## Trinity Lutheran Staff Captures Burglary Suspect

"We're sick and tired of being ripped off," Dr. Krahn, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, stated after the fourth burglary of the year took place at his parish at 40 W. Nicholas Street in Hicksville.

At about 3:20 PM on Wednesday, June 8, nursery teacher Joyce Rausch entered her classroom and noticed a man she had never seen before. When the man left the room, Mrs. Rausch

checked her purse and discovered her wallet missing. The man was neatly dressed and could have passed for one of the nursery parents picking up their children.

She informed the principal, Mr. Weldon Endorf, that she had been robbed. He, along with teachers Michael Busch and William Kuck confronted the man, who was later identified as John Kent, 29, of Farmingdale. Kent then bolted from

the building, pursued by Endorf, Busch, and Kuck. Deaconess Kay Johnson and Dr. John Krahn, pastor of Trinity, also went after him.

During the pursuit, teacher Busch ducked a punch thrown by the alleged burglar. When he was finally wrestled to the ground, the police arrived. The wallet was recovered from Kent. Trinity plans to press charges to the full extent of

the law.

"Trinity along with other churches and synagogues exists to serve the people of our community. Any crime against any house of worship is a crime against every decent individual regardless of their faith. We are committed to doing everything in our power to make Hicksville and the surrounding communities desirable places to live," Dr. Krahn commented.

## Summer Program For Seniors

"Senior Citizens in the Town of Oyster Bay will find no lack of activities to help them creatively and enjoyably fill their leisure hours this summer," according to Town Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond.

"Through the Town's Division for Senior Citizen Services, we have worked to develop a summer program that will suit the needs and interests of our golden-agers," Diamond commented. "I hope our seniors will take advantage of the many activities planned especially for them."

### CHOOSING A CEMETERY

When is the best time to make cemetery arrangements? Some people do this when they are quite young, others leave it to their survivors. It's primarily a matter of preference and life-style. Naturally, someone who leads a rather transient life, moving every few years, may want to postpone such decisions.

On the other hand, if you're convinced you're in the community where you intend to live and die, the sooner you see to burial arrangements the better. Delay can mean that your survivors will have to pay a higher price for a burial plot if it's needed quickly.

There are a number of important considerations. Some people are limited, for example, to cemeteries devoted exclusively to members of their religious faith. Others will have a strong preference for the cemetery where their

family or friends are buried -- regardless of cost. If you have a preference, it's in you and your family's best interest to make your decision in advance.

In the general area, plots can cost from \$400 up, plus opening charges ranging from \$125 up to \$410 depending on the cemetery. A veteran can be buried in the National Cemetery at Calverton or have a \$150 burial allowance applied towards another cemetery.

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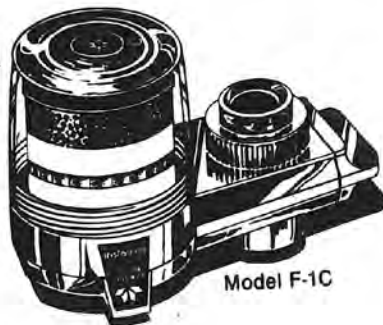

## Senate Passes Marino Parole Restitution Bill

For the first time since 1977, the State Board of Parole would be able to make restitution to crime victims a condition of a state inmate's release on parole under a bill sponsored by Senator Ralph J. Marino (R, Syosset) and passed by the Senate this week.

"When state law was amended in the late seventies to separate the Board of Parole from the Department of Correctional Services, the authority of the Board to require restitution or reparation to a victim as a condition of parole was omitted from the new sections of law defining the powers and duties of the Board," Marino explained. "My bill restores that authority to the Board as a valid consideration in determining appropriate

terms for the parole or conditional release of state inmates. "My bill further requires the Board, when restitution or reparation is not required, to state on the record why that decision was made."

"Since the law already requires the Board to enumerate all conditions applying to an inmate's parole and to interview the inmate personally before release, such a statement would not impose an unreasonable burden on the Board. Determination of an applicant's financial resources and job prospects already form a part of data the Board must consider in reaching a decision on the granting of parole or conditional release."

The Marino bill is modeled after similar legislation now in effect in the states of Kansas, Iowa, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Wisconsin.
