A petition to resubmit the defeated foreign language and guidance counselor propositions for public vote was presented to the Hicksville Board of Education at the June 22 meeting by Guidance Counselor Lillian Gold. She learned that only 181 signatures were required by law, but presented 851 signatures gathered by residents, including students.

Board Attorney Campanella confirmed the petition was valid but advised the Board "It is up to your discretion if you want to hold this special election. The two propositions were advisory only because the items were not within the power of the electorate to decide." He suggested when the Board meets on July 5, it could vote to see if a majority was in favor of the special vote.

Trustee Bill Bennett strongly opposed the petition, calling those who presented it "a lobbying group."

He said "In a democracy you don't declare an election null and void because you don't get your way." But several people from the audience argued the democratic process does allow for recourse when there is a disagreement over laws that are passed.

And several people wished to speak positively about an employee who was not recommended for tenure. They were informed by President Charlene Anci the general rule regarding personnel matters bars "public talking." She suggested they speak to Supt. Catherine Fenton privately before the Board entered Executive Session to discuss personnel. At the Executive Session, tenure was granted to Donald J. Haggerty, Chairman of the Junior High Mathematics Department, Susan Pfizenmayer N-6, Lois Glazer, Attendance Teacher and George Baer N-6. It was also

decided a special meeting will be held for the purpose of Executive Session on June 28 at 8 p.m. to handle incomplete items.

The Board awarded bids, approved claims and warrants, approved textbooks and recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped.

It approved routine personnel matters including the appointment of Roberta M. Katcher as Coordinator of Elementary Arts/Reading. The position involves being a liaison between staff and central administration. It changed the title of the position of Richard Hogan to Director of Physical Health Education and District Activities. This change in title does not affect tenure area according to Mr. Friedman.

Superintendent Fenton reviewed the Course Catalog for the Junior High School and High School. She named the courses not

being offered because of poor enrollment. Trustee John Ayres asked for the amount of students enrolled in BOCES and she said she did not know, but would find out.

The meeting ended on a note of praise and commendations. Bill Bennett congratulated Iris Wolfson on her installation as President of the Nassau Suffolk School Board Association, saying "This is a great benefit for Hicksville, we wish Iris well." Vice President Jay Schwartz presented Charlene Anci and Daniel Arena with plaques commemorating their years of service to the District, and several board members praised the two trustees who are leaving the board.

The next regular board meeting is the Reorganization Meeting to be held on Tuesday July 5 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Bldg.

poored into bags or cans, on property located on the west side of Skyline Drive, north of Express St. and south of Commercial St. in Plainview. The petitioner's attorney, Carl A. Binder, stated that this operation would be noiseless and would generate no dust. Preco's president, Leonard Sonnberg, testified that this operation could be described as "noiseless and dustless" because all work is done inside. He presented two experts (engineers) who explained that the silo's blower system between trucks and the silo is dustless because everything is done inside.

However, about 35 residents appeared presenting petitions in opposition to this petition. Mr. I. Cohen, the attorney for the residents stated that this proposal "was not good for this area." He said that three court cases have already been decided against the proposal and it is still in the Court of Appeals. All judges state that the petitioner must have a special use permit for this proposal. Among the people who testified were Mr. Marvin Sandler and his mother, Mrs. Rose Sandler who own a pharmaceutical repackaging firm located next door to the silo. They said that they were concerned because of the strict regulations under which they must operate.

Mr. Michael Cohen of the

Candee Man Co., of 31 Skyline Drive a firm that packages nuts, chocolates, and other confections testified that he too is concerned about the dust and how it would affect his operation.

The night hearing was postponed until July 12, on the petition of Sports Cars Unlimited and 760 Jericho Tpke. Realty Corp. for a change of zone from Res. B. to Bus. G. However, while it is in effect, you are insured for its full face value for a small premium. You only have to make sure that the premiums are paid and the policy is renewed at the end of each term.

This then provides a source by which your family can arrange a funeral and not be greatly concerned about where the funds will come from.

"The flag which we honor, and under which we serve, is the emblem of our unity, our power, our thought and our purpose as a nation. It has no other character than that which we give it from generation to generation..."
