and Ed Sharsky, a traffic expert, as well as Tom Perkle, the architect. "This is a classic contemporary problem," Mr. Klein stated, "What to do with outdated school building."

Among those opposed to the proposal were Mr. Herbert Spiegel of 27 Gerhard Road who presented petitions containing approximately 750 names in opposition, and Mrs. Jean LaSala of 35 Charlotte Pl., who presented petitions in opposition containing approximately 50 names. In all cases, those opposed mentioned that the traffic congestion on Old Country Road in this area is already hazardous.

Supervisor Colby asked those opposed what they would prefer on this property. They answered that

one or two family homes would be preferable to them. However, it was then mentioned that these homes would also provide additional traffic. But those opposed felt that this traffic would proceed in a slower, more orderly fashion, as residents of the area.

The Board reserved decision on the petition.

In a short hearing Pat and Nada DeStefano asked for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O Residence-Office District on the southwest corner of South Oyster Bay Road and Garden St., in Hicksville. No one appeared in opposition. The petitioner explained that this art gallery would be for book illustrations only and no displays would appear in the picture window. He said that only occasional off-street business would occur in all probability. Parking was also considered as adequate for such a limited use.

The Board reserved decision on this petition.

The Board approved Resolution No. 496-1983 directing the Town Clerk to re-advertise a notice of a July 12 hearing on the petition of the Estate of Sonia Lerner and Edward Glick for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O Residence-Office District for property located on the west side of South Oyster Bay Rd., north of Garden St.

The Board approved Resolution No. 511-1983 re-

scheduling the Town Board meeting from Sept. 12 to Sept. 6.

The Board approved Resolution No. 513-1983 for a special use permit granted by Res. No. 960-82 to Parkland Plaza Associates on Duffy and Charlotte Avenues in Hicksville for an office building and warehouse. A 50' piece of land is required for a roadway in accordance with the Town of Oyster Bay Highway Division.

The Board approved Resolution No. 514-1983 on the petition of Brooklyn Ave. Associates and Slo-min's, Inc. of Lauman Lane and Broadway in Hicksville for a 218' in length, 60' in width building extension for office use and for a public garage.

The Board tabled until a later date the petition of Ren Marv Realty, Inc. for a special use permit on Ames Ct., in Plainview.

The Board approved Resolution No. 528-1983, the petition of Arthur J. Gross, M.D. of 372 South Oyster Bay Road in Hicksville for a change of zone from Zone D to an R-O, Residence-Office Zone, the hearing for which took place on March 22, 1983.

The Board approved Resolution No. 529-1983 on the petition of Peter Klein and Eric Teicholtz for a change of zone for property located on Old Country Road and Sylvia Lane in Plainview, from Zone D to an R-O, Residence-Office zone the hearing for which took place on April 12.

The next Town Board meeting is scheduled for Tues. June 21, starting at 10 am in the Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay.

What Happened At The Hicksville School Board Meeting

At the School Board meeting of June 8, Attorney Campenella affirmed that if 1,800 people sign a petition, the defeated propositions can be brought to a vote. He replied to a question asked by Ruth Gold, Guidance Counselor from the High School, regarding the foreign language and guidance counselor propositions. Trustee William Bennett opposed the idea and said "It may be legally proper, but ethically, we are bound to the will of the voters. For us to go back and reopen it is not proper, in my opinion."

President Charlene Anci presented awards for outstanding service to Pearl Blaustein and Elayne Kabakoff, District Coordinators of the In Depth Studies Exposition, held on June 7 and attended by over 800 people. The impressive displays and exhibits still adorn the Administration Building.

High School Senior Ruth Eberland was also honored by the Board. She is class valedictorian and the recipient of a national award in French. As an athlete, she received an award as the most valuable player in winter track.

Several board members praised Marie Marshall, after granting her tenure as

chairperson of the Junior High Science Department, effective August 18, 1983.

The Board approved personnel items, including accepting the resignation of Louis Penque, Principal of Old Country Road School, effective June 30, 1984. In a letter of resignation to Superintendent Fenton, Penque said it was his personal preference to continue as principal rather than transfer to a position in the Central office.

The Board adopted a school calendar for the 1983-84 school year and Supt. Fenton does not anticipate any adjustments, as occurred this year.

The Board awarded bids, approved claims and war-

rants, approved textbooks and recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped. It also handled routine financial matters and received copies of the Auditors report. It received a Cash Flow report for the month of May, which was explained by Business Manager Richard Weigand. The report indicates there is enough money to pay district bills, no significant change in the surplus figure which was estimated in the budget brochure and the district has invested as of the end of May \$14,287,698.23. The invested amount at this time is \$1.6 million less than last year, because there was a greater surplus at that time.

Congress therefore sets the date from January 1st to December 31st, 1983, in remembrance of the beginnings of German settlement in America. The Congress empowers the President of the United States to proclaim that the population of the United States is asked to honor this year with appropriate festivities and events. United States postage stamps have been printed to memorialize the occasion.

The Club's June meeting will be held Friday, June 10, at the VFW Hall, 320 South Broadway, Hicksville, 8:30 p.m. Our guest speaker will be the senior Town of Oyster Bay Councilman, Sal Mosca. Sal is not only a dynamic speaker, but he is informative and interesting as well. Mark your calendar now so you'll be present at this meeting—we're sure you'll enjoy yourself!

The high calibre of our Republican officials cannot be denied. They bring to their elected office not only dedication but the best interests of their constituents.

Nassau County Francis T. Purcell and Nassau County Comptroller Peter T. King are taking a strong stand to the Long Island Lighting Company's proposed rate hike request of 56 percent. We believe this is most commendable. Long Islanders cannot absorb continually escalating costs of electricity and power. Once again our Republican leaders are exercising the public's mandate to act on its behalf.

State legislation has been proposed which would establish a Citizen Utility Board (CUB) in each of the utility marketing areas of the state. The legislation, which has been proposed by the Assembly Republican Conference, would create a separate board for the LILCO marketing area of Nassau and Suffolk

Counties.

Stressing that the Citizen Utility Boards would not involve the expenditure of any government funds, King stated that the Boards "offer an innovative way to protect the interests of utility consumers."

All residential consumers of LILCO would be eligible to join the CUB and vote for its Board of Directors. The Board would be financed by voluntary membership fees contributed by consumers. The CUB would then employ attorneys, utility rate experts and support staff to represent the consumer's interest before the Public Service Commission regarding utility rate requests and service plans.

King maintained that "LILCO cannot be allowed to receive rate increase after rate increase. A regional Citizen Utility Board offers an effective program to provide consumer-oriented supervision of LILCO."

However, he stated that he opposed the legislation proposed by Governor Cuomo which would provide a statewide CUB. King maintained that a statewide board would be "too distant and centralized to satisfy the needs of people at the regional level." King's fear that under Governor Cuomo's plan the Board would be dominated by New York City and the interest of Nassau and Suffolk consumers would be forgotten.
